PROCEEDINGS OF COMMON COUNCIL.

REGULAR SESSION-JANUARY 19, 1891.

The Common Council of the City of Indianapolis met in the Council Chamber, Monday evening, January 19th, A. D. 1891, at 7:30 o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. Thomas L. Sullivan, Mayor, and ex officio President of the Common Council in the Chair, and 25 members, viz: Councilmen Austin, Burns, Cooper, Coy, Davis, Dunn, Gasper, Gauss, Hicklin, Markey, Martindale, Murphy, Myers, McGill, Nolan, Olsen, Pearson, Rassmann, Sherer, Stechhan, Sweetland, Trusler, Weber, Woollen and Yontz.

ABSENT-None.

The Proceedings of the Common Council for the regular session held January 15th, 1891, having been printed and placed upon the desks of the Councilmen, said Journals were approved as published.

OPENING AND REFERRING SEALED PROPOSALS.

Sealed proposals for the construction of a bridge over Pleasant Run, at Orchard avenue, were opened, read, and referred to the Committee on Bridges.

Sealed proposals for constructing the following fire cisterns, were read, and referred to the Committee on Contracts:

For constructing one two-thousand barrel cistern at or near the crossing of Pleasant Run and Gatlin street.

For constructing one two-thousand barrel cistern at or near the corner of Raymond and Shelby streets.

COMMUNICATIONS, ETC., FROM THE MAYOR.

His Honor, the Mayor, presented the following communication; which was referred to the Committee on Judiciary:

Indianapolis, Jan. 15, 1891.

Hon. THOMAS L SULLIVAN, Mayor, and the

Common Council and Board of Aldermen, Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—On behalf of the Western Paving and Supply Company, I feel that it is proper to say to you that it appears not only inequitable, but, further, contrary to law, to require the paving company to entirely lose the money due it from improving so much of Pennsylvania street as is occupied by the street railroad company as described in S. O. No. 105, 1889. When the street railroad declined to pay

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the assessment made by the city, the City Attorney was notified, and requested by the Common Council to assist in the case which was prepared for the Supreme Court, and which has since been decided. My view then was, and still is, that as the city by the improvement ordinance, as an inducement for the paving company taking the contract and doing the work, promised that there existed at the time ordinances which could be applied so as to enable the company to collect for its material and labor from the street railroad company, the sum of \$3,716.28, as afterwards ascertained and estimated; and as it has now been decided that no such ordinances existed binding the street railroad company, that both in equity and at law the city is obligated to pay the paving company that sum. This of course rests upon the well-known legal rule that if a city assumes and agrees that there are ordinances in force whereby the cost of the improvement can be collected, and such ordinance is proved to be void for any reason, the city is liable, on the ground that the legal machinery which is stipulated to be in existence, having failed through no fault of the contractor, the law raises the implication that it shall pay for what it bought, received and enjoys.

I shall be glad to confer with you at any time and place you may indicate, upon this matter, if thereby you shall secure to the paving company, in any way, its honest debt without delay and expense.

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, That the Finance Committee of said Council be, and they are hereby, authorized and directed to negotiate a temporary loan or loans in the name and on behalf of said city, in anticipation of the revenue of 1890, for any sum or sums not exceeding

in the aggregate thirty-five thousand dollars, for any term of time not extending beyond the 15th day of April, 1891, and at a rate of interest not exceeding six per cent, per annum. Said loan or loans to be made and the obligations of the city given therefor from time to time, as the needs of the city may require. That the Mayor and City Clerk be, and they are hereby, authorized and directed to exceute the proper bonds or obligations of said city for the amounts so borrowed, and for the payment of such bonds or obligations, the faith of said city of Indianapolis is hereby irrevocably pledged.

Which report was received, and the resolution adopted by the following vote:

Moved, That the City Attorney be, and is hereby directed to furnish to this body an opinion in writing upon each of the said two questions.

Councilman Woollen offered the following amendment; which was adopted:

Amend, by directing the Mayor to appoint a committee of three to confer with the City Attorney in selecting associate counsel for him in considering these questions.

The motion offered by Councilman Yontz, was them adopted as amended.

His Honor, the Mayor, appointed Councilmen Yontz, Woollen and Cooper to act as members of the above Committee.

Councilman Woollen moved that G. O. No. 30, 1890, be recalled from the Committee on Railroads.

The City Clerk proceeded to read the following entitled ordinance:

G. O. 30, 1890—An ordinance supplemental to and amendatory of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance authorizing the construction, extension and operation of certain passenger railways in and upon the streets of the City of Indianapolis, ordained and established January 18th, 1864, and of all ordinances supplemental thereto and amendatory thereof, including the ordinance of the City of Indianapolis, entitled 'An ordinance approving the sale and transfer to the Citizens' Street Railroad Company of Indianapolis, Indiana, its successors and assigns, of all the property, rights, privileges and franchises of the Citizens' Street Railway Company of Indianapolis, Indiana, and confirming unto said first named company all the rights, privileges and franchises of said latter company, subject to all the duties and obligations under which said rights, privileges and franchises have been heretofore held by said last named company; " ordained and established April 23d, 1888.

It being eleven o'clock, the Common Council adjourned before the above entitled ordinance was read the second time.
