The City Attorney submitted the following opinion; which was concurred in:

OFFICE OF THE CITY ATTORNEY, INDIANAPOLIS, May 21, 1877.

To the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—I would report that in the year 1875, the city, in the opening of Peru street, condemned and appropriated fifteen feet off of the entire east side of lot number 5, in Samuel Hanway's subdivision of lots 9 and 10 in Ovid Butler's subdivision of part of the southeast quarter of section 36, town-

ship 16, north of range 3, as recorded in Plat Book No. 3, page 194. That at the time of such condemnation and appropriation, said lot was owned by one Rufus Nutting, Jr.; that the City Commissioners assessed his damages at the sum of \$600; which sum was paid to said Nutting. That Samuel Hanway holds, and is now foreclosing, a mortgage upon said lot, which mortgage was executed and a valid lien upon the same at the time of the condemnation of the above described portion by the city. The city is liable to Mr. Hanway for whatever damages he has sustained by such condemnation; that is, the difference between the value of the lot as it now is and the amount of his claim against the original lot. Mr. Nutting is insolvent, and is not a resident of this State at this time.

There are two ways by which the city might settle the matter: by paying Mr. Hanway the amount of said difference in value, or by bidding the remainder of said lot in for the amount of the claim against it.

The lot is a vacant and unimproved one, and property which it would be very hard for the city to dispose of. The amount of the claim is \$828.75, and the remaining part of said lot is worth, as I am informed by the Councilman from the First Ward, about \$350 cash; so that the amount of Hanway's damages would be \$478.75.

I would, therefore, recommend that I be instructed to settle the matter upon that basis, and that said sum be paid to Mr. Hanway; and also that it be included in the next appropriation ordinance.

Indianapolis, May 21, 1877.

To the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—I respectfully submit for your consideration and approval, a full, complete, and final report, of the street-repair department, for the fiscal year ending May 15, 1877:

I have expended the sum of \$50.890 86 [see Table 1], and have still on hand the sum of \$2,708.90 of the amount appropriated.

#### TABLE I-EXPENDITURES.

[Sundries include blacksmithing and tool sharpening; cinders and spoils, of which I have used a large amount in building protection to Washington street and Morris street bridges over White river; the cement and brick used in building catch-basins and repairing of sidewalks; one road roller and scraper, and several other articles.]

I would also state that I have collected and paid into the city treasury, the sum of fifty-two dollars. There is about forty dollars due the city, and uncollected, which I will collect, and make returns as soon as collected.

I have also repaired the streets torn up by the Water Works Company; which amounts to \$154,90, and has been deducted out of their appropriation-

There is also due the city \$100 for repair of the streets between the tracks of the Street Railway Company. I have turned the account over to the City Attorney for collection, and they have promised to pay the same this week.

There was also appropriated and expended the sum of \$600, in completing the East Market street sewer.

There was also appropriated the sum of \$1,000 for the repairing of Virginia avenue bridge and others; of which I have expended the sum of \$978.03 [see Table 2]:

Councilman Dill presented the following petition; which, on motion of Councilman Byram, was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys:

Indianapolis, May 21, 1877.

To the Honorable Common Council of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—I hereby ask permission to build two vaults on Tennessee street, just north of Washington: one to be six feet square, the other to be five feet in diameter; to be used by Simon McCarty of the Metropolitan, both to be built under direction of City Civil Engineer.

Also, the following motion; which, on motion of Councilman Morse, was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys, and the City Civil Engineer:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be and is hereby instructed to fill up the chuck-holes on Indiana avenue, from Illinois street to the canal bridge, at Michigan street.

Councilman Izor presented the following petition; which, on motion of Councilman A. L. Wright, was referred to the Committee on Sewers and the City Civil Engineer:

Indianapolis, May 12, 1877.

To the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned would represent to your honorable bodies that the creek, known as Crooked Creek, passing west through the grounds of the State used by the Female Reformatory, thence west, formerly ran in a portion of Michigan street, opposite south end of Woodruff Place. In the improvement of said stree, the city filled the channel of so much as was in the street. On protest of Ridenour, Becker, Rickard, and others, the city officers agreed to relieve private property from the overflow, by constructing a sewer in the street. Instead of this, they placed a wooden box under south sidewalk of Michigan street, which in a few days, caved in, and all the water has since flowed promiscuously over the private lands adjoining. Into this creek the sewerage of the State Reformatory is discharged constantly; and it is so near the source of the offensive supply that, when thus exposed, it makes residence in the neighborhood intolerable, and is of such detriment to the property over which it flows as to make it valueless for any purpose. The ground was all platted into lots, and would have been improved before this, but for the action of the city and the conditions herein referred to.

We, therefore, pray your honorable bodies to order the construction of a sewer in the center of Michigan street, from said State Reformatory, west, to State avenue, and thence south, on State avenue, to the ditch made by Col. Sturm, where it may have a temporary out-let. It would be better, however, to continue the sewer in Michigan street to Pogue's Run, which would complete the work that must be finally accomplished. The necessity is so great, and the damages continuous, that delay will only increase the liability of the city. The Mayor was served with written notice, at the time, that if the property owners referred to were not relieved, they would be compelled to seek protection in all ways left to us.

Feeling that justice will be done by responding to this, our appeal, that all proper relief will be afforded, your petitioners will ever pray.

## Councilman Morse presented the following petition:

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—Your petitioners would respectfully represent to your honors, that "The Belt Railroad Company" is violating its contract with the City of Indianapolis in the following particulars, to-wit:

First. Said company has violated its contract with said city by letting the contract of the masonry of the bridge across White River to a non-resident, when good, responsible resident citizens made bids, offering to do the work cheaper than said work was let to said non-resident.

Second. Said contract provides that said contractor shall employ only resident citizens to perform the labor on said road, while, in truth and in fact, all of said laborers working upon said bridge, except two, are non-residents of the City of Indianapolis, and are residents of Louisville and other places, while good, skilled laborers of this city are going about the streets, begging for work and for bread, and their families actually suffering.

Wherefore, your petitioners ask that said Belt Railroad Company may be compelled to comply with said contract, by discharging said non-residents, and giving resident citizens employment upon said road.

And for this your petitioners will ever pray.

Moved, That the City Civil Engineer be, and is, hereby instructed to examine the drainage at the south end of Douglass street, and report to this Council the best and cheapest plan for preventing the accumulation of water at said point.

Councilman McGinty offered the following motion; which was adopted:

Moved (the Board of Aldermen concurring), That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to clean the gutters on Tennessee street, between Ray and McCarty streets.

Councilman Pouder offered the following motion; which was adopted:

Moved, That Henry C. Roney have thirty days additional time to complete his contract for building a wooden bridge over Pogue's Run at crossing of Ray street.

Councilman Reed offered the following motion:

Moved, That John B. Smith have permission to make a sink-hole in alley between First and Second streets and Fayette street and Michigan road, for the purpose of carrying off the surplus water from his premises.

On motion of Councilman Byram, the preceding motion was amended by placing the proposed work under the supervision of the City Civil Engineer; and then, as amended, Councilman Reed's motion was adopted.

Councilman Steinhauer offered the following motion; which was referred to the Fire Board and the City Attorney:

Moved, That Glazier & Morris be, and are hereby, allowed to use the fire plug in front of their building on South Pennsylvania street, for sprinkling the street.

Councilman Thomas offered the following motion; which was adopted:

Moved (the Board of Aldermen concurring), That Fred Brocking have permission to grade and gravel the sidewalk along the line of his property on the corner of Illinois and Ray streets, and that the Civil Engineer be directed to set the grade stakes; said work to be done at his own expense, and to be completed in 60 days.

Councilman Reed was granted leave of absence.

Councilman Watts offered the following motion; which, on motion of Councilman Izor, was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be ordered to fill with gravel the chuck-holes on Indiana avenue, from West street to Fall Creek.

Councilman Wood offered the following motion; which, on motion of Councilman Byram, was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to fill the chuck-holes on Georgia street, between Missouri and West streets.

Also, the following motion; which was adopted:

Moved, That the Street Commissioner be directed to notify owners of the the premises known as Braden's Block, on Washington street, between West and California streets, to repair sidewalk in front of said premises. If not done within thirty days, the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to do such work, in accordance with ordinance on that subject, passed August 14th, 1876.

Councilman W. G. Wright submitted the following proposal from the Indiana Fertilizing Company; which, on motion of Councilman Pouder, was referred to the Committee on Sellers Farm:

To the Hon. W. G. Wright and others:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to make the following proposition to your honorable body, on behalf of the Indiana Fertilizer Company:

- lst. In view that the major part of the Sellers Farm is lying idle, growing up in weeds and brush, doing no one any good, and going to ruin generally; and as parties are continually carting away wood, timber, etc., we propose,
- 2d. That the Indiana Fertilizer Company lease the entire Sellers Farm for five years, at a rental of one thousand dollars per year, payable semi-annually.
- 3d. Those parties holding leases from the city shall not be disturbed, upon their paying their rents to said Fertilizer Company.

4th. The Indiana Fertilizer Company to act as the city's agents, collecting and paying the rent, to improve the farm, and to yield any part thereof, not occupied by their factory, to any parties, for manufacturing purposes, that may be designated by your honorable body.

5th. The Fertilizer Company to have the right to farm the entire unoccupied part of Sellers Farm, using the fallen timber and young saplings for fencing the same, at their own expense.
