Mark Rothko: Through 29 November at the Whitney Museum of American Art, traveling to Paris.

Joseph Cornell/Marcel Duchamp...in Resonance at the Philadelphia Museum of Art through 3 January. 57 works by Cornell and 32 by Duchamp.

Common Man, Mythic Vision: The Paintings of Ben Shahn through 7 March 1999 at the Jewish Museum, New York City, covering works from 1936 to 1965, focusing primarily on Shahn's mature style as it evolved toward allegorical, mythological and biblical imagery after World War II.

The show will travel to Addison Gallery in Andover, MA, then to the Wexner Center for the Arts at Ohio State University.

La Futurista: Benedetta Cappa Marinetti 1917-

1944 at the Walker Art Center 15 November - 14 February 1999. The wife of Filippo Tommaso Marinetti collaborated with her husband with the idea of tattilismo (tactilism), also of aeropittura (aeropainting), which took the form of fantastic aerial views. She continued to show in major Futurist exhibitions and in the Venice Biennale from 1926 through 1936, but when Marinetti died in 1944, she stopped exhibiting and devoted herself to advancing the study of Futurism. Curated by Lisa Panzera, with works lent from Luce Marinetti, the artists' daughter and the Bienecke Rare Book Library at Yale University.

Irony and Survival on the Utopian Island, Arizona State University Art Museum in Tempe (26 September - 3 January 1999. First major group show in the U.S. of work by young Cubans.

Perversions, Subversions and Verse: Richard Tipping at Ubu Gallery, 16 E. 78th St., New York, NY. Versions of iconic dada and surrealistic objects, American fastfood logos, as well as typographic concrete poetry in granite, etc. are featured. For instance, there is the Mobile Aphrodisiac, a version of Dali's "Lobster Telephone" which has a small mobile phone attached to the back of a large and very realistic lobster: the recharge unit it stands on is a circle of pure merino fleece.
