Moved, That Frank Hall have permission to lay a brick sidewalk on the west side of Mississippi street, between Third and Fourth streets, and that the same be done at his own expense and under the supervision of the City Civil Engineer.

Be it Resolved by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, That the Civil Engineer be, and he is hereby authorized and directed, to establish the grade of Twelfth street, from the eastern line of Tennessee street, to a point five hundred and ninety-seven (597) feet west of the western line of Tennessee street, viz.: to the west line of the city; and that he be, and is instructed, to set the proper grade-stakes for the grading of said street between the limits aforesaid.

Resolved, That Charles Post, guardian, and Alphonse Vorster, are hereby granted permission to properly grade, at their own expense, the said Twelfth street, between the limits aforesaid, in accordance with, and under the direction of the Civil Engineer.

Resolved, That the said Charles Post and Alphonse Vorster are authorized and empowered to notify the Citizen's Street Railway Company of the grade, when established by the Civil Engineer, and that they are authorized and empowered to proceed under the ordinances of the city of Indianapolis, after

Gentlemen: - The undersigned officers of the Indianapolis Home for Friendless Women, in behalf of said institution, beg leave respectfully to represent that, by an act of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, approved February 26, 1873, it was provided that in cities, in which there was, or should thereafter be, established a Home for Friendless Women, the fines and penalties assessed and collected for the breach of certain city ordinances mentioned in said act, should be applied to such homes in support of the expenses thereof. That the Indianapolis Home for Friendless Women is within the provisions of said act; and that the managers thereof, some three months after the taking effect of said act, made an application to the City Council for an order directing the City Treasurer to pay over to said Home the fines contemplated by said act, which had been assessed and collected up to that time, but the Council refused to grant such order. Whereupon the said Home, in its corporate capacity, commenced a proceeding in the Superior Court to compel the city, by mandate, to pay over to the Home the fines aforesaid; that after a protracted litigation, the Judges of the Superior Court unanimously decided that the said act of the Legislature was and is a valid exercise of legislative power, and that the Home is entitled to the fines contemplated by that act.

The undersigned would further represent that the Institution is in needy circumstances, and ought to receive, without delay, all the funds to which it is entitled, to enable it to accomplish the object of its organization; wherefore, your petitioners, in behalf of the Institution, pray that an account may be taken of all the fines that have been collected by the city since the passage of said act; and such as are contemplated by it, and that the Treasurer may be directed to pay over the same to the Institution without further delay or litigation.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES.

Mr. Madden, from the Committee on Streets and Alleys, submitted the following report:

Indianapolis, May 17, 1875.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Streets and Alleys to whom was referred sundry papers, would report as follows:

First. A motion was offered by Councilman Darnell, asking for stone crossings on the north side of First street and on Illinois street. Owing to the condition of the Treasury, your Committee recommend that no stone crossings be laid at this time.

Second. Also a motion offered by Councilman Curran, asking for stone crossing on the south side of Washington street from Cady to State street, and on Noble street from Meek street to Fletcher avenue. Your Committee would report against the passage of this motion.

Third. Also, a motion offered by Councilman Bigham, directing the Street Supervisor to cause relief from overflow of water at the crossing of State and Washington street. Your Committee would report in favor of the passage of said motion.

Fourth. Also, a motion offered by Councilman Darnell, "requiring Defrees, Morris & Co. to scrape the sand of Washington street between Noble street and State avenue, and to raise a portion of the street where sunk down, to the proper grade, and to place the requisite quantity of sand on said street in place of dirt." Your committee would recommend that the provisions of the above motion be carried out.

Fifth. A petition signed by Thomas A. Hendricks, relative to insufficient drainage at the corner of St. Clair and Tennessee street. Your Committee recommend that the petition be referred to the Civil Engineer, with instruction that the Engineer examine into the matter and report what is best to be done in the premises.

Sixth. A remonstrance was also referred to your Committee, against the passage of an ordinance for paving the west side of West street between Kentucky avenue and Merrill street. We report in favor of the prayer of the remonstrants and recommend that the ordinance be postponed.

Seventh. A remonstrance was also referred to your Committee against the improving of the sidewalks on Winston street, between Market and St. Clair street. The property holders complain of their inability to pay for such improvement at this time; and your Committee being informed that some of the property owners have improved their portion of said sidewalk, recommend that the ordinance for such improvement be postponed.

Eighth. Two remonstrances were referred to your Committee against the improvement of the first alley east of High street, between Bicking and Coburn street. Your Committee report in favor of the remonstrants and recommend that the ordinance for such improvement be postponed.

Ninth. A petition and remonstrance was also referred to your Committee, for and against the improvement of an alley in part of square 7, in Drakes addition to the City of Indianapolis. Your Committee would recommend that the ordinance be stricken from the files.

Tenth. A petition was referred to your Committee asking for the im provement of Susquehanna alley, between Michigan and North street. We report in favor of the prayer of the petitioners and recommend that the ordinance for such improvement be passed.

ORDINANCES ON SECOND READING.

General ordinance No. 22, 1875, entitled:

An ordinance confirming and approving the report of the Commissioner, concerning the opening and laying out a street, between Illinois and rennessee streets, in lots 15 and 24, Henderson's addition, and parts of lots 22 and 23, in Morrison's subdivision of Henderson's addition, and providing for the payment of damages and the collection of benefits, and making an appropriation of lands and property for the opening and laying out of such street.

Which was read the second time and ordered to be engrossed by the following vote:
