Under Section 7, part 2, of the building ordinance, it has been the custom of this department to charge a fee of 50 cents for every \$500 of cost of such alteration or improvements, which would make a permit fee of \$119.00.

The opinion of the City Attorney (a copy attached), at the request of the traction company, decided the charge in such case should be \$1.00.

I therefore recommend that the matter be referred to the City Con-troller for adjustment under said opinion.

DEAR SIR: Complying with your request with reference to the pay-ment by the Terre Haute, Indianapolis and Eastern, of a fee of \$110.00 for permit for the construction of a certain stack erected in connection with their power house, I beg to advise you that it is our opinion that such construction can not be made a matter of separate charge from the original cubic foot estimate on the building, and that the provision of the

ordinance calling for a charge upon every \$500.00 of the estimated cost of repairs, alterations, etc., does not include such construction as that contemplated by the traction company, and that the only charge properly to be made in such a case is the fee of \$1.00 covering the cost of the issuing of the permit.

It is therefore our opinion that there should be returned to the traction company \$118.00 covering an erroneous charge made for the permit. I send you a copy of this letter, so that you may have the same delivered to Mr. Kimball, City Controller, advising him that the matter has been taken up with our department.

DEAR SIR: At the last meeting of the Council an ordinance was passed appropriating the sum of \$5,000.00 for the construction of a bridge across Pogues Run at Tenth street, and another ordinance appropriating the sum of \$5,000.00 for the construction of a bridge across Pogues Run at Dorman street.

We received bids today, the lowest bid for the Tenth street bridge being \$5,478, and the lowest bid for the Dorman street bridge being \$3,985. However, another bid was submitted for the two bridges together for the sum of \$9,300. It would be impossible to award the contract for the Tenth street bridge on account of the low bid exceeding the appropriation. The bid of \$9,300 for the two bridges combined is \$163 less than the two low single bids, so that if it were possible to accept the bid of \$9,300we would not only be saving \$163, but it would be keeping within the appropriation. However, since separate appropriations were made for the two bridges combined unless these two funds were converted into one by an ordinance of the Council.

We therefore request that you recommend to the Common Council the passage of an ordinance appropriating the sum of \$10,000 to a fund for the construction of bridges across Pogues Run at Tenth street and Dorman street, the same to be transferred from the fund for construction of bridge across Pogues Run at Dorman street and from the fund for construction of bridge across Pogues Run at Tenth street.

Since this money has been appropriated once, and since we have what we consider a good bid for the construction of these two bridges, we would recommend that this ordinance be passed under suspension of the rules at tonight's meeting.

From Board of Park Commissioners:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS, OFFICE OF THE BOARD. INDIANAPOLIS, IND., November 2, 1910.

To the President and Members of the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: I am directed by the Board of Park Commissioners to send you, as I do enclosed herewith, a copy of a letter received by this department from Mr. Benjamin Douglass, State Entomologist, under date of October 24, 1910. You will note that Mr. Douglass calls attention to a condition of trees in the street lawns in the city, of which this department has been cognizant for several years. The Board of Park Commissioners, however, has never felt that it had the funds to undertake the care of any other trees beside those in public parks. It is urgent, nevertheless, that before long something be done to care for the trees in street lawns, because the dangers which Mr. Douglass points out are not in any respect exaggerated by him.

The Board of Park Commissioners wishes to place the situation before you so that it may be thoroughly understood. The Board does not wish, at the present time, to ask for an appropriation of funds sufficient to cover the expense of maintaining a tree spraying crew for city trees; but if the Mayor and the Legislative and Financial Departments of the city feel that an expense of this kind may be incurred next year, the Board would do its utmost to make the work of such a department, economically administered, efficient and worth while to the city. It appears quite certain that if some steps of the kind suggested are not taken at once to protect the city's trees, thousands of them will be lost, and the city will suffer incalculable damage as a result of its neglect to adopt the simplest precautionary measures.

If it should appear that an appropriation can be made for the year 1911, the Board of Park Commissioners would be glad to furnish a detailed estimate of the cost of purchasing equipment and supplies, with a year's maintenance. As it has been estimated, without going into details, this would be approximately \$5,000.

OFFICE OF STATE ENTOMOLOGIST. INDIANAPOLIS, IND., October 24, 1910.

Leroy Snyder, Esq., The Park Board, Indianapolis:

DEAR SIR: I desire to call the attention of the Park Board to a condition of the trees in the city which I believe has existed long enough. Throughout the central part of the city the soft maples have been infested with the cottony maple scale for the past several years. Along the edges of the business section the soft maples have been practically exterminated by this pest. The scale has, in the last three years, worked to the north and east and is now spreading over the residence part of town. I feel that some very strong measures should be taken to protect the trees in this section.

The pest will attack not only the soft maples but several other species of shade trees. There are in this city elm trees that were killed by the cottony maple scale. A resident of North Meridian street recently told me that he did not care to spend money protecting the trees in his yard as long as the city maintained a pest on the parkway in front of his house. I think that this attitude is common among the citizens.

Would it not be possible for the Park Board to invest in more spraying machines and put a large force of men at work trying to head off this destructive scale? Such an investment would not be only for the immediate future but the machines would be available for fighting other insect pests which are liable to occur in destructive numbers almost any time. In this connection I will say that unless something is done the city trees will be defoliated next year by the tussock moth. Thousands of cocoons of this caterpillar are to be found on the trees of the city today. This should be sufficient warning to prepare for the future.

I trust that these suggestions will meet with your serious consideration and that your Board will see fit to provide the additional equipment mentioned above.
