CONTROLLER'S REPORT.

Department of Finance, Office of City Controller, Indianapolis, Ind., January 1, 1910.

Hon. Charles A. Bookwalter, Mayor, and the President and Members of the Common Council:

Gentlemen: I herewith submit my report for the fiscal year ending with December 31, 1909, exhibiting revenues, receipts and expenditures, and the sources from which the revenues are derived.

The total bonded debt on January 1, 1909, was \$2,771,800. During the year we redeemed and cancelled bonds aggregating \$88,500 with moneys taken from the City Sinking Fund. On January 15, 1909, we issued \$600,000 City Hall Bonds of 1909, \$375,000 of these bonds were taken up and paid for during the year 1909, leaving \$225,000 to be taken up during the year 1910.

The total amount of bonds outstanding on January 1, 1910, was \$3,058,300, while the total of bonds outstanding and authorized amounted to \$3,283,300. Of the total outstanding bonded debt at the end of the year \$3,008,500 is City debt proper, and \$49,800 is bonded debt assumed by the annexation of the towns of Brightwood, Haughville, Irvington and West Indianapolis.

Of the City debt proper \$1,299,000 bears three and one-half per cent. interest, and \$1,709,500 bears four per cent.; of the suburban bonded debt \$3,000 bears four per cent., \$12,800 bears five per cent., and \$34,000 bears six per cent.

The total assessed valuation of taxable property in the

City, as returned and appraised in 1909 and as is shown on the tax duplicate is \$184,429,325, from which is deducted mortgage exemptions amounting to \$5,368,235, leaving a net total appraisement subject to taxation of \$179,061,090.

The constitutional debt limit of two per cent. of the net appraisement of taxables is \$3,581,221.80, from which amount deduct total bonds outstanding and authorized, \$3,283,300, leaving a bond issuing margin of \$297,921.80.

On January 1, 1906, when we came into office, the gross cash balance in the general fund was \$254,307.47, which amount included special appropriations for specific purposes aggregating \$56,151.94, leaving a clear cash balance available for general purposes of \$198,155.53.

On January 1, 1910, the gross cash balance in the general fund was \$512,170.24, including special appropriations for specific purposes of \$244,086.36, leaving a clear cash balance available for general purposes of \$268,083.88.

Your attention is called to the several tables showing expenditures by departments; the Park Fund, City Sinking Fund, Bonded Debt Statement, etc.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the sum of \$30.14 be, and the same is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the City Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to and for the use of the Finance Department, the sum herein appropriated to be paid to Mrs. Sarah Denton, widow of Seymour Denton, deceased, being the unexpired term of retail liquor license No. 128 from March 19, 1909, to March 19, 1910. Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after

its passage.

By City Controller:

Appropriation Ordinance No. 5—1910: An ordinance appropriating the sum of \$2,500.00 to and for the use of the Department of Public Health and Charities, and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) be and is hereby appropriated to and for the use of the Department of Public Health and Charities to be used for the establishment of a pathological laboratory at the City Hospital and the salary of a pathologist.

INTRODUCTION OF GENERAL AND SPECIAL ORDINANCES.

By City Controller:

General Ordinance No. 8—1910: An ordinance providing for the transfer of \$29,946.25 from a certain fund to a certain fund in and for the use of the Department of Public Works and fixing a time when the same shall take effect.

Section I. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, That the sum of twenty-nine thousand nine hundred forty-six dollars and twenty-five cents (\$29,946.25) be, and the same is hereby transferred from the appropriation heretofore made to the "City Hall Building Fund of 1906" to the "City Hall Building Fund of 1909" to and for the use of the Department of Public Works.

SEC. 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after

its passage.

Which was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Finance.

By Mr. Stilz:

General Ordinance No. 9—1910: An ordinance regulating the trimming, removal, planting and cutting of trees, shrubs, vines, hedges and plants within the limits of public streets, alleys, thoroughfares, lawns and parks, conferring authority over the same upon the Board of Park Commissioners, providing for the issuance of licenses to treetrimmers and the assessment of fines for violation thereof.

SECTION I. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, That the Board of Park Commissioners of the City of Indianapolis, anapolis, that the board of Fark Commissioners of the City of Indianapolis shall have power from time to time to adopt and enforce rules, regulations and specifications for the trimming, removal and planting, and protection of all trees, shrubs, vines, flowers, hedges and plants within the limits of any public street, alley, thoroughfare or lawn in said city, and shall have power to regulate and prescribe terms and conditions upon which permits to trim, remove or plant any such trees, shrubs, vines, flowers or plants within said city shall be granted. SEC. 2. That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to trim, remove or plant, injure or destroy any tree, vine, shrub, flower or plant within the limits of any public street, alley, thoroughfare, lawn, park, parkway or boulevard without first obtaining written permission from the Board of Park Commissioners of the City of

Indianapolis.

SEC. 3. That said Board of Park Commissioners shall hereafter be empowered and authorized to require the owner or occupant of property abutting any street or alley to remove or trim any tree, shrub, vine, flower or plant, or part thereof, in front of the property of any such owner or occupant, which may be dead or in unsightly or in a dangerous condition or which may project over such street beyond the property line of such owner or occupant, to a height of ten (10) feet or less, according to size, or any tree obstructing the free passage of pedestrians on the sidewalk, by first causing notice to be served upon such owner or occupant of the premises adjoining said street or alley ten (10) days prior to the time designated for the removal or trimming of any such tree,

shrub, vine, flower or plant.

And said Board shall have power to require the owners or occupants of property abutting any street or alley to plant such trees, vines, flowers and plants in front of the property of any such owner or occupant as said Board shall deem advisable, by first causing notice to be served upon such owner or occupant of the premises adjoining any street or alley in said city sixty (60) days prior to the time designated for the planting of such trees, vines, flowers or plants. If, after sixty (60) days from the service of such notice, any such owner or occupant shall fail or refuse to so plant such trees, vines, flowers or plants, then said Board of Park Commissioners may plant the same and the expense thereof shall become a lien against the adjoining property as provided by Section 234 of the Act of the General Assembly of Indiana of 1905, en-

titled "An Act concerning municipal corporations."

Sec. 4. It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in the business of planting, cutting, removing, trimming or spraying trees, shrubs, vines, etc., in the City of Indianapolis, without first procuring from the City Controller, on an application approved by the Board of Park Commissioners, a license each year, authorizing any such person so to engage in any such business. And said Board of Park Commissioners shall not approve any such application without first being satisfied of the competency of the applicant to engage in such business. Upon the issuance of such license by the City Controller, the applicant shall pay a license fee of one dollar (\$1.00), which shall entitle him to conduct any such business during the calendar year within which the license is issued. The Board of Park Commissioners within said city shall have power to revoke any such license whenever it shall appear to such Board that the licensee has violated any of the rules of the said Board which may be adopted in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, or has violated any ordinance of such city, or any law of the State of Indiana, pertaining to the care, preservation, trimming or removal of trees, etc., in such city.

SEC. 5. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined in any sum not less than one

dollar (\$1.00) nor not more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars.

SEC. 6. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication once each week for two consecutive weeks in the Indianapolis Commercial, a daily newspaper of general circulation printed and published in the city of Indianapolis, Ind.
