The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Aldermanic Chamber, Monday evening, August 11, A.D. 1890, at 8:00 o'clock, in regular session.

MESSAGES AND PAPERS FROM THE COMMON COUNCIL.

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, That the accompanying first and final estimate in behalf of Clay & Litel for grading and graveling the first alley west of Broadway street, from Lincoln avenue to Home avenue, be, and the same is hereby, adopted as the estimate of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of said city; and that the property owners are hereby required to pay the sums set opposite their respective names.

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, That the accompanying third and final estimate in behalf of Augustus Bruner, for constructing a brick sewer, two and one half (2½) feet internal diameter, in and along Pum street, Christian avenue and College avenue, from Massachusetts avenue to Seventh street, be, and the same is hereby adopted as the estimate of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of said city, and that the property owners are hereby required to pay the sums set opposite their respective names.

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, That the accompanying first and final estimate in behalf of J. L. Spaulding, for grading and graveling Vermont street and sidewalks, from Hanna street to Preston street, be, and the same is hereby, adopted as the estimate of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of said city; and that the property ownners are hereby required to pay the sums set opposite their respective names.

The report of the Committee on Public Health (see page 665, ante), accompanied with the following resolution, was read:

Resolved, That the Board of Health be empowered to carry out the recommendations of said Board as regards to the vault dump. Also that R. J. Nolan, chairman of the Committee on Public Health, place a man at said place whose compensation shall not exceed \$2.00 per day, of from eight o'clock A. M. to seven o'clock P. M.

Alderman Smith offered the following amendment; which was adopted:

Moved, To amend by inserting therein that Mr. Nolan has the right to appoint, providing that he appoint an old soldier.

On motion, the report and resolution, as amended, was referred to the Committee on Finance and Accounts and claims.

The report of the Committee on Streets and Alleys (see page 667, ante), accompanied by the following estimate resolution, was read:

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, Ind., That the report of the Committee on Streets and Alleys, of the Common Council, recommending that the final estimate, made by the City Civil Engineer, in favor of Fullmer, Cooper & Co., contractors for the grading and bowldering the roadway of Merrill street, curbing with stone and paving with brick the sidewalks thereof, from East street to Virginia avenue, pursuant to Special Ordinance No. 108, 1889, be, and the same is hereby approved. That the assessments set forth in said final estimate are hereby approved and confirmed; and there is hereby assessed against the several lots and parcels of ground, as described in said final estimate, the several amounts set opposite and assessed against said several lots and parcels of ground, respectively, for and on account of said improvement.

The County Auditor is hereby directed to place said assessments upon the city tax duplicate, and to charge the same respectively against the several lots and parcels of ground against which they have been so assessed, as follows, to-wit: Ten per cent. for each successive year for ten years, together with interest on the several amounts so assessed, at six per cent. per annum, payable semi annually, calculated from the date of the approval of this estimate, until the several amounts fall due. The first ten per cent. of said assessments, with interest on the whole from the date of the approval of this estimate, shall be due and payable on the first Monday in November, 1890; the semi-annual interest on the unpaid balance shall be due and payable thereafter at the dates of the semi-annual payment of city taxes in each year; and on the first Monday in November in each year thereafter one-tenth of the principal of said assessment, together with the semi-annual interest on the unpaid balance, shall be due and payable, until all is paid.

Provided, however, That the above provision for extending said assessments upon the city tax duplicate, and collecting the same successively in annual and semi-annual installments of principal and interest respectively, shall apply only to the owner or owners of said lots or parcels of ground, who shall promise and agree, in writing, filed with the City Clerk of this city, that, in consideration of having the right to pay his or their assessment or respective assessments in installments, they will not make any objection to the illegality or irregularity as to their respective assessments, and will pay the same, when due, with interest thereon, not exceeding six per cent. as shall, by ordinance or resolution of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen, be prescribed and required.

The said assessments, together with interest thereon, shall, from the date of the approval of this estimate, be a lien upon the several lots and parcels of ground against which they are assessed respectively to the same extent that taxes are a lien upon such property; and the said assessments, when placed upon the city tax duplicate, shall be collected in the same way that city taxes are collected; all said assessments not so extended upon the city tax duplicate, pursuant to the above proviso, shall be at once due and payable and shall be collected by precept and sale, as now provided by law.

The proceeds from such assessments as are so placed on the city tax duplicate, shall constitute a special fund to be applied to the payment of the costs of said improvement, and of the bonds and certificates to be issued therefor, and for no other purpose.

And it was concurrently adopted, with the understanding that the City Clerk enter into a written agreement with the contractors to complete their contract as soon as the buildings are removed from said street, by the following vote:

The report and resolution in relation to the widening of Lexington avenue, from Reid street to the corporation line, was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys and Sewers and Drainage.

The report of the Committee on City Improvements (see page 671, accompanied with the following resolution, was read:

Whereas, The city has contracted, and is about to contract, for a large amount of very expensive street improvements, such as asphalt, brick and granite; and whereas, the City Civil Engineer is at present unable to attend to the duties of his office on account of sickness, thereby leaving the city without any person to watch such improvements, the contractors having everything their own way; therefore, be it Resolved, That we employ at once some expert Engineer, whose duty it shall be

Resolved, That we employ at once some expert Engineer, whose duty it shall be to inspect all of such work, and the material used in making such improvements, and to report to this body from time to time if such work is being done according

to contract

Which report was concurred in, and the resolution concurrently adopted, by the following vote:

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby instructed to place four foot bridges at the corner of Wilkins and Carlos streets, and that gravel be placed at the same point to fill up chuck-holes.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby instructed to lay a single stone full square crossing at Tennessee and Ray streets.

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to fill the alley east of East street, between Merrill and Stevens streets to conform with the grade of Merrill street.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby directed to clean Meridian street from Merrill street to Hill street.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby ordered to clean the gutters of Noble street, from Washington street to Massachusetts avenue.

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to lay a single stone crossing on Mississippi street, south side of Pratt street.

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to lay a double stone crossing on Mississippi street, south side of Walnut street.

The following motions (see page 671, ante), were read and referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys and Sewers and Drainage:

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby instructed to fill the chuck-hole in Louisiana street, between Illinois and Tennessee streets.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby instructed to extend a sixteen inch sewer pipe line from the north line of Dr. Bell's property into White River. Said property fronts on Washington street, north side, west of White River.

The report of the Committee on Public Property (see page 666, ante), in relation to advertising the city's property on North Illinois street, was read and the action of the Common Council thereon, concurred in.

The following declaratory resolution (see page 676, ante,) was read:

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, Ind., That it is deemed necessary to improve McCarty street, from the west curb line of East street to the east curb line of Delaware street, by grading and paving with brick the roadway, and curbing with stone the outer edges of the sidewalks thereof, in accordance with profile and specifications on file in the office of the City Civil Engineer. The total cost of said improvement shall be assessed per lineal front foot upon the real estate abutting on said McCarty street (except the proportion thereof occupied by street and alley crossings, which shall be assessed against the City of Indianapolis); said assessments, if deferred, to be paid in ten annual installments. A bond or bonds shall be issued to the contractor in payment for said work, unless the property owners pay said assessments before said bond or bonds are issued; all as provided for in an Act of the General Assembly of Indiana, approved March 8, 1889.

The following motions (see pages 677, ante), were read and concurrently adopted:

That the City Civil Engineer be instructed to direct the contractor for the Ohio street Asphalt Paevment to make the proper street connections, at the intersection of Pennsylvania street, from the south curb line to the south property line of said Ohio street.

That Morman and Perry be, and are bereby, granted permission to erect temporary electric light poles on Sciota street, between Ohio and New York streets, for the purpose of making a display in University Park, during the meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

That Mr. W. F. Swiggett be, and is hereby, granted permission to open 279 North Meridian street block pavement, in front of his property, for the purpose of tapping the water mains. *Provided*, That he put the street in as good condition as he found it and to the satisfaction of the Street Commissioner.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to put in the necessary culverts on Johnson and Jefferson avenues, that the contractor may properly complete his contract for grading and graveling said avenues.

The following resolution (see page 677, ante), was read:

Resolved, That the Street Commissioner be directed to notify the owners or agents of all buildings and obstructions in Merrill street, between Virginia avenue and East street, to remove all such buildings and obstructions within ten days from receiving such notice, and if the same are not so removed within said ten days, said Street Commissioner shall remove the same and collect the cost thereof from the said property owners.
