There being no complaints, on motion the Board of Equalization adjourned to meet next Monday evening at $7\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock.

Sealed proposals for the grading and graveling of Huntington or Second street and sidewalks from the Michigan Road to the west line of Mayhew's heir's addition to the city Indianapolis.

Also, for grading and graveling Huntington or Second street and sidewalks from the west line of Mayhew's heirs' addition to Brooks street.

Also, for grading and graveling Peru avenue and east sidewalk, from the northern terminus of Charles street to Davidson street.

Also, for grading and paving with brick the sidewalks of Clifford avenue from Massachusetts avenue on the north side to the west line of Ingram Fletcher's property; on the south side from Massachusetts avenue to the west line of Woodruff Place.

Also, for grading, graveling, curbing and paving the sidewalks on Fifth street from Pennsylvania to Meridian street.

Also, for grading, paving with brick, artificial stone, or asphalt, the north sidewalk of Michigan street from the west side of the U. S. Arsenal grounds to the east line of Woodruff Place, and for curbing said sidewalk with stone, and bouldering the gutters on the north side of said street between the points above named.

Also, for grading and graveling Pratt street and paving the sidewalks thereof from Delaware street to Fort Wayne avenue.

Were received, opened, read and referred to the Committee on Contracts.

Sealed proposals for building stone abutments and an iron bridge over the Canal on Walnut street, were received, opened and read.

The City Civil Engineer submitted the following report:

Indianapolis, August 9, 1875

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—I have advertised for the construction of a sixty foot bridge on Walnut street, crossing the canal, and the proposals for building the same were received this evening.

The plat book shows the street to be sixty feet wide, but upon examination of the ground, I find that there is a jog in the street, making the street but fifty feet wide on one side, while it is sixty feet on the other.

The width of the bridge will, therefore, have to be changed from sixty to fifty feet, and I would recommend that the same be readvertised, and the proprosals which were received this evening rejected.

The City Civil Engineer submitted the following report:

Indianapolis, August 9, 1875.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—I have advertised as per your orders, for proposals for filling up the breaks in the new channel of Fall Creek, and the same are to be received this evening.

The late flood came in the meantime, and washed out perhaps as much more of the remaining embankments as the former floods.

I could not take any levels as the water was too high, and it is impossible for contractors to bid understandingly upon said work.

I would suggest that you reject the present bids for said work, and let the whole matter lay over until I am able to report the present condition of the channel and make profile of same, which I expect to be able to do this week, the water permitting.

Mr. Reed presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, August 9, 1875.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—Your petitioners respectfully show that by the recent floods, the dyke or south bank of the new channel of Fall Creek, where it was diverted from its former course directly to White river, has been mostly, if not wholly cut out and washed away; that this embankment or dyke, up to the time of its destruction, was only ten (10) feet in width, and it is not thought strange it gave way under the great pressure of the late rise.

Now, your petitioners respectfully suggest that a bank or dyke of ten feet in width is too narrow and insufficient to withstand a pressure of even less proportions than the late one; that by every breakage, the city is put to great expense in damage to streets and culverts, affected by the water so escaping. Your petitioners therefore pray that in the rebuilding of this dyke or south bank, it be made forty feet in width instead of ten. They are sustained in this by Samuel J. Patterson, Esq., the owner of the land upon which the present or late bank and channel were situated. Mr. Patterson will allow the use of a strip thirty feet south of the present ten without cost to the city, on the event the embankment is made to cover the whole forty feet in width, and made of uniform height and level throughout its extent.

A dyke of this width, and perhaps a few inches higher than the late one, could not be seriously hurt by any sudden rise, and a partial rupture would be unlikely to effect permanent harm before assistance could be rendered. The dirt required for the enlarged dyke can be obtained without cost to the city, out of the present bed of the creek, thereby deepening it to the river.

INDIANAPOLIS, August 9, 1875.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—I have examined the bridges on the line of Pogues Run from its mouth to Clifford avenue and herewith report the extent of damages to same caused by the flood:

FIRST.

The Morris street bridge has been entirely destroyed and cannot be repaired. I would recommend the erection of an iron bridge on said street, and the raising of the street several feet, so as to give the water more of an out-let.

SECOND.

The Mississippi street culvert is all aright, and only needs to be protected with cinders at the east end.

THIRD.

The iron bridge on Tennesseee street is all right.

FOURTH.

The Eddy street culvert is all right and only requires to be protected with cinders and stone at the center pier of the east end.

FIFTH.

The Illinois street bridge is almost entirely destroyed, and I would recommend that it be torn down and replaced by an iron bridge.

SIXTH.

The South street culvert has caved in at the north end, for about ten feet of each arch, and one pier needs repairing on the south end. I would recommed that this culvert be repaired and protected with cinders.

SEVENTH.

The three east end arches on the East street culvert has caved in for about fifteen feet, and I would recommend that the balance of the culvert be taken down and an iron bridge erected in its place.

EIGHTH.

The arches of the Washington street culvert has sunk about four inches at both ends and needs to be repaired and protected with cinders.

I noticed that at this culvert the water was two and a half feet higher at the north end than it was at the south end, causing the whole neighborhood to be covered with water. This was caused by the arches being to small and not having sufficient capacity to carry the water through. The same trouble will be experienced with this culvert every time there is high water, and I would therefore recommend the erection of an iron bridge in its place.

NINTH.

The wooden bridge on New York street requires to be repaired at once. This work can be done by the Street Commissioner.

TENTH

About half of the bridge on Michigan street has caved in at the north end, and I would recommend that the balance of the bridge be taken down and an iron bridge erected in its stead, and the grade of the bridge raised.

ELEVENTH.

The Clifford avenue culvert is entirely destroyed, and I would recommend that an iron bridge be erected in its place.

The flood of 1866 brought down a large number of trees and rubbish, which obstructed the culverts to such an extent that the water appeared much higher than it actually was.

The bed of Pogues Run was entirely unobstructed during the late flood, which gave the water a free passage Had it been choaked up as it was in 1866, it is my opinion the water would have reached at least from one to two feet higher than it did.

We may expect a much larger quantity of water in Pogues Run than we have ever had yet. Every year the country along its route becomes more settled and better drained, and must of necessity increase the amount of water flowing into the Run.

It has been clearly indicated that arched culverts are great obstructions, because they occupy too much space, and are too easily choked up. For these reasons I would recommend that iron bridges be erected in their places whenever it is possible to do so.

If you repair those culverts that are damaged, and build new ones in place of those destroyed, it will take at least four years for them to become solid and compact, and if another flood should come on them while they are fresh, and the new earth settling and pressing them down from the top, they will again be destroyed. This was the trouble with some of the culverts at the time of the late flood.

The bed of the Run should be lowered about two feet, and I would recommend that the bottom be planked at different places through the center of the city in order that it may be more easily cleaned and at less expense. Dirt will be washed down from time to time, and it will be necessary to clean it out every year.

I would suggest that the Street Commissioner be instructed to build temporary bridges on those streets where the old ones have been destroyed, so that the streets can be used until such time as new bridges can be erected, and also that the City Marshal be instructed to notify the property owners along the line of Pogues Run, who are the owners of lumber and wood yards located thereon, to have the same protected with walls or tight fences, the same to reach above high water point, in order to prevent material from being washed into the stream and obstructing and choking up the mouths of the culverts.

Whereas, The Junction Railroad and the Panhandle Railroad Company have erected trestle work in the bed of Pogues Run; and

Whereas, Such trestle work has caused great damage from overflow of said Pogues Run; therefore,

Moved, That the City Attorney examine into the matter and report what steps are necessary to cause said railroads to remove such trestle work and raise their tracks

Which report, petition and motion were referred to a Joint Committee consisting of the Committee on Streets and Alleys, the Committee on Bridges, City Civil Engineer and City Attorney, with instructions to report next Monday night.

Whereas, It appears that several of the stone arches recently built over Pogues Run have been washed out or so injured as to require them to be rebuilt or replaced by other structures; therefore,

And that said City Civil Engineer have power to send for persons and papers, and to call on experts or others to aid them in a full investigation of the subject, with a view to the prosecution of any parties who may be found responsiblee for said losses

Indianapolis, August 8, 1875.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—I would recommend that you authorize me to have water scales put up on the abutments of the bridges on White River, which will indicate the hight. of the water at the various points. These scales will only be painted boards with red and white figures, and the cost of them will be very small.

I would also suggest the importance of recommending to the towns above us, such as Noblesville, Anderson, Muncie and others, to have similar scales put on their bridges, and to report to us what point on these scales was reached by the late flood at their respective places. This would be a great assistance to us at this point in the event of another flood, for we could telegraph to the places mentioned and obtain the numbers that the water has reached at each town, and thereby give us control of the river and indicate to us whenever any danger is apprehended from an overflow, and give us time to prepare to meet it.

Indianapolis, August 9, 1875.

To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Your petitioner would respectfully represent to your honorable body that he is a tenant of the city, occupying that part of the Tomlinson estate known as 32 East Ohio street, paying for the same a rental of \$360.00 per year; that he has occupied the premises for the past four years, and that he has paid his rent promptly on the first day of each month, in advance, ever since the property came into the possession of the city; that about the first of last March the coal house hitherto attached to the premises was closed by Dr. Tomlinson, since which time there has been no coal house nor anything in lieu of one that your petitioner could use; that he is now and has been since the said first day of March, dependent on a neighbor for the use of a privy for himself and family, there being none belonging to the premises, the one hitherto belonging to the premises being on the portion of the said Tomlinson estate leased by Drs. Waterman & VanVerhis.

Your petitioner has from time to time stated these facts to the City Treasurer, and has continued to pay the full amount of his rent under the expectation that the city would provide such necessary adjuncts to the property as are customary and of righ belong thereto, and that for want of these necessaries himself and family have suffered great inconvenience.

Your petitioner would further state that in the forepart of July, by direction of Mr. Stuckmeyer (as they claimed), two boys, working as carpenters, came and fixed at a few things that needed repairs, including a new roof on the rear part of the

house, a man who appeared to be the boss of the two boys helping them on the roof one day; that the boys finished and went away on July 16th, leaving one window with a new sash and no glass, which window has as yet remained oper and proved a source of great annoyance during the late stormy weather. That about the first of August, after the house had been in a state of chaos ever since the advent of the carpenters, some plasterers came and made an expeditious and workmanlike job of repairing the plaster, but in so doing a large amount of old plaster was removed which your petitioner had to clear out and dispose of at his own expense, and that in so removing the plaster the papering of several rooms was ruined; that the said paper was put on by your petitioner at his own expense, and was in the main yet in good repair, but the rooms are not now in a respectable condition to live in.

Your petitioner has twice called upon Mr. Stuckmeyer and urged him to have the repairs completed, but so far has got nothing but a promise, yet unfulfilled, for his pains.

In consideration of the above cited facts, your petitioner prays your honorable body that he be rleeased from paying his rent for the month of August, and until such a farther time as the needful repairs are completed.

Your petitioner would also state that if the property is put in reasonable repair such as painting and papering, and the building of the necessary out buildings, he will engage to lease the premises for three or five years, at the said rental of \$360 per year, and he will keep the premises in good repair at his own expense during the term of the lease.

Gentlemen:—Having learned that an ordinance is about to be introduced for the repairing or replacing of the Delaware street block pavement, we beg leave to call your attention to the fact that the city of Cleveland, some six years ago, laid a block pavement of Elmwood, several miles in length, prepared after the Thilmany process, which is found to be in a perfect state of preservation at the present time.

This pavement, thus prepared, has given such satisfaction to the authorities of Cleaveland that every year since that time, from five to six miles of the same pavement have been laid in the city.

Indianapolis, August 9, 1875.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, owners of real estate upon Delaware street between Massachusetts avenue and Washington street would respectfully remonstrate against the passage of the ordinance introduced on the 19th of July, which provides that this street be macadamized between said limits, at the expense of the owners of adjoining property.

It is now just five years since a solid road bed of screened river gravel, almost two feet deep, was taken from this street at great expense and labor, and in its place the present wooden pavement put down, also at great expense. The graveled street was at that time, the most solid and permanent roadway in the city, and needed, to make it a first class street, only the bouldering of the gutters, and the removal, by slight fills, of the small inequalities of the surface.

But over the remonstrance of almost every real estate owner on this portion of the street, the ordinance was passed, and the block pavement forced upon us. This latter pavement was, at that time, opposed because it was perishable, unfit for heavy travel, and, withal, very expensive. The worst apprehensions have been more than realized. It has rotted, it is worn into holes; it is in a wretched condition; it is an unhealthy nuisance; it is avoided by teams, and instead of being an improvement it is a damage to every one of ns.

Many property holders regarded its construction as unwise, and an outrage upon their rights. The gravel with which they had paved Delaware street, but a tew years before at great expense, was removed one square east to Alabama street, where it now lies, forming a roadway vastly superior to Delaware street. The city has paid us not one cent for the gravel thus wrongfully taken from us and by arbitrary power, has held it from that day to this.

The putting down of this block pavement was an experiment here, of which we were the victims. Subscriptions were taken up in different parts of the city to buy off remonstrants and silence opposition. Thousands of dollars were expended or promised in this manner, to fasten this outrage upon us. And now it is proposed to make another experiment. It is now proposed, at our expense, to find out whether a macadamized street will answer public purposes, or like the Nicholson pavement, prove to be a signal failure.

We protest against being made the victims of another experiment. If it must be made let those who are anxious to make it have it done in front of their own property. We apprehend that they have very little within the the limits of the city.

In other cities where these experiments are made, they are made in front of public property or at the public expense, and are not saddled upon individuals. No other mode is just and fair.

It is a serious question whether the macadamized street will answer the purposes required. It has been in many places condemed and totally disused. We have tried it in this city and abandoned it. Washington street was macadamized by the national government in the most perfect manner, out of the best material the country affords, and after some years use, it was condemned and covered up with the present surface of boulders.

Whether there is any material now within reach with which to make macadamized roads that will not rapidly wear into dust and ruts is to be tried, and ought to be tested carefully and long enough to make a thorough experiment before it is adopted. The city alone can do this at its own expense, and we respectfully suggest that it cannot be done too soon. Before extensive and costly improvements are made in the future, tests of the various kinds of roadways should be made.

At present, Delaware street can be repaired, the worn places can be renewed and a roadway twenty-five or thirty feet wide in the center can be put in with new blocks which will last until some permanent improvement can be made with safety. This street is not now ready for another roadway. It is not supplied with water pipes and sewerage, and whatever is put down now must very soon be torn up in order to make these improvements. All disturbances of the surface made for these purposes

create irregularities which can never be removed. The ground should be allowed to settle about these substructures before the final work on the surface is done. And for the present the street should be repaired until these works are properly made.

We therefore earnestly protest against the macadamizing this street, and ask that the present pavement be repaired as hereinbefore suggested, at the expense of the city.

The undersigned would respectfully represent that he is the owner of two hundred and twenty-eight feet of ground south side of Michigan street, east of State avenue and fronting Woodruff Place at the point where said Michigan street is being improved, which improvement it will be remembered interferred with the course of the creek to the extent that it turned all the water from the channel on to private property; to remedy this, 'your officers ordered a wooden culvert or box put in a part of the way, just on the south line of the street; which box, if it had temporarily answered the purpose, would have been of serious injury to the adjoining property; but it has proven utterly insufficient for the purpose, is now broken in and filled up, and has thrown the waters of the creek, including all the sewerage filth from the State Reformatory, over and through private property; against which we have no remedy except the proper and necessary action of your body

The undersigned would further respectfully represent that the injunction he obtained some months ago against the filling of the channel and diverting the course of water of the creek at that point, was dismissed by the court, during my absence by consent of attorney, on mistaken information; which injunction I shall be compelled to renew, however reluctly on my part, if proper measures are not adopted to protect the interests of much valuable property in that neighborhood.

The improvement of Michigan street is an expensive one at that point, which assessment the property owners will cheerfully pay if protected; otherwise they will be compelled to insist in all legall ways.

As owners of property in the locality referred to by Mr. Ridenour, we endorse the facts as stated, and join our petition for relief in the manner indicated by your Engineer as being the only practical remedy we know of.

Moved, That the bond of A. Naltner, for the removal of garbage from the city under the ordinance past by this Council, be, and the same is approved, and that the said Naltner be awarded the contract.

Moved, That the Committee on Fire Department place an alarm gong in the Central Station House, the same as used by the chief and assistants.

Which was referred to the Committee on Fire Department.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be and is hereby directed to fill the chuck holes on Shelby etreet.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That the City Civil Engineer be and is hereby directed to examine the gutters on the south side of Cedar street between Fletcher avenue and Dillon street;

also, the north side of English avenue from Cedar street to Dillon street, and report to this Council, the work necessary to be done to relieve the citizens along the lines named.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be directed to put a culvert across Reid street so as drain Prospect street, east of Reed street.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That Lin Atkinson be allowed to erect a wooden veranda in front of his grocery on the corner of Virginia avenue and South street; the same to be similar to the one in front of the Academy of Music.

Which was not adopted.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That John Schley and Henry Reisner be allowed to grade and pave with brick, the sidewalks in front of their property according to stakes to be set by the City Civil Engineer; said work to be done at their own expense.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, Thrt the City Marshal notify all persons having well on the sidewalks in front of their property, to construct proper drains from the same for the waste water as it keeps gutters continually wet and unhealthy.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following resolution:

Resolved, That the owners of the following described real estate, to-wit: the second lot north-west of Dougherty street, on the south-west side of Virginia avenue.

(belongs to Capis), part of the lot on the south-west corner of Elk and Dillon streets; also, 382 and 383 in Fletcher et al.'s sub-division of out-lot No. 98; also, lot 22 in block No. 3, in Hubbard's, Martindale's and others south-east addition of the city of Indianapolis, be, and they are hereby required to fill or drain the same, as, in the opinion of this Council, there is a hole or excavation thereon, in which water has or may become so stagnant or noxious as to be a nuisance and injurious to the health and comfort of said and of the inhabitants thereof, and that the Street Commissioner be, and he is hereby required to notify the owners thereof, as provided by an ordinance passed April 28, 1866, entitled: "An ordinance providing for the drainage and filling up of ponds, excavations and holes, and prescribing penalties for the failure to fill up or drain the same," and that in case of the failure of the owners thereof to fill or drain the same, the Street Commissioner proceed to fill or drain the said hole or excavation as provided by said ordinance: Provided, that the cost thereof shall not exceed ten per cent. of the value of the aforesaid real estate, as assessed upon the tax duplicate for city purposes.

Mr. Thalman offered the following motion:

Moved, That the Committee on Sellars Farm be directed to locate a new place for Bergman & Burk's establishment on said farm, part of their present location having been washed away by the recent flood.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That Jacob Altenberger have permission to gravel the sidewalk in front of his property on Blake street, between Washington and New York street.

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be directed to clean out and put in order the gutters corner of Missouri and North streets; also, to fill the chuck holes on New York street and Indiana avenue, west of Mississippi street.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That Potomac alley between Mississippi and Blackford streets be named West Court street, and the street running south from the National road along the arm of the canal to its southern terminus be named Geisendorffstreet, it being on a line of said street, and that the City Assessor be directed to note same on the plat book.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion :

Moved, That the City Civil Engineer be instructed to examine the culvert crossing Market street between the Canal and Mississippi street, and report to Council what should be done to relieve the overflow of water at that point; also, to survey New York street, between Blake and Minerva, and report if the houses on the north side of New York street are not built out in said street; also, to report if California street near Vermont street, and Vermont west of West street, cannot be made to drain west; also, to set grade stakes in the first alley north of Indiana avenue, between California and West street, so the street Commissioner can make the proper fill to drain the same.

Which was adopted.

Dr. Ward presented the following petition and motion:

Indianapolis, August 9, 1875.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—Permit me to call your attention to the condition of Charles street between St. Clair street and Massachusetts avenue, in said city. The grade of said street is so low that water remains settled there continually, and did prior to the recent heavy rains. The water soon becomes green and stagnant, and the citizens who live on said street will be compelled to remove from there if some steps are

not taken to cause the water to pass away. Some of the citizens are already sick, and it is the opinion of physicians who attend the families there, that many more will become sick if said water is not removed. As the owner of lots 4, 5 and 6, in said street, I respectfully request that your honorable body cause some steps to be taken. Raise the grade so as to cause the water to pass away.

Moved, That the above communication be referred to the City Civil Engineer, with instructions to report to this Council, the best practicable plan to get rid of the water complained of.

Also, the following remonstrance:

Indianapolis, August 9, 1875.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—We, the undersigned, owners of property fronting on the first alley east of Charles street, extending from St. Clair street to John street, would respectfully remonstrate against the ordinance for improving of said alley, pending before your honorable body, for the reason that we are not now able to pay for said improvement.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys with the ordinance.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner take up the boulders in the gutters on the east side of New Jersey street near St. Clair street, and place sufficient sand under them to raise said gutter to a heighth that will carry off the water at that point; said work to be done under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

Moved, That the Street Commissioner under the direction of the City Civil Engineer, change the grade of the gutters of North street at the intersection of Delaware, so as to prevent the water from accumulating and standing on Delaware street at that point.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys and City Civil Engineer, with power to act.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That the City Marshal notify the Peru Railroad Company to place cement tile drain in the gutters under their railroad tracks on Massachusetts avenue; said tile drain to be of sufficient capacity to carry of the water at that point; said work to be done within ten days and to the satisfaction of the City Civil Engineer, and in case the company fail to do the work, the Street Commissioner shall do the same and collect the expense thereof from the Company.

Which was adopted.

On motion, the Council adjourned.
