# REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,

Monday, November 6th, 1876—7 o'clock P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

The proceedings of the regular session, held October 30th, 1876, were read and approved.

#### REPORTS FROM CITY OFFICERS.

The City Civil Engineer submitted the following report:

Indianapolis, November 6, 1876.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—I would respectfully call your attention to the fact that in many cases where excavations are made in the streets by the Indianapolis Water Works Co. and Indianapolis Gas Light and Coke Co. the repairs to the streets are never complete, and it is impossible in all cases to locate the responsibility for such neglect. I would recommend that this matter be referred to the City Attorney, with instructions to report an ordinance requiring the aforesaid companies to notify the City Civil Engineer when and where they design excavating for the purpose of laying mains or private connections.

#### SECOND.

I would recommend that the City Civil Engineer be instructed to build a catch basin at the north-west corner of Tennessee and Ray streets, one being necessary at that point for proper drainage.

#### THIRD.

The City has been at considerable expense repairing the gas-lamps and fixtures at the South Illinois Street Tunnel and at the old White River Bridge, and I would recommend that the Chief of Police be instructed to require special vigilance on the part of patrolmen at those points, and secure the arrest of parties committing the depredations mentioned.

The Mayor presented the following communication:

Indianapolis, November 6, 1876.

To the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—To the end that the coming election shall be peaceful and fair, the undersigned, charged, by reason of their respective offices, with the duty of preserving the peace, have agreed upon the following as calculated to produce such results in the city of Indianapolis:

We warn all repeaters and imported voters that fraudulent voting is a felony punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary, and the law will be promptly and rigidly enforced.

The police force of the city, and any deputies that may be appointed by the Sheriff of Marion county, shall preserve the peace and shall not in any way interfere in the election beyond casting their own votes.

The approach to the polls and the space around the same shall be kept open so that the voters can conveniently approach the polls.

At the voting places south of Washington street the Republican challengers shall have the closed side of the chute, and at the voting places north of

Washington street the Democratic challengers shall have the closed side of the chute.

The Sheriff of Marion county shall appoint deputies not exceeding five in number for each voting place in the city, and the Board of Police a like number of policemen, to be at the voting places throughout the day to preserve the peace, but take no part in the election.

From law abiding citizens there shall be carefully chosen fifty by the Governor and fifty by the Mayor, to be under their joint supervision and to be officered by the Sheriff and Chief of Police as a reserve force, to remain together at such place as the Governor and Mayor may designate, and in case of any outbreak the Governor and Mayor will join in ordering them to the locality to suppress the same.

While we feel called upon, as officers charged with the preservation of the peace, to take these precautions, we confidently rely upon the good judgment and law-abiding sense of our citizens as a still higher security, and that the employment of these forces will not be required, and that we will have a fair election; no fraudulent vote cast, no drop of blood-shed, not a blow struck, not an angry word spoken, and then let the result be what it may, all will cheerfully acquiese in the voice of the people as spoken by the ballot.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—At your meeting of October 2d, I petitioned your honorable body to take a certain petition, which was laid before you about eight months ago, away from the Committee on Opening Streets and Alleys, to which it had been referred, and to refer it to some other committee, so that action might be taken on it. Your honorable body then instructed the said committee on Opening Streets and Alleys, to report at your next meeting. It seems, however, that the said committee paid no attention to the instruction, inasmuch as it has not reported yet, though you have had several meetings since. Your petitioner therefore repeats his request to refer the matter to some other committee, from which he may reasonably hope that something will be done.

Moved, That the Chief Fire Engineer be, and is, hereby instructed to remove the fire alarm box now in the Council Chamber to the Central Station House.

Mr. Adams offered the following motion:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be, and is, hereby directed to repair Hill avenue where the same is impassible.
