Gentlemen :-- Your petitioner would respectfully represent to your honorable body that heretofore, to-wit: On or about the 3d day of January, A. D., 1876, he contracted with the said city for the widening and deepening of the State Ditch from the intersection of Hill avenue and Tenth street, in said city, to the north line of the State Fair Grounds. By the provision of said contract your petitioner was to have all the materials coming out of said ditch. So much of said contract as referred to that portion of the ditch east of Central avenue was afterwards rescinded by the contracting parties. But your petitioner would represent that as to the material coming out of that portion of said ditch lying within the limits of the State Fair Grounds he was prevented from removing from said State Fair Grounds by order of the State Board, which orders and notices are filed herewith and made a part hereof. That said materials so enjoined were reasonably worth the sum of five hundred dollars. Your petitioner would further represent that by order of the City Civil Engineer he filled and covered over the tunnel at the intersection of Alabama street and the State Ditch, four hundred and ninety (490)

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loads af dirt, which work was reasonably worth sixty-nine dollars. Wherefore, your petitioner would pray that he be allowed by said city the sum of five hundred and sixty-nine dollars for the materials that he was prohibited from removing from the State Fair Grounds and for the covering of said tunnel as aforesaid.

Mr. Darnell moved to amend by instructing the Street Commissioner to use the culvert or crossing now in use in front of the building occupied by the No. 8 Hose Reel House.

The motion as amended was then adopted.

By consent, Mr. Webster, from the Committee on Accounts and Claims, submitted the following report :

Indianapolis, October 23, 1876.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen :---Your Committee on Accounts and Claims, to which was referred sundry petitions, etc., have examined the same and report as follows :

First—Is a petition from Wm. J. Gillespie, stating that, in making out his assessment list, he made an error of \$3,000, and asks your honorable body to refund the tax on said \$3,000. Mr. Gillespie having made a mistake simply in the law and not in fact, he can not claim as matter of right to have the correction made, but it would be in the power of the Common Council to permit such correction to be made, and it is for your honorable body to decide whether it is not your duty to permit such correction or rebate. We therefore submit the matter without any recommendation.

Second—Is a petition from William F. Slater, in which he represents that in the year 1872, in the month of January, he was listed for city taxes; that about April 1st he moved to Illinois. He again returned to Indianapolis and was listed for taxes in April, 1875, and upon paying such tax, he found that the tax of 1872, with penalty and interest, was charged against him. The

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petitioner asks your honorable body to relieve him from the tax of 1872, as he lost his residence early in the year. Your committee knows no reason why the prayer of the petitioner should be granted, and therefore recommend it be not granted.

Third.—Is a petition from John E. Foudray, John H. Vajen and Dan Martin, claiming damages on account of the change of the channel of Fall Creek, which petition your committee recommend be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and City Attorney.

Fourth—Is a petition from John G. Blake, asking payment for a horse which was injured (and afterwards died) on the Delaware street bridge. Your committee recommend that the petition be referred to the above named committee.

Fifth—Is a petition from S. J. Mitchell, asking payment for damages of horse, having been injured, as he alleges, through the negligence of the city's agents. Your committee recommend that the petition be referred to the above named committee.

Sixth—Is a motion that F. Rauschaupt be relieved of the assessment against his property on account of the Second street sewer. Your committee recommend that the subject be referred to the Committee on Judiciary for their consideration and report at an early day.
