CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,

Monday, November 13th, 1876—7 o'clock P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

The proceedings of the regular session, held November 6th, 1876, were read and approved.

Mr. Bugbee, from the Committee on Contracts, submitted the following report:

Indianapolis, November 6, 1876.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Contracts, to which was referred the bids presented to Council October 30, 1876, for grading and graveling Japan or East street, from Morris to Nebraska streets, and the sidewalks thereon where not already improved, have examined the same and find them to be as follows:

J. G. Sickler & Co., 48½ cents per lineal foot front on each side.

James Mahoney, 44 cents per lineal foot front on the east side.

30 cents per lineal foot front on the west side.

Irwin & Hanna, 37 cents per lineal foot front on each side where the side-walks are not already improved, and 31 cents per front foot on each side where the sidewalks are improved.

Fred Gansberg, 35 cents per front foot on the east side.
29 cents per front foot on the west side.

Fred Gansberg being the lowest and best bidder, your committee recommend that he be awarded the contract.

Gentlemen:—I was directed to examine and devise means for drawing off the surface water that stands in the gutters at the crossing of Davidson and North streets. I have examined the point referred to, and would recommend that the Street Commissioner be instructed to clean the east gutter on Davidson street, between St. Clair and Ohio streets, and put in culverts at the street crossings where needed along the east side of said street.

SECOND.

I was directed to report whether the drainage pipe under the J. M. & I. R. R. tracks, on Madison avenue, is sufficient to carry off the water. The Street Commissioner has washed out the pipes, and if 40 or 50 loads of gravel are put on the street at that point, in order to raise the street and force the water

.nto the gutters, I think the pipe will prove sufficiently large to carry off the water.

INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCES.

Mr. Bugbee introduced special ordinance No. 124, 1876, entitled:

An ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp-posts, etc., on Broadway street, between Seventh and Eighth streets.

Which was read the first time.

Also, special ordinance No. 125, 1876, entitled:

An ordinance to grade and gravel Clifford avenue, between Massachusetts avenue and the east side of Woodruff Place.

Which was read the first time.

Also, special ordinance No. 126, 1876, entitled:

An ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp-posts, etc., on Bellefontaine street, between Home avenue and Tinker street.

Which was read the first time.

Also, special ordinance No. 127, 1876, entitled:

An ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp-posts, etc., on Peru street, between Home avenue and Tinker street.

Which was read the first time

Mr. Adams introduced special ordinance No. 128, 1876, entitled:

An ordinance to provide for grading and graveling the first alley west of Ash street, running from the first alley north of Christian avenue to the second alley north of Christian avenue.

Mr. Craft presented the following remonstrance:

ROLL CALL.

. Mr. Case offered the following motion :

Moved, That Matthew McCabe have permission to curb with stone the gutter in front of his property, Nos. 5, 7, and 11 English avenue; the same to be done within sixty days and at his own expense, and the City Engineer is hereby ordered to set the proper grade stakes.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Craft offered the following motion:

Moved, That Drs. Gaston and Van Vorhis be, and is, hereby granted permission to bowlder the gutter in front of their block on the corner of New York and Delaware streets; the same to be done at their own expense, and under the direction of the Civil Engineer.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be, and is, hereby instructed to move the curb, repair the gutter, and lay the city's portion of the brick sidewalk at the northwest corner of New York and Delaware streets; the same to be done under the direction of the Civil Engineer.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Izor offered the following motion:

Moved, That William Show, Market Master for the East Market, be, and is, hereby authorized and empowered to do and perform all the duties heretofore done and performed by the City Sealer of Weights and Measures at the East Market.

Mr. Thomas moved to amend the above motion by inserting, "Wood Measurer at the West Market."

Which motion, together with the amendment offered, were referred to the Committee on Markets and City Attorney.

Mr. Ransdell offered the following motion:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be instructed to fill up the chuck-holes on Illinois street, between Vermont and Michigan street, with good river or creek gravel.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Craft offered the following motion:

Moved, That the Committee on Sewers be instructed to examine the sewer traps now in use, and report as to whether the said traps are not a nuisance.

Which was laid on the table.

' Mr. Schmidt offered the following motion:

Moved, That R. M. Riner have permission to pave the sidewalk in front of his property, on the corner of Vermont and Railroad streets, at his own expense; to be done within thirty days. Also, that the said Riner be allowed to make connection with the Railroad street drain, to drain off waste water, for which permission no fee shall be charged. Such work to be done according to stakes to be set by the City Civil Engineer, who is hereby directed to set the same.

Mr. Thalman moved to amend by striking out all that part of said motion in relation to exempting him from the payment of a fee.

Which amendment was adopted.

The original motion, as amended, was then adopted.

Dr. Stratford offered the following motion:

Moved, That the City Civil Engineer is directed to notify the contractor who has the contract of grading and graveling the first alley east of East street, from McCarty street to the first alley north of Buchanan street, that unless he proceeds with the work that his time will not be extended.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner is hereby directed to replace the bowlders at the end of the alley between Virginia avenue and Elm street, at its intersection with Pine street.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following remonstrance:

Indianapolis, November 13, 1876.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—We, the undersigned, property owners residing on the line of the first alley east of Wright street, from Dougherty street to the first alley south of Coburn street, respectfully remonstrate against the passage of an ordinance for improving the same, for the reason that some of the owners are not able to pay for the improvement and support their families during the winter.

Davis Milner, 110 feet; Thomas Cottrell, 110 feet; John Curran, 110 feet.

Gentlemen:—It will be noticed that my name appears on a petition to improve said alley, which was, I presume, presented to the Council sometime early in the fall. I now remonstrate against the same for the following reasons:

First. That the contemplated improvement at this time, crossing, as it does, the alley running east and west, which, for several squares, is not graded and graveled, would only fill up one mud-hole by making two more a great deal worse on the alley not improved.

Second. To undertake the improvement of both alleys so late in the seaon, and in view of bad weather, would be too much of a job for contractors to complete in time, and for the property holders, who have to foot the bills It will not do to improve one without the other, and both cannot be paid for by us this winter.

Gentlemen:—Your petitioner would represent that in the year 1873, I purchased, at a tax sale, lot 104 in Alvord's sub-division of Butler & Fletcher's addition, which was owned by the Trustees of the Evangelical Association of North America. The parties, who are trustees of a church, claim exemption, which exemption is legal, and I therefore petition your honorable body to refund to me eleven dollars.

Mr. A. L. Wright offered the following motion:

Moved, That the City Treasurer be, and he is, hereby directed to tender the amounts assessed as damages to property owners for widening and straightening Winston street, between Walnut and St. Clair streets, and that he proceed immediately to collect the benefits assessed on the same street.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Adams offered the following motion:

Moved, That Mr. W. C. Shortridge be, and is, hereby granted sixty days further time in which to complete his improvement for grading and graveling the altey in the rear of his property on North Pennsylvania street.

Which motion was adopted.

Also, the following motion:

Moved, That the questions of opening and extending Rohampton and Bellefontaine streets, which was referred to the Committee on Opening and Laying Out of Streets and Alleys, which committee having failed to report on the same; therefore,

Moved, That said motion be, and is, hereby recalled from said committee, and referred to the City Attorney, with instructions to report on the same at next regular meeting of the Council.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Darnell offered the following motion:

Moved, That the special committee appointed by this Council to investigate the accounts of ex-Chief Fire Engineer Fitchey, be ordered to report to this Council two weeks from to night.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Ransdell offered the following motion:

Moved, That Wm. Pfaffin have permission to build a wooden bridge over the gutter on Indiana avenue, in front of his business block; the same to be done under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

Which was adopted.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES.

Mr. Thalman, from Committee on Streets and Alleys, submitted the following report:

Indianapolis, November 13, 1876.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Streets and Alleys, to whom was referred a multitude of papers, respectfully report as follows:

First—A motion that the Street Commissioner put down stone crossings across Walnut street, at the crossing of East street. We recommend that the motion be concurred in.

Second—A similiar motion to put down stone crossings on Massachusetts avenue, across New York street, on the east side. We recommend this be also concurred in.

Third—A number of motions requesting the Street Commissioner to fill chuck-holes on the following streets:

New Jersey street, between Ohio and New York streets.

Prospect street.

South Meridian street, from McCarty to Morris streets.

Elm street, between Pine and Cedar streets.

Alabama street, between Washington and New York streets.

Alley between Peru street and the I. P. & C. R. R. track, from Home and Christian avenues.

We recommend that the Street Commissioner be directed to examine said streets and alleys, and put the same in a passable condition by making any repairs that are necessary, provided they are improved streets. Unimproved streets, that are in a dangerous and filthy condition, we recommend he report to Council, and that the Council pass ordinances improving them.

Fourth—Are several motions for cleaning and repairing gutters. We recommend that the Street Commissioner's attention be called to the following places, and that he be directed to clean and repair where needed:

Illinois street, in front of Renche's grocery, between Louisiana and South street.

On State and Ray streets, in Indianola.

Morris street, at intersection of Pennsylvania and Meridian streets.

Tennessee street, from McCarty to Ray streets.

Fifth—Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to repair the bowldered street in front of Mr. Maloney's property on South Illinois street, near Pogues Run Bridge. We recommend that the Street Commissioner be directed to do the work.

Sixth—Is a motion that the Street Commissioner pave the city's portion on corner of Meridian and Morris streets. We recommend to concur in the motion.

Seventh—That D. Mussman be permitted to put in a pair of scales on South Meridian street, in front of No. 544. We recommend that permission be granted, subject to removal by order of Common Council at any time.

Eighth—That the Street Commissioner put down wooden culverts across ditches at crossing of Lincoln avenue and Yandes street. We recommend to concur.

Ninth—Is a motion that the I. C. & L. R. R. Co. have permission to erect six telegraph poles on Fletcher avenue, between Dillon and Pine streets. We recommend that permission be granted, provided they are located so as not to obstruct the gutters or streets, and by consent of property owners in front of whose premises they propose to erect them.

Tenth—Is a report from the Civil Engineer requesting some action as to removing fallen leaves from gutters, to prevent choking up drain pipes and catch-basins. We recommend that the Street Commissioner look after the matter.

Eleventh—Is a petition from Christ. Gampf, setting forth that an error was made by the City Commissioners in opening and extending an alley running from East to Liberty streets, between Court and Market streets. We have examined the matter, and would recommend that the petition be referred to the City Commissioners and City Attorney, with instructions to carry out the prayer of the petitioner and make "crooked things straight."

Mr. Adams, from Committee on Judiciary, submitted the following report:

Indianapolis, October 16, 1876.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—Your committee, to whom was referred the petition of Thomas Wren, asking the city to pay him certain damages sustained by him by reason of his having been unable to obtain a final estimato upon work done by him in grading and graveling South Tennessee street, between Garden and McCarty streets, would report that we have investigated the matter, and find that Mr. Wren had a contract in 1866 for grading and graveling said street, and before he obtained the final estimate upon the work the flood of 1866 came, and caused the overflow of Pogues Run, and washed out a large amount of the work done by Mr. Wren; that the city under his contract retained out of the amounts due him the sum of \$506.61, to pay laborers, etc.

Your committee are of the opinion that the city is not liable for the damages sustained by Mr. Wren, but that the city ought to pay him the sum of \$506.61, with interest at six per cent. from the date when the same was due him. We would therefore recommend that Mr. Wren be paid the said sum of \$506.61, and interest from the date when the same became due, and that the Committee on Accounts and Claims be instructed to provide for the same in the next appropriation ordinance.

Mr. Adams moved that the matter embodied in the above motion of Mr. Craft be referred to the Committee on Opening and Laying Out of Streets and Alleys, with instructions to report next Monday night.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Byram, from the Police Board, submitted the following report:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, to whom was referred a communication from the Board of Health, in reference to the appointment of an extra sanitary policeman, have had the matter under consideration, and are of the opinion that at the present time that the appointment of any further sanitary policemen is unneccessary, and would recommend that the request be not granted.
