Then in Washington to be at the Pyramid Atlantic Book Fair and Book Conference, there was Dan Flavin at the National Gallery, the new and wonderful Museum of the American Indian with its great interactive exhibits, and my friend, Cai Guo-Qiang, at the Smithsonian's Sackler Gallery. Old friends, new friends and an intense book fair and talks made my return to Washington illuminating. The Metro really works well, and getting around without a car is so pleasant.
