Biblio for December 1998 features an article by Rye Armstrong on State of the Art Book with an emphasis on Richard Minsky and the Center for the Book, which he founded. Some of the bookworks certainly do not come from the Center for the Book, which usually features artist books, not art books. Alas, the terminology stands in the way of interesting photographs and a plug for what we do here too! The issue also contains a tour for a bibliophile in England, the rare book collection of Dr. John Warnock, the father of desktop publishing as CEO of Adobe Systems.

The New York Times published a wonderful article on 10 July on the relationship of Brion Gysin to his hometown, Edmonton, Alberta and the celebration of Gyson as a native son in the first major North American retrospective of his works at the Edmonton Art Gallery. Entitled "Brion Gysin: I Am That I Am", the exhibition examined the output of a painter, writer, sound poet, tape composer, lyricist and student of magic who became a cult figure not so much for the impact of his works as for the scope of his ideas. This was a show NOT to miss, and one only hopes that not only Edmonton but the rest of North America will realize what they missed during such a creative lifetime. Gyson died at the age of 70 in Paris in 1986.

This is an important cutting-edge publication, available from Luna Bisonte Prods, 137 Leland Ave., Columbus, OH 43214.

The New Yorker for 16 November features an article on Nan Goldin's photographs by Peter Schjeldahl. The issue for 5 October has a wonderful book-themed cover by Joost Swarte and a great photograph of the newly renovated Great Reading Room of the New York Public Library.

The Outsider features book reviews on outsider artists such as Henry J. Darger, Bill Traylor and the Museum of Bad Art, but this Summer 1997 issue featured the Art of all-but-forgotten intuitive artist Pauline Simon and Nick Connell, the hermit of Torrey Pines. The Outsider is a publication of Intuit: The Center for Intuitive and Outsider Art. Book Arts Review (vol. 1, no. 1 New Series) from the Center for Book Arts in New York City includes coverage about Anderson Ranch in Colorado, Book Arts Jamboree in Cairo, New York, El Nino del Libro in Santa Barbara all summer activities. In addition, there is coverage of the Members' Exhibition, an interview with Emily Martin about her books, a calendar of exhibitions, conferences and events, opportunities and a list of book arts online.

WhiteWalls #40 (Spring 1998) has as its theme "Loose Canon" with contributions by Robert Barry and Dick Higgins, both of whom pioneered approaches to art, language, and artist books, basic themes of WhiteWalls through the years. Many of the projects in this issue are related to the archive with contributions from Marc Fischer, Rebecca Morris, some archives are essentially poetic (Barry, Higgins Nance Klehm, Stephen Lapthisophon, Mark Robbins), others quasireportorial (Dan Sutherland, Shuko Wada), yet others idiosyncratically personal (Shawn Calvert, Andreas Fischer Rebecca Morris, Marie Walz). There is a nice bibliography on archive with contributions from Kim Abeles, Michael Asher, John Baldessari, Georges Bataille, Joseph Kosuth, Rosalind Krauss, Lucy Lippard, Daniel Spoerri and Lawrence Weiner, among others. Now edited by Anthony Elins, we see that the journal is in good hands, and that this journal which is dedicated to the presentation of visual projects that explore conceptual and formal relations between language, art, and contemporary culture has found heirs to its own tradition. An important contribution! 2 issues a year for \$15.00 in the US.

Factsheet5 #64 has articles by R. Seth Friedman and Christopher about their Zine Years while bidding goodbye to Factsheet5.
