CENSORSHIP

Two of our readers have sent me notices about censorship of their own work in recent venues. Chicago-based Barbara Aubin's bookwork, "A Clarion Call" and a mail art piece for the October 1989 ARC Gallery show have been censored, and since the court case, City of Chicago vs. Aubin et al-Plaintiffs is onoging, we cannot write about it yet. The works cited are said to take positions "on militarism, nationalism, individual rights, the position of the Third World countries vs. the superpowers, and at least one asks the question about the proper role of our country in world affairs. This is worse than just the flag desecration on the ground or floor.

Likewise, Douglas Beube who was a Visting Artist/Teacher at Carleton College in Northfield, Minnesota during the autumn, whose sculpture incorporation a bundle of books hanging in the breeze outside the library, called Books of Knowledge Standing Up Against the Elements. Beube's work as well as several students' sculptures were also destroyed. The work was blatantly ridiculed in the school newspaper and then vandalized. The vandal later "fessed up" in an anonymous letter to the artist and to the President of the college, citing a drunken stupor for the cause of this vandalism two days before his graduation. Apologies were sent to Beube from the President, the Dean, and other people.

LOST AND FOUND

19 Superman collages attributed to Andy Warhol has been questioned by two comicbook experts who noticed that the dates 1960-61 attributed to the collages are several years before the oriignal cartoon panels used to make them appeared in print.

Art publisher, Pierre Marcand, is being sued by the Federal Trade Commission of engaging in deceptive practices by producing and selling at least 22,000 fraudulent prints attributed to well-known artists, and Dali in particular...

The brilliant high tech home of Charles and Ray Eames, built in 1949 in Pacific Palisades, California has been repaired and restored by Lucia Eames Demetrios, the Eames' only child, and may in the future be open by appointment to architects, designers and critics.

A sand mandala representing the legendary "Wheel of Time" created by a group of Tibetan monks from the Dalai Lama's Namgyal Monastery in Dharamsala, India was swept up, poured into a glass vase and then poured into Santa Monica Bay as a blessing to marine life--this after creating the "Kalachakra" over a period of 6 weeks.

Found: \$40.7 million for a 1905 Picasso, purchased recently by Walter II. Annenberg. <u>Au Lapin Agile</u>, portrays Picasso as a harlequin.

Seven metal sculptures, representing one year's labor by artist Denis O'Connor of Derby, England, were sold as scrap for \$16 by his landlord while he was on vacation. The images of a bird and a train, among others, were valued at up to \$10,400 by a Public Arts Commission official. The landlord, who siad he thought the sculptures were junk, was ordered to pay O'Connor \$6,900 damages and interest plus legal costs. O'Connor, also a college lecture, has sold more than 400 works.

Found: A new owner for the Barnes Collection in Pennsylvania is Lincoln University, a small, mostly black liberal-arts college in Oxford, PA.

MURALS

Kent Twitchell, known in Los Angeles as one of the best muralists in the country, while painting a 35-foot-tall mural of basketball legend Julius Erving as part of Philadelphia's war against graffiti, found that in Los Angeles twice in one week, gang members sprayed graffiti on his partially completed painting of Los Angeles Marathon runners on a wall besides the San Diego Freeway. Our cover artist, Creative Thing, will be one of the figures painted in that mural. The vandalism, done with silver paint by gang members, upset the artist so much that he considered stopping painting murals in Los Angeles.

Now reassured by Inglewood social service groups tha the mural would not undergo another graffiti attack, the artist is back at work oh the mural, adding figures which will number about 25 runners when it is completed before the 1990 Los Angeles Marathon on March 4, 1990. Found: A security guard and 3 other people were in custody in connection with the theft of 13 works of art valued at \$17 million from the home of Pablo Picasso's granddaughter. Marina Picasso. The four people are all current or former employees of Ms. Picasso and worked at her villa.

NEW MUSEUMS

A museum devoted to the art, films and archives of Andy Warhol will be established in an old industrial building in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, to be operated by the Carnegie Museum of Art. Scheduled opening is 1992.
