

The book is handsomely designed by Wei-Wen Chang, and is enhanced by a biographical outline, a list of exhibitions, selected public oollections, and a selected bibliography.

Lipman, Jean and Marshall, Richard. Art about Art. New York, Dutton, in assn. with the Whitney Museum of American Art, 1978. 160p., illus. (16 in color) ISBN 0-525-47502-8 \$6.95 paper

Art about Art is the catalogue of the current exhibition at the Whitney Museum of Art (through 24 September), which will subsequently travel to the North Carolina Museum of Art, UCLA, and the Portland Art Museum. It is a show not to be missed, if this book is any indication. The show takes as its theme the subject of art in art, a concept which had its origins many centuries ago, when artists "borrowed" certain motifs, figures, etc. and incorporated them into their own works. Leo Steinberg has written the fascinating introduction on the art historical antecedents of this activity. The artists of today, however, have taken this process several steps further. Instead of simply borrowing other motifs and adapting them, the modern artist will often utilize the entire painting, reworking it to make his own statement about art and art history. Whereas previous generations of artists disguised their borrowings, today's artist consciously and openly advertises his adaptations, and indeed expects the viewer to be aware of the origin of his subject. Thus we have Leonardo's Mona Lisa as seen by Warhol, Rauschenberg, Johns, Wesselmann, and Marisol; Rivers', Wesselmann's, and Ramos' interpretations of Manet's Olympia; and so on. Some artists' entire oeuvre consists of reworkings of other artists' paintings, while others such as Lichtenstein satirize their own work.

Besides the adaptations of other works, the exhibition includes pieces which have as their subject the tools and techniques of art, for instance, Warhol's Do it yourself, a statement about paint-by-numbers pictures and Jasper Johns' Painted bronze, a coffee can holding his brushes cast in bronze. Such concepts are not only interesting, but oftentimes witty and fun.

If for some reason you cannot see the show, you must read this book. An added bonus is the book cover, especially designed by Roy Lichtenstein.

Rosand, David. *Titian*. New York, Harry N. Abrams, 1978. 160p., 138 illus. (48 in color), index ISBN 0-8109-1654-1 \$25.00 cloth

Titian is the latest in Abrams' "Library of Great Painters" series, and as such as the same format as other volumes in the series. Rosand has written a concise biography, and includes a discussion of the artist's graphic work. There is also a chronology. The forty-eight color plates are accompanied by detailed iconographic, historical, and stylistic descriptions. An index and very brief "bibliographical note" round out the book.

A few words about the physical appearance of the book. T The color of many of the plates appears to be off substantially, notably, far too reddish. In such a sumptuous coffeetable book as this, this is a serious lapse. Further, all of the color plates are tipped in, and horror of horrors, several are folded and tipped in. This volume will certainly not withstand prolonged use without considerable glueing.

Tomasevic, Nebojsa. Naive Painters of Yugoslavia. Belgrade, Summerfield Press (dist. by Two Continents), 1978. 200p., illus. (mostly color) ISBN 0-8467-0467-6 \$19.95

This is not the first book on the naive painters of Yugoslavia, but it is certainly the most beautifully produced. It is a collection of thirty-six of the twentieth-century naive painters of Yugoslavia, striking for their color, wealth of imagery, and evocation of peasant life.

Tomasevic, editor-in-chief of the well-known Yugoslavian illustrated monthly *Review*, which appears in five major languages, has been a popularizer of Yugoslav painting through magazines and books. He is the author of the basic reference work, *Yugoslav Naive Art*, and a book on Ivan Generalic, which appeared in eight countries.

This book, for the general reader, is indeed a joy to behold, with the oil-on-glass technique developed by Generalic now universally used among naive painters from all of the Yugo-slavian regions. All the artists are described biographically and aesthetically, and the regions from which they come are also described with color photographs and verbal expositions.

Printed in Italy, this book has more than 100 full-color reproductions. The last part of the book is a biographical dictionary of the artists with photographs of each.



HIGHLIGHTS OF ASSOCIATED ART PUBLISHERS CONFERENCE IN CHICAGO, 13-15 OCTOBER 1978

The second annual Conference of the Associated Art Publishers will take place at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago and the Chicago Cultural Center 13-15 October. Visitors from Europe, Canada and all regions of the United States are expected to converge on Chicago, host city for a series of seminars, lectures and workshops.

Guest speakers include New York art critic, Lucy Lippard, and Museum of Modern Art librarian, Clive Phillpot. Both lectures are open to the public and will be held at the School of the Art Institute. Phillpot will keynote the Conference on Friday afternoon, 13 October, at 3:00 p.m. and Lippard will speak on Saturday, 14 October, at the same hour.

Among the seminars scheduled will be one dedicated to the new Copyright Law and its implications for artists and publishers of artists' books and publications. Featured is Tom Leavins, former director of Lawyers for the Creative Arts, who will also explore the details of incorporation. Other seminars slated include one on large scale distribution and another on the technical problems of publishing.

Chicago, a central location, was chosen largely for its well-developed small press art community, which is hosting the Conference along with The Illinois Arts Council, the School of the Art Institute of Chicago, Chicago Books, the West Hubbard Gallery, and Omnisight Site: Chicago.

In addition to the actual conference, there will be an exhibition. Art in Print: Books and Periodicals, opening

12 October. The show is a "hands-on" exhibition of publications by and about artists. It includes books and periodicals, as well as some publications about art.

If you are an artist and cannot attend the Conference, you can participate by sending in your publications for the exhibition. Since the gallery is encouraging mail orders of your publications, please include your address and price information on your work. Please include two 3 x 5 cards with your name, address, titles, and prices to be published in a catalog. The Conference intends to coordinate activities for the coming year and set the tone of the organization's schedule for 1979. 
