Ir. Brown, from the Committee on Streets and Alleys, introed the following ordinance, as a substitute for the former inance creating a Board of Public Improvements for the City Indianapolis.

ORDINANCE Establishing a Board of Public Improvements for he City of Indianapolis, Defining its Powers and Duties, and Regulating the Construction of Buildings within the City Limits.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of lianapolis, That it shall be the duty of the Common Council, the first annual meeting in each year, to elect, by a ballot vote, m among its own members, three Commissioners of the Board Public Improvements of the City of Indianapolis, who shall ve for ane year, or until their successors are elected and cliffied.

SEC. 2. Such Board of Public Improvements shall meet as often once a week, at an office to be provided for them by the Comnocomoral, and shall have power to select from their own mber a President of the Board, who shall serve for one year.

SEC. 3. The City Clerk shall be the Clerk of such Board, but all receive no additional compensation for such services other in the fees fixed and authorized by this ordinance.

SEC. 4. Said Clerk shall attend all meetings of the Board Public Improvements, and record their proceedings; keep proper account and other books pertaining to his office; careful preserve all papers, profiles, or plats filed in his office; and musuch reports to the Common Council, in writing, as the Board Public Improvements may direct; and issue under his certificand seal all permits or licenses which he may, by the ordination of Common Council and the orders of the Board of Public provements, be required to do, and keep a register thereof.

SEC. 5. The said Board shall have the immediate charge the execution of the orders of the Common Council, relative the construction and repairs of Public Buildings, Market Hou Bridges, Culverts, Cisterns, Sewers, and Drains; the Imprement of Streets, Alleys, Sidewalks, Parks, Market Spaces, Public Grounds; the Lighting of the Streets, and the constition and management of Water Works; Provided, said Bo shall not, in any case, incur any expenditure for any of the objection named, without first having submitted their plans van estimate of the cost of any proposed work, to the Comr Council, and received its approval.

SEC. 6. The said Board shall require its Clerk to keep corraccounts of all expenditures incurred by them, or by any offi of the City, acting under their instructions by order of the Comon Council, in the execution of any public work which the may be authorized to superintend or control, and they shall their Clerk, make monthly reports to the Comm

Council, of all such expenditures.

SEC. 7. It shall be the duty of all officers of the City, who is be ordered by the Common Council to do or have done a work of the character named in the fourth section of this ordina to report to said Board for instructions; which instructions said officers shall strictly conform to, unless the same shall inconsistent with their duties as defined by the City Charter the ordinances of the Common Council. They shall, also, may report of their expenditures and operations, and file the sawith the Clerk of the Board of Public Improvements.

Sec. 8. The Civil Engineer of the City shall project and before the Board of Public Improvements plans for the construction or repairs of Public Buildings, Market Houses, and Bridgand of all improvements of Streets, Alleys, Sidewalks, Culve Parks, Market Spaces, Sewers, and Drains, and of all ot Public Works of said City, which may be in contemplation, which he may deem necessary for the public good and connience, together with the estimated cost of the same. applications for public improvements shall first be made to second, and then shall be referred to said Civil Engineer and Board of Public Improvements, who shall report thereon to second, adding to such report the plans and estimates of such may be approved, and such other improvements as they may

k fit to recommend. The said Board shall receive and prefor the approval of said Council, all proposals for constructing erforming any public work. They shall examine and conrall plans proposed for any Market House, Bridge, Public ding, Sewer, or other public work, and report to said Council of said plans as may be approved, together with the estimate re whole cost thereof, and their opinions and recommendations terning the same.

When any person or persons shall be desirous of eting, constructing, or altering any house or building, he or y shall make application at the office of the Board of Public provements for a permit for that purpose, and he or they shall required to furnish a written statement of the proposed location, the dimensions and manner of construction of the proposed ldings or edifice, together with the different stories and the nice, and the materials to be used in such house or building,

Lec. 12. It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to lave, or attempt the removal of any frame or wooden house or liding from any point within the city limits to any other point her within or outside of the city limits, without first having ained a permit from said Board of Public Improviments. Such mits shall specify the time within which, and the points from I to which such removal shall be made. The Board of Public provements shall, in no case, issue a permit allowing the movof any framed or wooden house or building across any bridge or the Canal or Pogue's Creek. The Clerk of the Board of blic Improvements shall issue all such permits when ordered the Board, attesting the same by a proper certificate, and Il be entitled to charge a fee of 25 cents for each certificate so ned.

Sec. 13. All permits issued by the Board of Public Impr ments, or its Clerk, for the erection, construction, or alteration any house or building, shall particularly specify the amoun space in the street, upon the line of which such proposed h or building fronts, to be occupied by the builder with builmaterials; provided that no permit shall be issued allowing use of any greater space on any ninety feet street than thirty of the width of such street immediately fronting the prop proposed to be improved, commencing at a point not less five feet from the outer edge of the sidewalk, or of any gre on Washington street than thirty feet of the width of such st: immediately fronting the property proposed to be improcommencing at a point not less than five feet from the outer of the sidewalk, or of any greater space on all other streets i fifteen feet of the width of the street immediately fronting property proposed to be improved, commencing at a point not than four feet from the outer edge of the sidewalk. No pe shall be issued allowing the placing of building materials t any alley for a greater length of time than forty-eight hours, shall any one be permitted to dig a well, or place a pump in a well, on any sidewalk, street or alley.

SEC. 14. Any person who shall erect or construct any hous building, or alter any house or building so as to make the s substantially a new building, or who shall remove any fram wooden building from one point in said city, to any other p therein, without first obtaining a permit, as required by sect 9, 10, 11 and 12, or any person who shall fail to comply with specifications or requirements of such permits as to the space be occupied with materials or other requirements, or who s dig a well, or place a pump in such well on any sidewalk, stree alley shall, upon conviction thereof, before the Mayor, be fin any sum not less than five dollars, nor more than fifty dol

SEC. 15. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Board Public Improvements to keep a Register of all applications permits to construct, repair or remove buildings, showing size description and estimated cost of the same, the date of plication for and the date of granting each permit, and, Board of Public Imporvements shall cause to be prepared the from and reported to the Common Council at its second mee in May of each year, a statement showing the number and of all the buildings authorized to be constructed, together a such other statistical imformation as it may see fit to present

SEC. 16. The Chief Fire Engineer shall have full power to ins all buildings in course of erection or when completed and re to the Board of Public Improvements any that he may dunsafe, from any cause, and the Board of Public Improvemental notify the owners thereof, and require them to const the same, in such manner as to make them safe from fires

That the City Clerk be directed to issue an order in favor of the Street Commissioner for five hundred dollars, to be expended by the latter in repairing and cleaning streets and alleys and for repairs of bridges and culverts.

Which motion was adopted.

By Mr. Staub-Motion:

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to fill up a portion of Liberty street, between New York and Vermont.

Which motion was adopted.

By Mr. Haughey-Motion:

That the Chief Fire Engineer be directed to go to Fort Wayne, and collect the amount paid the agent for this City, for the Engine Conqueror, and to make such arrangements for the deferred payments, as he may deem proper.

Which motion was adopted.

By Mr. Haughey-Motion:

That the City Clerk be directed to make out the bill for half the cost in building the pest-house for small pox cases, and present the same to the Board of County Commissioners, for payment.

Which motion was adopted.
