Recently released by a group of anonymous Michigan women artists, it first appeared in "Coast to Coast", a national exhibition of artists' books by women of color at the University of Michigan's Slusser Gallery. It is being distributed throughout the art community in Michigan, including museums, arts organizations, colleges and universities, media, artists, critics, and to the general public at art openings.

The book presents graphs showing the disparities between female and male coverage in art reviews of Michigan artists; a listing of fulltime faculties reflecting the gender imbalance prevalent in art departments in Michigan colleges and universities; and a comprehensive table showing gender and racial breakdowns of students, faculty, and administrators at the University of Michigan.
