Proceedings of Common Council.

REGULAR SESSION—November 4, 1878.

The Common Council of the City of Indianapolis met in its Council Chamber, on Monday evening, November 4th, A. D. 1878, at half-past seven o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. John Caven, Mayor, and, ex officio, President of the Common Council, in the Chair, and the following members: Councilmen Anderson, Bermann, Brown, Bruner, Cummings, Dill, Layman, Marsee, Maus, Morris, Morse, McGinty, McKay, O'Brien, Off, Reading, Reasner, Rodibaugh, Showalter, Sindlinger, Steeg, Walker, Wiese, and Wright—24.

ABSENT-Councilman Tucker-1.

The Proceedings of the Common Council, for the regular session, held on September 16th, October 7th, and October 21st, and for the adjourned sessions, held on September 23d and October 14th, 1878, having been printed, and placed on the desks of the Councilmen, said proceedings were duly approved as published.

Sealed proposals for making the below-described improvements [under the provisions of the special ordinances noted before the several descriptions], were opened and read by the City Clerk, and were then referred to the Committee on Contracts;

- O. 42, 1878—Improving the third alley east of the intersection of Clifford avenue and Pendleton Pike, from Pendleton Pike to the first alley south of Pendleton Pike, by grading and graveling.
- S. O. 48, 1878—Improving Highland street, from Washington street to Ohio street, by grading and graveling the street and sidewalks, and bowldering and curbing with stone the gutters thereof.

On Councilman Brown's motion, all the bids for improving Highland street were rejected.

On Councilman Morris's motion, the bids received for making the improvement described in Special Ordinance 42, 1878, were referred to the Committee on Contracts, with instructions to report thereon before the close of the present session.

REPORTS, ETC., FROM CITY OFFICERS.

The City Civil Engineer submitted the following report; which, on motion, was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

Indianapolis, November 4, 1878.

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen: —Upon the recommendation of the Board of Public Improvements, I was directed to estimate the cost of bowldering the intersection of Washington and Illinois streets.

I find that said intersection can be bowldered, and put in good shape, for \$495—of which amount the Citizens' Street Railway Company should pay, as their portion, \$193.68, leaving \$301.32 to be paid by the city.

In the Matter of the Petitioners for the laying out, opening, and widening Shelby street, to a width of sixty (60) feet, from Prospect street to South Corporation Line, in the City of Indianapolis, Ind.:

John Fike, your petitioner, respectfully represents to your honorable board that he is the owner of the following tracts, or lots, of land, and appurtenances thereto belonging, situated on the east side of Shelby street, and known as Louthain & Co's Southeast Addition to the City of Indianapolis, said County and State. That said land is subdivided into twelve (12) lots, numbered from one (1) to twelve (12) inclusive. That each lot fronts on said Shelby street, on the east side of said street, and each lot is 32 45-100 feet in width; and there is growing upon said lots, within about seven or eight feet of said Shelby street, east line, as it now is, a row of choice apple trees, eight in number, yearly bearing fruit of great value to the said petitioner; and should the street be widened as proposed, said fruit and trees will be wholly destroyed from the use and benefit of your petitioner, and to his damage of fifty dollars. And your petitioner further says, that running the whole length of said lots is a picket fence that will of necessity have to be moved, and re set on

line of the proposed street when widened, which will further damage your peti-

tioner twenty-five dollars.

Your petitioner further says that, by the proposed laying out, opening, and widening of Shelby street, at the point where his said property fronts said street, seven and one-half feet of his land will be taken. That by so doing, his brick dwelling house will be greatly damaged in value. That the front yard is filled with growing shrubs and plants of great value in the sale of said premises, and that by said street widening, at this point, the lots 3, 4, 5, and 6, on the middle of which is situated said dwelling house, will lose the benefit of said shrubs and plants, and said property will lose in value by the loss of the frontage of said seven and one-half feet, five hundred dollars. And your petitioner says he will be damaged by said widening and taking off of the said lots—to wit, 3, 4, 5, and 6—upon which his said brick two-story dwelling house is situate, said seven and one-half feet, and the destroying of the trees and thrubs growing thereon, in the sum of five hundred dollars.

And your petitioner further says that, by the taking of seven and one-half feet off from the front of said twelve lots, he will be damaged in the sum of fifty dollars

on each lot.

Wherefore, he prays your honorable board that said property may be viewed by appraisers, and his damages be enquired into, before said widening be finally passed upon, and the question decided whether it is of public utility to widen said street; and if so, to grant said petitioner herein his damages, which he claims in the whole sum of fifteen hundred dollars.

Is a petition from The Sewing Machine Cabinet Company, praying for the vacation of such portion of "a small alley, running from Hill avenue, on the north, to the railroad track of the Cleveland, Columbus, Cincinnati & Indianapolis Railway Company, on the south," as lies between the real estate upon which their factory-buildings are situated and lots 113, 114, 115, and 116, Fletcher's Third Addition, upon which said lots their saw-mill is located—the portion of "alley" asked to be vacated extending from aforesaid railway track to an east and west alley lying north of before-mentioned real estate and lots.

By an examination of the plat of Fletcher's Third Addition, we find that the "small alley" asked to be vacated is a sixty-foot street, named "Wheeler street." We, therefore, report against granting the prayer of the petitioners.

2d. Is a petition from R. L. McOuat, asking that an order be passed vacating the streets and alleys in R. L. McOuat's Second Addition, that he may put the same under cultivation.

Our examination of the plat of this Addition shows that only one alley, thirty-two feet in width, lies wholly within the same. As Mr. McOuat seems to be the sole owner of the Addition, we can make no valid objection to vacating this alley and plat. We would, therefore, recommend that this case be referred to the City Attorney, with instructions to take further necessary proceedings in keeping with section 18 of the Act of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, approved on March 17th, 1875 [see Charter and Ordinances, page 153], provided he shall receive assurance from the petitioner that "all the expense of such proceedings shall be paid by said petitioner."

Councilman Bermann offered the following motion; which was referred to the Committee on Gas-Light:

That the City Civil Engineer be instructed to notify the Indianapolis Gas-Light & Coke Company to discontinue lighting the second lamp south of McCarty street, on the east side of New Jersey street, and, in place thereof, to light the first lamp west of New Jersey street, on the north side of McCarty street.

Also, offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the City Civil Engineer be directed to notify the contractor to bowlder the street and alley crossings along the present line of improvement, between Delaware and East streets, on McCarty street, provided said contractor will do the work at his present contract price, the entire cost not to exceed \$110.

Councilman Brown also offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Board of Public Improvements be instructed and authorized to secure, by lease, the proper grounds, procure the necessary material, and cause to be erected a suitable building, for the purpose of working the prisoners confined in the Station House; also, that they be authorized to make the best possible arrangements for procuring stone, to be broken by said prisoners and used for street improvements

Councilman Cummings presented the following communication; which was duly received:

Indianapolis, November 4, 1878.

To the City Council:

I wish you would please get some ground for me to bury the dead in. We are out of ground, and must have some. There are some lots in the cemetery for sale, and the owners want to sell them.

The fences want fixing. The fence on the south side of the yard is falling

down.

Immediately after the reading of preceding communication, the same gentleman offered the following motion; which was referred to the Committee on Benevolence and Hospitals, with instructions to contract for and purchase additional burying ground, present expenditure being limited to \$50:

That the Committee on Finance be requested to look into the purchasing or providing of more ground, for the burying of the dead, in the Greenlawn Cemetery, as said ground is reported to have been all filled up.

The same gentleman offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Street Commissioner be ordered to cause the work to be done of laying a plank street crossing on Illinois street, corner of First street. John Bevan will furnish the material for same.

Councilman Dill offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the City Civil Engineer be directed to report the cost per square of removing the blocks, and filling Tennessee street to the proper grade with good river or creek gravel.

Also, offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Street Commissioner be directed to place a double-stone crossing at the four crossings at the intersection of Illinois and Washington streets.

Also, offered the following motion; which the Chair (Hon. Mr. Walker, President pro tempore) declared out of order:

That the Street Commissioner be directed to build a fence around the four crossings mentioned in the previous motion, as a precaution for the passers.

Councilman Layman offered the following motions; which were severally adopted:

That R. P. Dunning proceed with the work of improving Georgia street, between Illinois street and Meridian street, inside the next eight days; and if not commenced by November 12th, 1878, the contract to be declared null and void.

That the City Attorney be instructed to give an opinion on section 18 of a certain Act of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, approved March 17th, 1875, [see "Charter and Ordinances," page 152]. The interpretation of this law is necessary, both as to opening and vacation cases, with a view, if possible, to attach the expenses attending same to the petitioners for openings, vacations, etc., thus avoiding a tax upon the general public, through drafts upon the city treasury.

Also, offered the following motions; which were severally referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to clean the gutters of N. New Jersey street, between Massachusetts and Fort Wayne avenues.

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to put in wooden bridges at the intersection of Home and Central avenues. This crossing is very important to the city's interest, as it is the most direct route for the Sixth street fire company to reach the northeastern part of the city.

Councilman Maus offered the following motion; which was duly adopted:

That the City Civil Engineer, with the Board of Public Improvements, ascertain the cost of erecting a fence along each side of Michigan street, between the mill-race and White River, and report, at the next session of the City Council, and recommend what action should be taken to put said street in a safe condition for public travel.

Also, offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Street Commissioner be directed to fill the mud-hole in front of the City Hospital grounds, with gravel.

Councilman Morris offered the following motion; which was duly adopted:

That thirty days' extension of time be granted John Greene, in which to complete his contracts for improving Beech and Lawrence streets.

Also, offered the following motions; which were severally referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Street Commissioner be directed to fill up, with gravel, the mud-holes in the first alley east of Alvord street, running north from Malott avenue.

That the Street Commissioner be directed to re-gravel Hill avenue, where needed.

Also, offered the following motion; which, on motion, was referred to the Judiciary Committee and the City Attorney:

That the Board of Public Improvements, together with the City Attorney, be instructed to examine the charter of the Citizens' Street Railway Company of the City of Indianapolis, to ascertain if the said company are fulfilling their part of the contract with the city, in building the new line of railway on Massachusetts avenue, by laying old rail and turning them the reverse way to which they were intended to lay, thereby making it an impossibility for a wagon to get out if it should happen to get in between the rails, without great inconvenience and, in all probability with the loss of one or more wheels; also in laying a Trail on Nable probability, with the loss of one or more wheels; also, in laying a T-rail on Noble street; and to report to this Council without delay.

Councilman Morse offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Street Commissioner be directed to fill the chuck-holes in New York street, between West street and Blackford street.

Councilman McGinty offered the following motion; which was duly adopted:

That Coffin, Fletcher & Co. be granted permission to put down a line of telephone, from Holmes, Pettit & Bradshaw's pork-house, along the first alley to White River, to their pork-house, on Shearer street.

Councilman McKay offered the following motion; which was duly adopted:

That the City Attorney be instructed to prepare the necessary deeds of conveyance from the City of Indianapolis to the grantors of the property known as the " North Park."

Councilman O'Brien offered the following petition; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

Gentlemen of the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

There is a very bad crossing at the intersection of Pearl and Missouri streets, which your petitioners would respectfully ask your honorable body to have repaired soon.
