Scrutiny in the Great Round created by Tennessee Rice Dixon and her Paris-based collaborator, Jim Gasperini, is one of the most beautiful CD experiences I have ever seen. Based on the book by Rice Dixon which was published by Granary Books in New York (1992), the CD Rom is completely interactive, seductive, beautiful and technically innovative, with a musical score that makes this experience a must! There are images of horses, a sea horse, a man, woman, and wondrous symbols of moon, sun and wheels. These interact randomly or by a flick of your finger, you can control the sequences. It is lyrical and poetic. The book as is the CD is full of personal imagery, intimate but with universal iconography of fertility and growth, mating and impregnation. The CD transforms the personal and intimate into universal and meditative.
