APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE NO. 13, 1960

An ordinance to amend the Budget of the City of Indianapolis for the year 1960, created by virtue of General Ordinace No.

75, 1959, as amended, transferring the sum of Fourteen Thousand (\$14,000.00) Dollars from the Board of Public Works, Administration, and allocating and reappropriating the said sum of Fourteen Thousand (\$14,000.00) Dollars to the Bureau of Traffic Engineering, declaring an emergency and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 49, 1960

An ordinance to amend the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, the same being GGeneral Ordinance No. 140, 1951, and more particularly Title 4, Chapter 8, Section 4-821 (a) thereof, by the addition thereto of Subsections 44, 45 and 46 prohibiting the stopping, standing or parking of vehicles on certain streets in the City of Indianapolis between the hours of 3:00 P.M. to 6:00 P.M. inclusive, except on Saturdays and Sundays, and fixing a time when the said amendment shall take effect.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 50, 1960

An ordinance to amend the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, as adopted by General Ordinance No. 140, 1951, and more particularly Title 4, Chapter 8 thereof, by the addition thereto of Section 4-841, limiting parking of vehicles on certain streets to 2 hours between the hours of 7:00 A.M. and 6:00 P.M. inclusive, except on Saturdays and Sundays, and fixing a time when the said amendment shall take effect.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 51, 1960

An ordinance to amend the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, General Ordinance No. 140, 1951, as amended, and more particularly Title 4, Chapter 8, Section 4-818-4-820 theerof, by the addition of subsections thereto prohibiting parking at certain times except Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, on certain designated streets between certain designated points, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 52, 1960 (AS AMENDED)

An ordinance to amend the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, General Ordinance No. 140, 1951, as amended, and more particularly Title 4, Chapter 8, Section 4-812, by the addition of a subsection thereto prohibiting parking at all times on a certain designated street between certain designated points, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 53, 1960

An ordinance establishing a certain passenger and/or loading zone in the City of Indianapolis, pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, General Ordinance No. 140, 1951, as amended, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

INTRODUCTION OF APPROPRIATION ORDINANCES

APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE NO. 15, 1960

- AN ORDINANCE to amend the Budget of the City of Indianapolis for the year 1960, created by virtue of General Ordinance No. 75, 1960, as amended, transferring the sum of \$9,500.00 from certain specified funds and items to other specified funds and items in the budget of the Department of Public Safety, declaring an emergency and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.
- WHEREAS, certain extraordinary conditions have developed since the adoption of the existing annual budget, and
- WHEREAS, the Fire Department has been faced with an increased cost for the electricty required, heat and lights and for other utility costs, which amounts to more than could be foreseen at the time of the making of such annual budget, and
- WHEREAS, there is need of more temporary employees instead of permanent employees in the said Bureau of Traffic Engineering for certain existing purposes, and
- WHEREAS, it is in the best interest that funds be transferred from other funds within the Department of Public Safety to bring about the obtaining of proceeds with which to pay higher utility costs and to provide additional temporary employees,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS

Section 1. That certain items in the Budget of the Department of Public Safety be and the same are hereby reduced and transferred to other numbered funds and items in said budget as follows, to-wit:

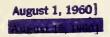

Section 2. The above transfer of funds is necessary because of an existing emergency requiring the completion of the Paint Program by the Bureau of Traffic Engineering, and an increase in the Fire Department utility costs over last year's heat, light, power and Water bills, which could not be foreseen at the time of the preparation of the Annual Budget.

Section 3. That said appropriation does not involve any increase in the annual budget of the City of Indianapolis.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval by the Mayor and all laws pertaining thereto.

INTRODUCTION OF GENERAL ORDINANCES

Budget for 1961

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 57, 1960

AN ORDINANCE creating the annual budget of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 1961 and ending December 31, 1961, establishing the salaries fixed or recommended by the Mayor prior to August 1, 1960, as provided by law appropriating monies for the purpose of defraying the expenses and all outstanding claims and obligations of the several departments and officials of the city government; and fixing and establishing the annual rate of taxation and tax levy for the year 1961 for each fund for which a special tax levy is authorized, and fixing a time when this ordinance shall take effect.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

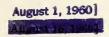
Section 1. That for the expenses of the city government, and its institutoins, for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 1961 and ending December 31, 1961, the following sums of money are hereby appropriated out of the fund herein named and for the purposes herein specified, subject to the laws governing the same. Such sums herein appropriated shall be held to include all expenditures authorized to be made during the year, unless otherwise expressly stipulated and provided by law. The salaries established thereon are those fixed or recommended by the Mayor as provided for by law prior to August 1, 1960.

Section 2. (a) That for said fiscal year there is hereby appropriated out of the General Funds of said city, except those sums appearing hereinafter under the columns headed "Gas Tax," and "Parking Meter," the sums as hereinafter appear in this section for the purposes herein named.

(b) That from the monies anticipated and estimated to be re-

ceived from the State of Indiana during the fiscal year 1959 and allocated to said City of Indianapolis out of the revenues derived from license fees, or taxes, on gasoline, motor vehicles and other sources connected therewith, and all available balances therein, and constituting a "Special Fund" for the maintenance and repair of streets and bridges within said city, for policing and for other purposes connected with public streets, all as provided by law, which special fund does not affect or involve any special levy of rate, of taxes, for said city, there is hereby appropriated and allocated the sums appearing hereinafter under the column headed, "Gas Tax," of the herein schedules of the Dept. of Public Works Administration, City Engineer, Street Commissioner, Traffic Engineer, Municipal Garage, Park Department and Police Department, to said departments of said city for uses, germane to the purpose of said special fund and for the several purposes as hereinafter set out in said schedules of said departments.

(c) That from the monies anticipated and estimated to be received from parking meter receipts during the year 1961 and all available balances in said Fund, constituting a special parking meter fund under the heading Parking Meter Fund, for purchase, installation, relocation, removal and repair of parking meters and the records and personnel incidental thereto, together with the personnel and costs of installation and maintenance of traffic signals, tow-in trucks, snow plows, repairs and maintenance of public streets and places whereon parking meters are located and all streets or avenues intersecting or connected therewith and for off street parking facilities and which special fund does not involve a general tax levy for said city, the same is hereby appropriated and allocated under the heading Parking Meter Fund, to the departments hereinafter designated as using parking meter funds, namely, Departments of Finance, Off Street Parking, Traffic Engineer, Department of Works, Administration and Street Commissioner, and for the parking meter operating division itself.

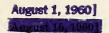

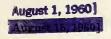

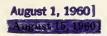

Section 5. The salaries and compensations of the various officers and employees of the city, or prescribed for certain positions and duties, for the ensuing year as recommended and fixed by the mayor prior to August 1, 1960, and as now approved by the Common Council, are hereby adopted and fixed at the respective amounts herein specified and appropriated therefor under the several departments and schedules therein set forth: Provided, however, that no person, official or employee whose salary or compensation is hereby fixed under any item, or by any ordinance hereafter adopted, shall have any vested right to receive such amount, or any minimum amount, except as may be accrued, or otherwise provided by a statute. Control as to any decease shall be vested in the body or executive having direction over the one affected, as provided by law.

Section 6. (a) Any executive department, in its discretion, may at any time transfer any employee from one position to another in such department, or may change and reassign all or any of such employee's duties therein, or may authorize the temporary use of any such employee's service by other executive departments, all whenever it deems such action necessary or advisable, for any reason.

- (b) The mayor, in his discretion, may at any time and for any reason, transfer any employee from one executive department to another, where not otherwise limited by statute, and the amount of compensation of such employee shall remain at the sum payable by this budget in such prior position, unless otherwise prescribed in writing by the mayor and thereupon approved by the Common Council.
- (c) Any such transfers of positions or reassignments of duties shall be at all times subject to further control and orders of the respective executive department, or the mayor; and the aggregate amount of compensation specified in this budget for all such positions and duties, in the one or more executive departments so affected, shall not be exceeded in fixing or paying any such compensation along with that of all other such employees therein.

Section 7. That the auditor of Marion County, Indiana, be and he is hereby ordered and directed to place all such tax levies upon the property tax duplicates, and the county treasurer of such county, ex-officio city treasurer, be and he is hereby ordered and directed to collect the same for the City of Indianapolis, and each of said departments thereof, and make due report thereof as provided by law.

Section 8. That there is hereby levied and assessed or confirmed as may be required by law on all real estate and improvements and all

personal property of whatever description, notes, bonds, stocks, chosen in action of every kind and character in the City of Indianapolis, as assessed and returned for taxation in said City for the year 1961, a tax rate of One Dollar and Thirty-five Cents (\$1.35) for general purposes on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; Eighteen and Two Tenths Cents (\$.182) for City Sinking Fund for each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for such taxable property; Twenty-four and Three Tenths Cents (\$.243) for Park General Fund on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; and Three Cents (\$.030) for Park Bond Fund on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; Nine and Five Tenths Cents (\$.095) for Police Pension Fund on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; Thirteen and Two Tenths Cents (\$.132) for Firemen's Pension Fund on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; Five Cents (\$.050) for Redevelopment Fund for each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property; Three and Seven Tenths Cents (\$.037) for Redevelopment Sinking Fund on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuable of such taxable property; Six Tenths of One Cent (\$.006) for City Market Fund on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of such taxable property of all which levies are duly authorized by specific laws.

Section 9. That for the purpose of paying the principal and interest due on the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the City, there is hereby appropriated the respective sums set forth in the following table,

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 58, 1960

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Municipal Code of Indianapolis 1951, General Ordinance No. 140, 1951, as amended, and more particularly Title 7, thereof, by addition thereto of Chapter 25, establishing rules, regulations, standards, and license fees for bathhouses, massage parlors, massage therapy clinics, and related enterprises, providing for the penalty for the violation of same, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

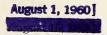
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. It is hereby declared to be in the best interests of the public policy of the City of Indianapolis, to regulate the operaton of bathhouses, massage parlors, massage therapy clinics, massage therapy schools and related enterprises. It has been determined that the operation of these types of enterprises affect the public health, morals and welfare and are susceptible to the promotion of vice and immorality if not regulated. It is, therefore, the determination of this Common Council that such enterprises be licensed and regulated within the City of Indianapolis.

Section II. The title of this Ordinance shall be "The Regulation and Licensing of Bathhouses, Massages Parlors, Message Therapy Clinics, Message Therapy Schools and Related Enterprises."

Section III. General Definitions. Whenever used in this Title, Chapter or Code or in any other Ordinances relating to the subject matter of this Ordinance, the words or phrases specified in this Section shall have the broad meaning herein prescribed in every instance where the particular context does not clearly indicate; and all words and phrases and the meaning thereof applicable to this general subject matter which are defined by this Code, or by any general statutes, or by any other Ordinances, shall supplement this Section, and the meaning of the words herein defined shall be so interpreted whenever used in this Title and when in harmony with the context.

A. A Bath House, for the purpose of this Ordinance, is hereby defined to include any building, room place or establishment other



than a regularly licensed hospital, dispensary, hotel, rooming house, or public lodging house, where members of the public are provided with baths, regardless whether steam, vapor, water or otherwise.

- B. A Massage Parlor, for the purpose of this Ordinance, is defined to include any building, room, place or establishment other than a regularly licensed hospital or dispensary where non-medical and non-surgical manipulative exercises are practiced upon the human body with or without the use of mechanical or bath devices by anyone not a physician, surgeon or of a similar status duly registered with and licensed by the State of Indana.
- B. A Massage Parlor, for the purposes of this Ordinance, is defined means of treating the superficial soft parts of the body for remedial or hygienic purposes, consisting of any one or all of the following procedures with the hands or instruments:

Rubbing, stroking, kneading, or tapping.

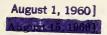
- D. Massage Schools, for the purpose of this Ordinance, are hereby defined to include any location defined in "A" or "B" above, where the act of massage as defined in "C" above is either taught or practiced.
- E. Massage Therapy. Message therapy shall be defined as the act of body massage, either by mechanical or electrical apparatus for the purpose of massaging the body, reducing or contouring the body by the use of oil rub, salt, hot and cold packs, cold showers and cabinet baths.
- F. Massage Therapist. A massage therapist shall be deemed to be a person, male or female, who practices, administers or teaches all or any of the subjects, or methods of treatment contained in subsection "E".
- G. Massage Therapy Clinic. A massage therapy clinic shall be construed and deemed to be any shop, establishment or any place of business therein where any of, or all of, these methods of treatment defined above are administered or used.
- H. Message Therapy School. The massage therapy school shall mean any duly registered massage therapy establishment where a

tutition fee is charged for the instruction of massage therapy techniques.

I. Board shall mean Board of Public Safety of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana.

Section IV. Licenses and Permits Required.

- A. Each person, firm or corporation which operates, conducts or maintains a school of massage, massage parlor, massage therapy clinic or bathhouse shall make application for a license to operate such school of massage massage parlor, massage therapy clinic or bathhouse with the Board of Public Safety of the City of Indianapolis on application forms as prescribed by the Board..
- B. Such application for license shall contain the following information and should be individually signed by the applicant:
 - 1. Name of applicant.
 - 2. Residence address of applicant, and
 - 3. Business address of applicant.
- 4. Number of massage tables, shower stalls, bath stalls, or other such individual units.
- 5. The age and citizenship of the applicant, in the case of individuals, and of the manager and officers in the case of a corporation.
- 6. The names, addresses, ages, citizenship and designations of each person connected with the applicant's establishments.
- 7. Whether the applicant or its manager or officers have ever been previously engaged in operating a School of Massage, Massage Parlor, Massage Therapy Clinic or Bathhouse.
- 8. Whether any applicant, or in the case of a corporation, its manager officers, directors, or stockholders have ever been convicted of any act of violance, moral turpitude, sex offense, or prior violation of this Ordinance.



- 9. Type of license being applied for by the applicant, i. e., School of Massage, Massage Parlor, Massage Therapy Clinic or Bathhouse.
- C. Along with the operator's application for a license there should be filed a verified application for an operator's permit by each individual who practices massage technique or is employed in the establishment; said application should contain the following information:
 - 1. Name.
 - 2. Age.
 - 3. Address.
 - 4. Citizenship.
- 5. Whether convicted of any public offense concerning an act of violence, moral turpitude, sex offense or prior violation of this Ordinance.
 - 6. Nature of work performed.
- D. Along with the aforesaid applications for licenses and permits, there should be a certificate from a duly licensed medical practitioner, on a form prescribed by the Health and Hospital Corporation of Marion County, certifying that said applicant is free from communicable diseases and that said examination has been made within 30 days prior to the application for the license or permit herein sought.
- E. Along with the aforesaid applications for licenses and permits, there should be filed two letters of recommendation by responsible citizens.

Section V. License and Operator Permit Fees.

- A. Each person, firm, corporation or association which operates a massage parlor, massage therapy clinic, or bathhouse or any combination thereof shall pay an annual license fee of \$25.00.
- B. Along with the application for each operator's permit, there shall be filed an annual fee of \$10.00.

Section VI. Operations.

- A. Ages. It shall be unlawful for any person to be employed by any such licensee or to be within view of any of the services or facilities rendered by a Massage Parlor, Massage Therapy Clinic, or Bathhouse who has not reached the age of 21 years.
- B. Inspection. Every School of Massage, Massage Parlor, Massage therapy Clinic or Bathhouse shall be open for inspection at all times by duly authorized representatives of the City Departments concerned with the licensing, supervision and inspection of such establishments upon the showing of proper and legal credentials by such persons, and the application for license as hereinbefore provided for shall expressly authorize said inspections by said City Departments.

Section VII. Issuance and Rejection of Applications—Qualifications.

- 1. The Board of Public Safety, before issuing a license, as is provided for herein, shall investigate the character of the applicant or applicants and the officers directors, and manager of the business if it be a corporation. No license shall be issued if the said Board shall find that any of the persons named in the application or employees thereof are not persons of good moral character, or that any of said persons have previously been connected with any School of Massage, Massage Parlor, Massage Therapy Clinic or Bathhouse where the license therefor has heretofore been revoked, or where any of the provisions of the law applicable to Schools of Massage, Massage Parlors, Massage Therapy Clinics, or Bathhouses have been violated, or if the premises sought to be so licensed fail to comply in any manner with the regulations, ordinances, and laws applicable thereto.
- 2. The Board of Safety, before issuing a permit as is provided for herein, shall investigate the character of the applicant. No permit shall be issued if the said Board shall find that the applicant is not a person of good moral character, or that said person has had his permit revoked and not reissued or said persons fail to meet the physical qualifications required by this Ordinance. All applicants for license to engage in the Practice of Modern Massage or Physical therapy, as defined herein, must submit to the Board a certificate or affidavit of their respective qualifications as to schooling, training, and experience and where and how obtained.

- 3. All applications for license and permits must be acted upon within 60 days after presentation; if not they will be considered as granted.
- 4. Anyone whose application for license or application for operator's permit has been denied by the Board of Safety may petition for judicial review of said decision of said Board to either the Circuit Court of Marion County or the Superior Court of Marion County.
- 5. All fees, if applicable for license or permit is denied by the Board of Safety, shall not be returned to the applicant.
- 6. Any person who has any visible symptoms of a contagious disorder, such as a rash, discharge or fever or who is complaining of a sore throat shall not be attended by any licensee or operator under this Ordinance.
- 7. No School of Massage, Massage Parlor, Massage Therapy Clinic, or Bathhouse shall be operated or conducted in, or with a direct opening to living quarters. There must be a separate entrance to the living quarters, and a separate entrance to the place of business. No one should use the business quarters for a place of habitation.
- 8. All licensed operators under this Ordinance shall have a "visible means" on the outside of their establishment designating their establishment as a School of Massage, Massage Parlor, Massage Therapy Clinic, Bathhouse, licensed under this Ordinance.
- 9. All licensed operators or permit holders under this Ordinance shall show their license or permits in a visible location in their establishment.
- 10. All licensees or permit holders shall be subject to all other city ordinances, county ordinances and State of Indiana statutes and to the regulations of various administrative bodies of the City, County and State, and violation of such regulations, ordinances or statutes shall be grounds for revocation of licenses or permits.

Section VIII. Violations.

1. All complaints of alleged violations of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be made in writing to the Board of Public Safety. At any time after receipt of said complaints, the said Board may deter-

mine sufficient cause exists for a hearing on the revocation of any such license heretofore granted, and shall, after 7 days written notice delivered personally or by Registered or Certified Mail to the person or persons affected thereby, order a hearing to be held on said complaints, and ordering the persons affected thereby to show cause why their licenses or permits should not be revoked.

- 2. After a hearing thereon, if the Board should determine that said license or permit shall be revoked, no refund of license or permit fee shall be due.
- 3. In the event of the Board's revocation of a license or permit, affected licensees or permit holders may petition for judicial review of said decision to either the Circuit Court of Marion County or the Superior Court of Marion County.
- 4. Licenses shall be subject to transfer of location only, and then only, at the discretion of the Board of Safety.
- 5. An individual who has had his application or card denied or application or permit revoked must wait one year before filing again.
- 6. Licensee within five days after the discontinuation of employment of an individual must notify the Board of Safety of such action.
- 7. Licenses of instructors, attendants, practitioners, or employees will automatically terminate ten days after the change of home address or business address of said licensee, unless said licensee notifies the Board of Public Safety in writing, by Registered or Certified Mail, or in person, prior to the expiration of said ten-day period of said new address or addresses.

Section IX. Penalties. In addition to rejection of new applications and revocation of existing licenses, any person, firm or corporatin, who shall violate any of the provisions of this Chapter, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$500.00, or imprisoned for not less than five days, nor more than sixty days, or both. Each day a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

Section X. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect 30 days after passage, approval by the Mayor, and compliance with all laws pertaining thereto.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 59, 1960

AN ORDINANCE repealing General Ordinance No. 104, 1959, of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana.

Section 1. That General Ordinance No. 104, 1959, be, and the same is, hereby repealed.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect, from and after its passage, approval by the Mayor, and compliance with all laws pertaining thereto.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 60, 1960

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, General Ordinance No. 140, 1951, as amended, and more particularly Title 5, Chapter 1 of the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, by the addition thereto of a new section, Section 5-113.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA:

Section 1. That Title 5, Chapter 1 of the Municipal Code of Indianapolis, 1951, General Ordinance No. 140, 1951, as amended, be and the same is hereby amended by the addition thereto of Section 5-113 thereto as follows, to-wit:

Section 5-113. Furnishing Records and Reports-

- (a) The Bureau of Fire Prevention shall be permitted to develop pictures of structures and areas damaged by fire, and to supply the same to property owners and insurers upon the payment of \$3.00 per picture for each copy of such picture so requested, or of such report as may be furnished.
- (b) The Chief of Police of the Indianapolis Police Department, The Chief of the Fire Department or the Prosecuting Attorney for the Nineteenth Judicial Circuit may, in their individual discretion, determine and direct in writing that any such reports are of a confidential nature and shall not be so made available.
- (c) The Chief of the Indianapolis Fire Department shall assign appropriate personnel to the duties created by this Ordinance, and shall require of him or them such bond as the Board of Public Safety shall direct and such bond must be approved by said Board of Public Safety. Such personnel shall make records and photographs available during all regular hours of the Records Division of the Indianapolis Fire Department, such hours being prescribed by the Chief of the Fire Department.
- (d) The fees and charges paid for the photographs or reports shall be credited to the City General Fund together with a weekly written report setting out the number of requests for reports and photos received, the number of reports and photos furnished and the amount of the fees received.
- (e) No charge shall be made for the furnishing of said reports or photos in paragraph (a) above, to any City, County, Township or State Governmental unit.
- Section 2. No record or records or any photo or record determined to be confidential, shall be included in the records or photos covered by this chapter.

(a) Beginning at a point 370.2 feet Northeast of the North curb line of Ohio Street and extending 18 feet Northeast on the Southeast side of Massachusetts Avenue, for the use and occupancy of A & B Typewriter Supply & Service Co., 243-245 Massachusetts Avenue.

Section 2. That said loading zone is hereby declared to be subject to all existing traffic and parking regulations, and to any later ordinances and regulations as may be applicable.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval by the Mayor, and compliance with all laws pertaining thereto.
