The Common Council met in regular session.

REPORTS FROM CITY OFFICERS.

To the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—At a meeting of the Council, September 25, 1876, the following motion was adopted: "That Mary J. Vance be granted the right to remove the street lamp at the point of intersection of Virginia avenue and Washington street, in front of her block, and in place of said lamp, and two others that have been removed, she be granted the right to erect one lamp post on Washington street, near the point of said streets, and one on Virginia avenue near said point of intersection; said lamps to be erected and the connections thereto to be made by the said Mary J. Vance at her own expense."

I would respectfully call the attention of your honorable body to section two of an ordinance entitled "an ordinance regulating the erection of public lamps, and providing for lighting the streets and alleys of the city of Indianapolis with gas."

This section provides for the number of lamps to be erected within a given space, and if the provisions of the motion above given be carried out, there will be but one lamp on the south side of Washington street between Delaware and Pennsylvania streets, while the light on Virginia avenue will be cut off to some extent.

In view of the ordinance regulating such matters, and the probability of a remonstrance from property-holders who have paid their proportionate assessments for these posts, I deem it my duty to call your attention to the matter.

SECOND.

I would respectfully report that the Peru & Chicago R. R. Co. have constructed a dam across Pogue's Run north of Liberty street, which is an obstruction to the flow of water, and possibly a dangerous one in case of heavy rains. I would recommend that the company aforesaid be notified to remove the said dam as soon as possible.

THIRD.

I am in receipt of the following communication:

Resolved, That the owners of the following described real estate, to wit: Lot number 4, in out lot number 15, in Seidensticker's sub-division to the city of Indianapolis, be, and they are hereby required to fill or drain the same, as in the opinion of this Council there is a hole or excavation thereon, in which water has or may become so stagnant or noxious as to be a nuisance and injurious to the health and comfort of said city and the inhabitants thereof, as provided by an ordinance passed April 28, 1866, entitled, "An ordinance providing for the draining and filling up of ponds, excavations and holes, and prescribing penalties for the failure to fill up or drain the same," and that in case of the failure of the owners thereof to fill or drain the same, the Street Commissioner proceed to fill or drain the said excavation as provided in said ordinance; provided that the cost thereof shall not exceed ten per cent. of the value of the aforesaid real estate as assessed upon the tax duplicate for city purposes.

We would recommend, in this case, that Saunders be notified to quit in ten days, on failure to pay up arrears.

Leases all need renewing.
