#### *Hon. Geo. T. Breunig, City Controller, City:*

DEAR SIR: Since 1904 there has been no general revision of the ordinances of the City of Indianapolis. In the five years that have elapsed a very large number of new ordinances have been passed, and a large number of contracts and franchises of different kinds have been entered into by the Board of Public Works and approved by the Common Council. There have also been a large number of changes in the Cities and Towns Law of 1905 which concern the city. These legislative enactments affecting the City of Indianapolis since 1904 are now scattered through some five or six volumes, and also a large number of unbound pamphlets of proceedings of the Common Council for the year 1909. This condition is not only very inconvenient for the Common Council and all of the

different departments of the city, but is also inconvenient for the courts in cases where a city ordinance or contract is involved. Some of the Judges have made just complaint of this.

I am also informed by my deputy in the City Court that the practical enforcement of all penal ordinances has become almost impossible, for the reason that they are scattered through so many volumns without any index to enable the prosecutor or the police department to know what ordinances are in force or where to find them. I am also informed from the same source that the index to the penal ordinances contained in the Revision of 1904 is not satisfactory.

I, therefore, recommend that you ask the Common Council for an appropriation sufficient to pay for the legal work in revising, codifying, annotating and indexing the laws and ordinances of the City of Indianapolis as they now stand, and which have been enacted subsequent to the Revision of 1904, and to publish the same as a supplement to the volumn known as "Laws and Ordinances of 1904."

INTRODUCTION OF APPROPRIATION ORDINANCES

By City Controller:

Appropriation Ordinance No. 30—1909: An ordinance providing for the appropriation of \$12,000 to and for the use of the Department of Public Works, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the sum of twelve thousand (\$12,000) dollars be, and the same is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the city treasury not otherwise appropriated, to and for the use of the Department of Public Works, the sum herein appropriated (or so much thereof as may be necessary) to be used in the construction of a new bridge across the canal at Indiana avenue.

SEC. 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Which was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Finance.

By City Controller:

Appropriation Ordinance No. 31—1909: An ordinance appropriating the sum of \$11,500 to and for the use of the Department of Public Works, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the sum of eleven thousand five hundred (\$11,500) dollars be, and the same is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the city treasury not otherwise appropriated, to and for the use of the Department of Public Works, the sum herein appropriated (or so much as may be necessary) to be used in paying reductions for street improvement assessments, court costs and appraisers' fees where appeals have been taken by property owners from the assessments made by said department for improving public streets.

SEC. 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Appropriation Ordinance No. 32—1909: An ordinance providing for the appropriation of \$7,000 to and for the use of the Department of Public Works, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the sum of seven thousand (\$7,000) dollars be, and is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the city treasury not otherwise appropriated, to and for the use of the Department of Public Works, the sum herein appropriated (or so much thereof as may be necessary) to be used in repairing the Fall Creek interceptor sewer.

SEC. 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Appropriation Ordinance No. 33—1909: An ordinance appropriating \$2,500 to and for the use of the Department of Public Health and Charities, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the sum of two thousand five hundred (\$2,500) dollars be, and the same is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the city treasury not otherwise appropriated, to and for the use of the Department of Public Health and Charities, the sum herein appropriated to be added to and form a part of the appropriation heretofore made to the fund known as "Care and Prevention of Contagious Diseases."

SEC. 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Which was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Finance.

#### INTRODUCTION OF GENERAL AND SPECIAL ORDINANCES.

By City Controller:

General Ordinance No. 30—1909: An ordinance to provide for the codification, annotation, indexing, printing and publication of the charter of the City of Indianapolis as amended by the acts of 1907 and 1909, and for the codification, annotation, indexing, printing and publication of the ordinances of the City of Indianapolis subsequent to the revision of 1904 and for the indexing of the penal ordinances contained in said revision of 1904, which shall constitute a supplement to the Laws and Ordinances of 1904; providing for a commission to prepare the same and appropriating money to defray the expenses thereof.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the Corporation Counsel of said city be, and he is hereby directed, authorized and empowered to employ, at the expense of said city, two attorneys at law, both of whom shall not belong to the same political party, to make a complete revision, codification and annotation of the Charter of the City of Indianapolis as amended by the acts of 1907 and 1909, and a complete revision, codification and annotation of all the ordinances of said city now in force that were passed subsequently to the general revision of the Laws and Ordinances of 1904, and to prepare, index and superintend the publication thereof. Said attorneys shall also prepare a complete index to the penal ordinances contained in said revision of 1904. Said revision, codification and publication shall be made to the approval of said Corporation Counsel, and shall constitute and be known as a supplement to the Laws and Ordinances of 1904. The amount of compensation to be paid to each of said attorneys shall not exceed the sum of six hundred dollars. It shall be the duty of the said attorneys, in superintending the publication thereof, to read the usual proofs and prepare marginal notes and index therefor.

SEC. 2. That the City Controller be, and he is hereby authorized and directed when said attorneys so appointed shall submit said work of revision and codification complete to said Corporation Counsel, and when said Corporation Counsel shall have reported to said City Controller that said work is by him approved, to procure the printing and binding at the lowest obtainable rate of not less than five hundred, nor more than one thousand copies of said revision, and for that purpose to incur the necessary expense on behalf of said city. When printed the Controller shall furnish to members of the Common Council and to the members of each of the executive and other departments of the city government a sufficient number of copies for the convenient use of each, and shall also furnish one copy to each of the courts located in Marion County, and may dispose of the remaining copies published in such manner as, in his judgment, will best serve the public interest.

SEC. 3. For the payment of the attorneys to be appointed hereunder there is hereby appropriated to the Department of Law the sum of twelve hundred dollars, and for the printing, binding and publication of said revision there is hereby appropriated to the City Controller the further sum of fifteen hundred dollars.

SEC. 4. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage.

Which was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By City Controller:

General Ordinance No. 31—1909: An ordinance transferring the sum of \$100 from a certain fund to a certain fund, to and for the use of the Department of Public Safety, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the sum of one hundred (\$100) dollars be, and is hereby transferred from the appropriation heretofore made known as the "Incidental Fund" to the appropriation heretofore made known as

"Printing and Stationery Fund," all under and for the use of the Department of Public Safety in its office accounts.

SEC. 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Which was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Finance.

By Mr. Royse:

General Ordinance No. 32—1909: An ordinance licensing and regulating the playing, operation and use of automatic pianos, harps, phonographs, graphophones and other musical instruments played or operated by means of slots for the insertion of coins; providing penalties for the violation thereof and fixing the time when the same shall take effect.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to operate or play, or to cause or permit to be operated or played any automatic piano, harp, phonograph, graphophone or other musical instrument, operated or played by a means of a slot or slots for the insertion of coins, slugs, dies, washers or other article for which any money or other article of value is charged or received, upon or within any premises owned or occupied by such person, firm or corporation without having first obtained a license therefor from the Controller of the City of Indianapolis, which said license shall be, at all times, displayed upon the instrument for which it shall have been issued.

SEC. 2. Every applicant for license herein provided for shall make application therefor in writing to the Controller of the City of Indianapolis, which application shall set forth the kind of instrument, number of said instrument and the name of the manufacturer by whom it is made, and shall give the street and number designating the building or premises in which said instrument is to be operated or played.

SEC. 3. The Controller of the City of Indianapolis shall charge and receive a license fee of twenty dollars for each and every license issued under the provisions of this ordinance, and a separate license shall be required for each instrument wherever more than one instrument shall be played or operated in any one place.

SEC. 4. All such licenses shall expire on the 31st day of December of the year in which they are issued, but no reduction shall be made in such license fee for any period less than six months, and no license shall be issued for any fraction of a year for a less fee than six (\$6.00) dollars.

SEC. 5. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than ten (\$10.00) dollars, to which may be added imprisonment for any period not to exceed thirty (30) days, and each day or fraction of a day that such violation shall continue shall be deemed to constitute a separate offense.

SEC. 6. Nothing in this ordinance shall preclude the playing or operating of any such instrument in any club room, lodge room or rooms used or occupied by any regularly organized club, lodge or society.

SEC. 7. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication once each week for two consecutive

weeks in the Indianapolis Commercial, a daily newspaper of general circulation, printed and published in the City of Indianapolis.

Which was read a first time and referred to the Committee on License.

#### By Board of Public Works:

General Ordinance No. 33—1909: An ordinance ordering and directing the improvement of a certain street in the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, and fixing the time when same shall take effect.

WHEREAS, The Board of Public Works of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, did, on the 30th day of June, 1909, adopt Improvement Resolution No. 6015, 1909, for the improvement of Osage street, from the north property line of Ohio street to the south property line of New York street, with wooden block, asphalt, bitulithic or brick roadway and curbing; and

WHEREAS, The said Board of Public Works did at the same time fix the 19th day of July, 1909, at 10 o'clock a. m., as a date to hear all persons interested or whose property is affected by said proposed improvement; and the notice of the passage of said resolution and of the said time for hearing was published on the 2nd day of July, 1909, and the 9th day of July, 1909, in the Indianapolis Sun, a daily newspaper of general circulation, printed and published in the City of Indianapolis, and notices by mail duly forwarded as provided by law; and

WHEREAS, On the 19th day of July, 1909, the Board having met in regular session, took final action on said Improvement Resolution, confirming same without modification; and

WHEREAS, On the 19th day of July, 1909, a written remonstrance of a majority of the resident property owners was filed with the Board against the said improvement; and

WHEREAS, On the 23d day of July, 1909, the said Board of Public Works, directed that an ordinance ordering said improvement be submitted to the Common Council for their consideration and action thereon; now, therefore,

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the Board of Public Works of said city be, and are hereby ordered to improve Osage street, from the north property line of Ohio street to the south property line of New York street, with wooden block, asphalt, bitulithic or brick roadway and curbing in accordance with Improvement Resolution No. 6015, 1909, adopted by the Board of Public Works June 30, 1909, and confirmed July 19, 1909.

SEC. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

Which was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Sewers, Streets and Alleys.
