Arthur Dove: A Retrospective, Whitney Museum of American Art, New York City, through 12 April. Travels to Addison Gallery of American Art in Andover, MA (24 April - 14 July) and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art (2 August - 4 October).

Splendors of Ancient Egypt, Portland Art Museum, 8 March - 16 August.

Masters of Light: Dutch Painting from Utrecht in the Golden Age at the National Gallery in London through 2 August.

Mark Rothko at the National Gallery of Art in Washington, the first and largest comprehensive American retrospective since 1978 of paintings and works on paper. The show will be seen at the Whitney Museum from 17 September - 29 November and at the Museum of Modern Art in Paris in 1999.

Secret Location on the Lower East Side: Adventures in Writing, 1960-1980 at the New York Public Library at 42nd St., including the writers and artists who used the mimeograph machine to produce adventuresome writing in inexpensive publications, through 25 July 1998.

A Calder Retrospective opens at the National Gallery of Art in Washington on 29 March marking the 100th anniversary of Alexander Calder's birth. More than 250 works will be on exhibit through 12 July. The show will then travel to the San Francisco Museum of Modern for 3 months beginning 4 September.

Bonnard at Museum of Modern Art, New York from 21 June - 13 October 1998.

Aleksandr Rodchenko, the first major retrospective of the work of Rodchenko including 300 paintings, drawings, collages, product and graphic images, furniture design, jewellery, even candy wrappers and photographs created between 1915 and 1939. British Library in London exhibits Gutenberg Bible, original manuscripts written by Jane Austen, George Eliot and Thomas Hardy, a section called "Turning the Pages" featuring an interactive screen system that simulates the turning of pages of several books including "The Diamong Sutra, the world's earliest dated printed book (868), an a Leonardo da Vinci notebook. There is also a Workshop of Words, Sound and Images, a hands-on gallery of books that traces the history of book production from the earliest written documents through medieval manuscripts and printing to the digital revolution.

Diego Rivera – Frida Kahlo at the Musée Maillol in Paris includes 80 paintings and drawings by Kahlo, but lacks many of the well-known self-portraits, as well as some of Rivera's most haunting oils. But the show, according to Alan Riding, shows that Kahlo looked to Rivera as her maestro, but she followed him more as a man than as a painter. Through 30 September in Paris.

a k a Lewis Carroll at the Morgan Library in Manhattan marks the 100th anniversary of the death of Charles Lutwidge Dodgson (1832-1898) famous for Alice in Wonderland, letter writer, an Oxford don who taught math, a cleric, a poet, a pamphleteer, a deviser of games and puzzles, an ardent theatergoer and a gifted amateur photographer.
