EXHIBITION CATALOGS

Muntadas: Media Landscape is a catalog from the Addison Gallery of American Art which shows how Muntadas has for the last decade produced works which interpret a broad spectrum of the effects of media upon each of us and upon society as a whole with videotapes, installations and publications. 
Illegal America, an exhibition of photographs and documents of alleged activities and attitudes in art, curated by Jeanette Ingberman, is a powerful statement of the intellectual capacity of the artist to deal with the rules, the introduction of an anarchistic idea within the democratic system.

Dealing with a metaphor of life, Ingberman presents work by artists who manipulate illegality as a discourse in art. The artist, therefore, exposes himself or herself to a low vulnerable position outside the protective confines of the artistic system. So the artist is committed to deal with reality, often at dangerous risk. But the illegalities are stronger than art. Included in the show are works by Vito Acconci, Gunther Brus, Barry Bryant, Chris Burden, William Farley, John Fekner, John Giorno, GAAG, Abbie Hoffman, Sam Hsieh, Jay Jaroslav, Komar & Melamid, George Maciunas, Gordon Matta-Clark, Richard Mock, Charlotte Moorman, Hermann Nitsch, Dennis Oppenheim, Jan Van Raay, and the Real Estate Show, among others. Ingberman is director of Exit Art, a non-profit organization sponsoring unusual exhibitions, publications and special artists' projects. Russian New Wave, curated by Margarita Tupitsyn, was recently held at the SoHo International Art Center at Houston and Broadway, NYC 10013 from 4 December - 28 February 1982. This exhibition inaugurated the activities of the Contemporary Russian Art Center, with an attempt to show the most contemporary and interesting work being done both inside and outside the Soviet Union Today. Artists such as Abramov (comic drawings), Bakhchanyan (mail art collages), Chernyshov (performance), Collective Action Group, Drewchin (oils), the Gerlovins (performance, happenings and participatory), Komar/Melamid, Tupitsyn and many more.
