The Program Committee for the 1984 ITW Conference invites you to submit a program proposal. Presentations may concern every grade level or address needs and interests of teachers and students in elementary school, middle school, secondary school, or college. In addition to panel discussions or sharing of papers, formats can include demonstrations, simulated teaching situations, or workshops. Short talks of 20-25 minutes; longer sessions of 90 minutes, perhaps involving several teachers; or intensive workshops of 150 minutes all are possible. You decide audience, method, and length of your presentation.

Your imagination and insight also determine your interpretation of the conference theme, "The WRITE Kind of Competency." Competency of teachers, competency of students, efficacy of teaching and evaluating techniques, and quality of writing programs are possible topics.

Teacher Competency

How prepared are most teachers to teach writing? Do English departments and colleges of education adequately train teachers of writing?

What factors most influence a teacher's ability to teach writing: class size, administrative support, other factors?

Are teachers of writing doing research in their classrooms? Where can they publish results of their theoretical or pedagogical discoveries?

What publications are most useful to teachers of writing?

Student Competency

How do levels of cognitive development influence a student's ability to write?

Must a student study grammar to become a good writer? How is writing competency defined differently for underprepared, gifted, or other special students?

Efficacy of Teaching and Measurement Tools

What pedagogical techniques work best for teaching mastery of certain writing skills?

Which texts on adopted lists emphasize valid areas of competence in writing?

How should teachers evaluate students' writing competence?

If Indiana adopts statewide competency testing, what areas should be tested to verify writing competency?

Quality of Writing Programs

What qualifies a student to move from grade to grade or academic level?

What are qualities of a writing program in which students grow in skills within a school or school system?

What liaisons do or should exist among elementary, middle, secondary, and/or collegial programs of writing to generate building of student writing skills?

Please plan to share with other teachers of writing at the 1984 conference. Proposals not directly related to the conference theme but which, nonetheless, develop an important aspect of writing pedagogy will, of course, be accepted.
