Mr. President—The Committee on Streets and Alleys, to whom was referred the petitions:

1. Of the Trustees of the German Catholic Church for the

vacation of an alley running north and south through part of

square 77 of the City of Indianapolis; and

2. Of J. M. L. Bradshaw and Isabella Lupton for the vacation of an alley running east and west through McIlvaine & Latham's subdivision of out-lot 173 of the City of Indianapolis, report that a remonstrance has been filed against the first named proposed vacation by Thomas H. Sharpe, a property owner immediately adjoining the alley intersecting on the south, the alley proposed to be vacated; and that a remonstrance has been filed against the last named proposed vacation by Samuel W. Elliott and others, owners of property immediately adjoining the alley proposed to be vacated.

The Laws of Indiana confer on Common Councils of cities power to vacate streets and alleys given to County Commissioners to vacate streets and alleys in towns, and such grants of power, only, authorizes vacations of alleys to be made where no objection is made by parties interested. Such objection having been made in the two cases referred to, your Committee beg leave to return

the petitions and to ask that they be laid on the table.

Hon. Sims A. Colley, Chairman Select Committee, to whom was referred the ordinance and resolutions presented at last meeting of Council, in relation to the "Bonds, Malfeasance, Trial, &c. of City Officers," reported as a substitute for said ordinance, an ordinance entitled:

An Ordinance relative to the Bonds, Malfeasance and Trial of City Officers, and members of the Police Force.

Which was read the first time, and, on motion, was referred back to the Committee, with instructions to make additional amendments.

By the same Committee:

Resolved, That until the taking effect of an ordinance, relative to the Bonds, Malfeasance and Trial of City Officers, or Members of the Police Force, all charges which are now pending, or here-

after may be brought against any member of the Police Force, shall be heard by the Common Council at any regular or special session; and that the Mayor shall summon such witnesses for or against the accused, as the parties prosecuting or defending, may desire; that all witnesses may be forced to attend, and are to be examined as in suits at law; and that at the conclusion of such examination, a viva voce vote shall be taken on the guilt of the accused, and if two-thirds of the whole number of the Council determine the accused to be guilty, he is to be removed from his office, and sentence of removal shall be pronounced by the presiding officer.

The question being on the passage of the resolution, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Allen, Boaz, Brown, Cook, Douglass, McNabb, Seidensticker, Staub and Thompson—9.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Colley, Emerson and Jameson—3.

So the resolution passed.

An Ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance establishing Police Districts for the City of Indianapolis, establishing and regulating the Police Force of the city and repealing all existing ordinances on the subject."

Which was read the first time, and, on motion of Mr. Haughey,

was read a second time by its title.

By Dr. Thompson—Motion:

That the Street Commissioner be directed to enlarge the culvert on the east side of Mississippi street, at its crossing with Market street, and to place gravel on the west sidewalk of Mississippi street, between Market and Ohio streets, where the sidewalk has been washed away.

Which motion was adopted.

By Mr. Haughey-Motion:

That the Chief of Police be directed to fill the places of any member of the Police Force who may enlist 100 days, in response to the Governor's call for 20,000 men, temporarily or for 100 days, and that we pledge ourselves to give them their places on their return.

Which motion was adopted.

By Mr. Emerson-Motion:

That the Mayor request the citizens to meet at the School Houses, in each ward, on Saturday the 7th instant, to sign a petition, in acordance with the provision of section 58 of the City Charter, petitioning this Council to contract a debt or loan to procure money for the purpose of paying a bounty to volunteers in the 100 days' service, or maintaining their families during their absence.

Which motion was adopted.

By Mr. Allen-Motion:

That one hundred dollars be appropriated for the use of the Fire Department, to buy feed, fuel, &c.

Which motion was adopted.

By Mr. Seidensticker:

Whereas a judgment for a considerable sum of money was recently rendered in the Marion Circuit Court against the City, in a case wherein the City was not represented by attorney; therefore, be it

Motioned, That the Judiciary Committee be instructed to examine and report the facts of the said case, and especially why the interests of the City were not represented by the City Attorney.

Which motion was adopted; and, on motion of Mr. Brown, Councilman Seidensticker was added to said Committee.

By Mr. Brown-Motion:

That the Civil Engineer be instructed to set the grade stakes in front of St. Mary's Church, on Maryland street, that the trustees of said church may boulder the gutter in front of the church and dwelling, and that the city pay for bouldering the crossing of the alley, at the rate of 90 cents per cubic yard for city's portion; and when completed, the Civil Engineer's estimate for city's portion of the contract shall be paid.

Which, on motion, was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys.

By Mr. Brown-Motion:

That the City Clerk be directed to issue an order in favor of the Street Commissioner for \$500, the same to be expended by him in paying for labor and teaming in repairing the streets.

Which motion was adopted.

By Mr. Brown—Motion:

1. That the Civil Engineer be instructed to notify the agent of the Central Canal, that the culvert under the Canal at the crossing of Pogue's Run, must be re-placed by a new one, sufficiently large to enable the water in said creek to flow through it without obstruction; that the Civil Engineer be directed to see that the Canal Company promptly complies with this order; and that the new culvert shall be made, as to size and construction, to the satisfaction of the Civil Engineer.

2. That the City Clerk furnish a copy of this motion to the

Civil Engineer at the earliest practicable moment.

Which motion was adopted.

On motion, the Council adjourned, to meet on Monday, the 9th inst., at 7½ o'clock, P. M.
