CONTROLLER'S REPORT.

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE. OFFICE OF CITY CONTROLLER, INDIANAPOLIS, IND., March I, 1909.

Hon. Charles A. Bookwalter, Mayor, and the President and Members of the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: I herewith submit my report for the fiscal year ending with December 31, 1908, exhibiting revenues, receipts and expenditures, and the sources from which the revenues are derived.

The total bonded debt on January I, 1908, was \$2,856,800. During the year we redeemed and cancelled bonds aggregating \$165,000; this amount included a bond issue of \$110,000, dated January 1, 1899, and maturing January 1, 1909; \$30,000 of these bonds were redeemed with moneys taken from the City Sinking Fund and the balance, \$80,000, by a new bond issue dated December 28, 1908, becoming due and payable \$20,000 on July 1, 1909, 1910, 1911 and 1912.

Of the \$165,000 bonds redeemed during the year \$81,000 was with moneys taken from the Sinking Fund, and the remainder, \$84,000, from the General Fund.

The total bonded debt on January I, 1909, is \$2,771,800. Of the total bonded debt at the end of the year \$2,705,500 is city debt proper, and \$66,300 is bonded debt assumed by the

city by the annexation of the towns of Brightwood, Haughville, Irvington and West Indianapolis.

Of the city debt proper \$996,000 bears three and one-half per cent. interest, and \$1,709,500 bears four per cent.; of the suburban bonded debt \$1,500 bears 3 65-100 per cent., \$4,000 bears four per cent., \$12,800 bears five per cent. and \$48,000 bears six per sent.

The total assessed valuation of taxable property in the city, as appraised in 1908, and as is shown on the tax duplicates, is \$181,710,460, from which is deducted mortgage exemptions amounting to \$5,045,270, leaving a net total appraisement subject to taxation of \$176,665,190.

The constitutional debt limit of two per cent. of the net appraisement of taxables is \$3,533,303.80, from which amount deduct total bonded debt of \$2,771,800, leaving a bond issuing margin of \$761,503.80.

On January 1, 1906, the gross cash balance was \$254,307.47, which amount included special appropriations for specific purposes aggregating \$56,151.94, leaving a cash balance available for general purposes of \$198,155.53.

On January 1, 1907, the gross cash balance was \$587,066.59, including special appropriations for specific purposes amounting to \$383,318.65, leaving an available cash balance for general purposes of \$203,747.94.

On January 1, 1908, the gross cash balance was \$514,869.12, including special appropriations and funds for specific purposes amounting to \$214,422.90, leaving a cash balance available for general purposes of \$300,446.22.

On January 1, 1909, the gross cash balance in the general fund was \$486,773.85, including special appropriations for specific purposes of \$85,393.01, leaving a cash balance available for general purposes of \$401,380.84.

Your attention is called to the several tables showing expenditures by departments, the City Sinking Fund, bonded debt statement, etc.
