The report of the Committee on Streets and Alleys, (see pages 515-16, ante), accompanied with the following resolution, was read:

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, That the petition of Charles B. Stilz, Walter V. Bozell, S. F. Wilson and others, praying for the opening and extension of Wright street to its present width of 50 feet, from Sanders street to Birkemeyer avenue, as prayed for in said petition, be referred to the Board of City Commissioners, with instructions to assess benefits and damages, and to make due report to the Common Council and Board of Aldermen; the City Commissioners to return all petitions, plats and notices.

The City Clerk is hereby instructed to issue the proper notices, and the Superintendent of the Metropolitan Police Force is hereby directed to serve said notices on said City Commissioners and upon the property owners: Provided, That before the City Clerk issue the said notices to said City Commissioners, a bond shall be filed with said City Clerk, to the approval of the Mayor, guaranteeing the payment of all costs and charges of said Commissioners in this matter.

The total cost of said improvement shall be assessed per lineal front foot upon the real estate abutting on said street (except the proportion thereof occupied by street and alley crossings, which shall be assessed against the City of Indianapolis); said assessments, if deferred, to be paid in ten annual installments. A bond or bonds shall be issued to the contractor in payment for said work, unless the property owners pay said assessments before said bond or bonds are issued, all as provided for in an act of the General Assembly of Indiana, approved March 8, 1889.

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, Ind., That it is deemed necessary to improve Pleasant street, from Dillon street to Reid street, by grading, bowldering and curbing the gutters and placing a gutter-

stone therein, in accordance with profile and specifications on file in the office of the City Civil Engineer. The total cost of said improvement shall be assessed per lineal front foot upon the real estate abutting on said Pleasant street (except the proportion thereof occupied by street and alley crossings, which shall be assessed against the City of Indianapolis); said assessments, if deferred, to be paid in ten annual installments. A bond or bonds shall be issued to the contractor in payment for said work, unless the property-owners pay said assessments before said bond or bonds are issued, all as provided for in an act of the General Assembly of Indiana, approved March 8, 1889.

The report of the Committee on Sewers and Drainage, in relation to the proposition of Cooper & Pickens (see page 552, ante), was read, and referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys and Sewers and Drainage.

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—The Common Council in regular session held Monday evening, June 16th, 1890, adhered to its former action in adopting the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the petition signed by the Mayor and members of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, praying the Board of

Commissioners of Marion County, Indiana, to annex certain unplatted contiguous lands therein described which now adjoin the City limits to said city, be, and the same is hereby adopted as the petition of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of said City; and the City Clerk is hereby directed to prepare a certified copy of this resolution, and file the same together with said petition and plats accompanying the same with the Board of Commissioners of Marion County, Indiana, in the office of the Auditor of said County; and the City Attorney is hereby directed to present said petition to said Board, at the first regular meeting after notice has been given, and the City Clerk is further instructed to cause the proper legal notice of the pendency of said petition to be given."

The Street Commissioner be instructed to notify parties obstructing first alley west of Edgewood avenue to remove said obstruction, and if not removed in ten days, the Street Commissioner remove same and charge costs to parties obstructing.

That permission and consent is hereby granted to Alpheus H. Snow to dig into the block pavement on north Delaware street, between St. Mary and Morrison streets-No. 536 north Delaware street-for the purpose of laying a water pipe to connect with the water main in said street.

That the Consolidated Coal and Lime Company be granted permission to lay a brick and cement sidewalk in front to their premises on the north side of east Washington street, between Noble and Davidson streets, at their own expense, under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

That the City Civil Engineer be requested to notify the Inianapolis Gas Light & Coke Co., to dismantel the gas lamp at the corner of Ohio and Noble streets, and remantel lamp at the corner of Noble and Wabash streets.

That Frazers Brothers and Coborn be authorized to lay a brick sidewalk in front of their property on east Washington street, east of Noble street, under the direction of the City Civil Engineer, and at the expense of the owner.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby directed to clean the gutters on Fletcher and English avenues, and also fill up the chuck holes on the above streets.

The following motions (see page 556 and 557, ante), were read, and referred to the Committee on Finance and Accounts and Claims:

That the City Civil Engineer be, and he is hereby directed to, immediately after the passage of this motion, advertise for bids per square yard, for paving the road-

ways of the following streets with granite.

Bidders to state the kind of granite to be used, all of which shall be placed upon

a six (6) inch hydraulic concrete base.

Granite blocks to be six (6) inches in depth and from eight (8) to fourteen (14)

inches in length, and from four (4) to five (5) inches in witdh.

Said pavements to be advertised to be laid on Meridian street, from Washington street to the Union Railway tracks; Pennsylvania street, from Washington street to the Union Railway tracks; Georgia street, from Illinois street to Pennsylvania street; Maryland street, from Illinois street to Delaware street.

That the City Civil Engineer be, and he is hereby directed to advertise for proposals for the construction of one 1,500-barrel cistern, at or near the corner of Archer and Vermont streets.

The following resolution (see page 558, ante), were read:

Resolved, That the Indianapolis Water Company be instructed to extend its mains in and along Pleasant street, from Dillon to Linden street, hydrants to be located under the direction of the Chief Fire Engineer.

The total cost of said improvement shall be assessed per lineal foot front upon the real estate abutting on said avenue, (except the proportion thereof occupied by street and alley crossings, which shall be assessed against the City of Indianapolis); said assessments, if deferred, to be paid in ten annual installments. A bond or bonds shall be issued to the contractor in payment for said work, unless the property owners pay said assessments before said bond or bonds are issued, all as provided for in an act of the General Assembly of Indiana, approved March 8, 1889.

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, That it is deemed necessary to improve the roadway of Pearl street, from Pennsylvania street to Illinois street by paving the same to a width of twenty (20) feet with Standard Trinidad Asphalt Sheet Pavement, in accordance with profile and specifications on file in the office of the City Civil Engineer. The total cost of said improvement shall be assessed per lineal front foot upon the real estate abutting on said Pearl street, (except the proportion thereof occupied by street and alley crossings, which shall be assessed against the city of Indianapolis); said assessments, if deferred, to be paid in ten annual installments. A bond or bonds shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of said assessments, unless the property-owners pay said assessments before said bond or bonds are issued, all as provided for in an Act of the General Assembly of Indiana, approved March 3, 1889.

A bond or bonds shall be issued to the contractor in payment for said work, unless the property owners pay said assessments before said bond or bonds are issued; all as provided for in an Act of the General Assembly of Indiana, approved March 8, 1889

The total cost of said improvement shall be assessed per lineal front foot upon the real estate abutting on said St. Mary street, between Delaware street and Alabama street, (except the proportion thereof occupied by street and alley crossings, which shall be assessed against the City of Indianapolis); said assessments, if deferred, to be paid in ten annual installments. A bond or bonds shall be issued to the contractor in payment for said work, unless the property owners pay said assments before said bond or bonds are issued; all as provided for in an Act of the General Assembly of Indiana, approved March 8, 1889.

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, Ind., That it is deemed necessary to improve the roadway of Meridian street, from Seventh street to Twelfth street, by paving the same to a width of thirty (30) feet, with Standard Trinidad Sheet Asphalt Pavement, laid upon a six (6) inch hydraulic concrete base, in accordance with profile and specifications on file in the office of the City Civil Engineer. The total cost of said improvement shall be assessed per lineal front foot upon the real estate abutting on said Meridian street, (except the propertion thereof occupied by street and alley crossings, which shall be assessed against the City of Indianapolis); said assessments, if deferred, to be paid in ten annual installments. A bond or bond shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of said assessments, unless the property owners pay said assessments before said bond or bonds are issued; all as provided for in an Act of the General Assembly of Indiana, approved March 8, 1889.

The following resolutions were read:

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, Ind., That it is deemed necessary to improve the roadway of South street, from Virginia avenue to Noble street, by paving the same to a width of forty (40) feet, with Standard Trinidad Asphalt Sheet Pavement, in accordance with profile and specications on file in the office of the City Civil Engineer. The total cost of said improvenment shall be assessed per lineal front foot upon the real estate abutting on said South street, except the portion thereof occupied by street and alley crossings, which shall be assessed against the City of Indianapolis, and except such proportion thereof as eighteen (18) feet bears to the whole width of roadway, which proportion is to be charged to the Citizens' Street Railroad Company; said assessments, if deferred, to be paid in ten annual installments. A bond or bonds shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of said assessments, unless the property owners paysaid assessments, before said bond or bonds are issued; all as provided for in an Act of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, approved March 8, 1889.

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, Ind., That it is deemed necessary to improve the roadway of Fletcher avenue, from Noble street to Dillon street, by paving the same to a width of forty (40) feet, with Standard Trinidad Asphalt Sheet Pavement, in accordance with profile and specifications on file in the office of the City Civil Engineer. The total cost of said improvement shall be assessed per lineal front foot upon the real estate abutting on said Fletcher avenue, except the portion thereof occupied by street and alley crossings, which shall be assessed against the City of Indianapolis, and except such proportion thereof as nine (9) feet bears to the whole width of roadway, which proportion is to be charged to the Citizen's Street Railroad Company; said assessmnts, if deferred, to be paid in ten annual installments. A bond or bonds shall be issued to the contractor in payment for such work, unless the property owners pay said assessments before said bond or bonds are issued; all as provided for in an Act of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, approved March 8, 1889.

And they were adopted by the following vote:

NAYS, 1-viz: Alderman Laut.

Gentlemen:—Your committee to whom was referred declaratory resolutions for improving Liberty street with brick, from New York street to Michigan street; Meridian street with asphalt, from Washington street to McCarty street; Maryland street with asphalt, from Illinois street to Delaware street; Georgia street with asphalt, from Illinois street to Delaware street; and Pennsylvania street with asphalt, from Washington street to South street, would recommed be stricken from the files.

NAYS, 5-viz: Aldermen Blackwell, Farrell, Laut, Reilly and Reinecke.

On motion by Alderman Blackwell, the resolutions were recommitted to the Committee on Streets and Alleys and Sewers and Drainage.

Alderman Reinecke offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the Second Reform Church Sunday School be given permission to have their Annual Pic-nic at Garfield Park on July 8th.

President Thalman presented the following communication; which was received, and Aldermen Smith, Breunig and Farrell appointed as the Committee:

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen:
