Gentlemen:—At the last meeting of the Council, a communication from a committee on behalf of the Workingmen, asking that they be allowed a representation upon the election boards at the coming city election, was referred to me, and I would report that I have examined the matter, and find that section four of the general election law, passed in 1869, provides that two judges shall be selected from the different political parties, "provided there are different political parties in such precinct, and such appointments shall be made from the two political parties casting the highest number of votes in such township or precinct." Section ten of the city charter provides that "all elections in cities shall be governed by the laws in force regulating township and other elections."

I am therefore of the opinion that it is the duty of the Council to appoint two freeholders in each ward, to act as judges of the election; one to be selected from each of the two political parties casting the highest number of votes in each ward.

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Council that the said company are not paying such compensation for labor as the members of Council were led to believe, by their statements, they would do.

Resolved, That a committee of three members of Council, holding over, be appointed to confer with the directors of the company, and ask them, in behalf of the Council, to increase the price for labor at least 25 per cent.

On motion of Mr. Thalman, the last resolution was amended so as to demand a compensation of "at least one dollar and fifty cents a day."

The resolutions, as amended, were then adopted by the following vote, (Mr. Thomas being excused):

The Chair appointed Councilmen McGinty, Morse, and Wright, Arthur L., as the special committee under preceding resolutions.

Mr. Webster offered the following motion:

Moved, That Jacob Streicher have permission to pave with brick the side-walk in front of his property (lots 14 and 15, in Butler's subdivision of outlot 180), on Fort Wayne avenue, according to stakes to be set by the City Civil Engineer, and the work to be done within sixty days.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Case offered the following motion:

Moved, That Patrick Lynch be, and is, hereby granted permission to improve the sidewalk on English avenue, in front of Nos. 24, 26, 28 and 30; also, in front of his property on Pine street, between English avenue and Harrison street; also, in front of No. 28 Harrison street; the same to be done

at his own expense, the grade stakes to be set by the City Civil Engineer, and the work completed within the next sixty days.

Which was adopted.

By consent, Mr. Ransdell, from the Committee on Water Works, submitted the following report:

Indianapolis, April 23, 1877.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Water Works, to whom was referred the petition of Frank J. Meyer, et al., in regard to water rent for street sprinkling carts, asking the City Council to secure a reduction in price, etc., would respectfully report, that we have examined the charter and ordinances under which the Water Works Company are furnishing water to the city and citizens, and find that there is no relief for the parties of the things complained of, except by the opening up of the whole question of water rates, as provided for in the charter ordinance of the Water Works Company.

The ordinance provides that the company shall furnish the city and citizens water at the same rates charged in other cities of like population, and if the city and company shall fail to agree upon rates, the question shall be settled by the reference of the matter to a committee of arbitration, the members of which shall be non-residents of the city, two to be selected by the city, two by the company, and they to select the fifth.

Your committee refer the matter back, without recommendation.
