PROCEEDINGS OF COMMON COUNCIL.

REGULAR SESSION-JANUARY 5, 1880.

The Common Council of the City of Indianapolis met in the Council Chamber, on Monday evening, January 5th, A. D. 1880, at seven o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. John Caven, Mayor, and, ex officio President of the Common Council, in the chair, and 21 members, viz.: Councilmen Bermann, Bieler, Brown, Bryce, Carey, Dowling, Downey, Hamilton, Kahn, King, Lamb, Morrison, McGinty, McKay, Prier, Rooker, Sheppard, Shilling, Tucker, Van Vorhis, and Wiese.

Absent, 4-viz. Councilmen Harmening, O'Connor, Pearson, and Wood.

The Proceedings of the Common Council, for the regular session, held on December 15th, 1879, having been printed, and placed on the desks of the Councilmen, said journals were approved as published.

Sealed proposals for making the below-described improvements, were opened, read, and referred to the Committees on Contracts:

- (S. O. 45, 1879)—For grading and graveling the second alley west of Noble street, from Lockerbie street to New York street.
- (S. O. 57, 1879)—For grading and graveling, (where not already improved,) the sidewalks of Shelby street, from the southern terminus of Virginia avenue to Raymond street.
- (S. O. 60, 1879)—For curbing with stone the sidewalks, and bowldering the gutters, (except where already curbed and bowldered,) of Alabama street, from Washington street to Wabash street.

REPORT FROM THE COMMITTEE ON CONTRACTS.

The Committee on Contracts, through Councilman Brown, submitted the following report:

To the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Contracts, to whom were referred sundry proposals, presented to Council, December 15th, 1879, have examined the same, and find them to be as follows, viz.:

First. For grading, and paving with brick the west sidewalk of Maple street, between Ray and McCarty streets—

D. A. Haywood, 30 cents per lineal foot front; corner posts 35 cents each. William Morrison, 27 cents per lineal foot front.

John Schier, 26 cents per lineal foot front.

John Schier, being the lowest and best bidder, we recommend he be awarded the contract.

Second. For paving with brick and curbing with stone the sidewalks, and bowldering the gutters, of McCarty street, from Delaware street west to the Jeffersonville, Madison & Indianapolis Railroad tracks—

Henry Clay, \$1.22 per lineal foot front on each side.

Richard Carr, \$1.18 per lineal foot front on each side.

James Mahoney, \$1.14½ per lineal foot front on each side.

Dunning and Hudson, \$1.11 per lineal foot front on each side.

David A. Haywood, \$1.05 per lineal foot front on each side; corner posts35 cents each.

David A. Haywood, being the lowest and best bidder, we recommend he beawarded the contract.

Third. For improving John street, from Peru avenue to Massachusetts avenue, by grading and graveling the roadway and sidewalks thereof—

Richard Carr, 75 cents per lineal foot front on each side. Henry Clay, 69 cents per lineal foot front on each side. Dunning & Hudson, 66 cents per lineal foot front on each side. James Mahoney, 49½ cents per lineal foot front on each side.

James Mahoney, being the lowest and best bidder, we recommend he be awarded the contract.

Fourth. For grading and bowldering the south gutter of St. Clair street, from Massachusetts avenue to the west line of lot 2, in outlot 42—

D. A. Haywood, 49 cents per lineal foot front. Richard Carr, 45 cents per lineal foot front. Dunning & Hudson, 41 cents per lineal foot front. Henry Clay, 41 cents per lineal foot front. James Mahoney, 40 cents per lineal foot front.

James Mahoney, being the lowest and best bidder, we recommend he be awarded the contract.

Fifth. For grading, and paving with brick (where not already paved) the east sidewalk of Park avenue, between Cherry street and Christian avenue—

William Morrison, 33 cents per lineal foot front.

D. A. Haywood, 32 cents per lineal foot front; corner posts 30 cents each.

John Schier, 31 cents per lineal foot front.

John Schier, being the lowest and best bidder, we recommend he be awarded the contract.

The second, third, fourth and fifth clauses were then concurred in, and the contracts awarded as recommended.

COMMUNICATIONS, ETC., FROM THE MAYOR.

His Honor, Mayor Caven, presented the following communication which was referred to the Hospital Board:

To His Honor, the Mayor, and the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned petitioner, takes permission to call your attention to the fact that he is the owner and occupant of house No. 151, Elizabeth street, in this city; that opposite of said house there is a vacant lot which is much deeper than the street; that on account of the absence of gutters in said street, the water, whenever it rains, runs into said lot, becomes stagnant there, and spreads a disagreeable and unhealthy odor. The same condition of things exists four lots west from the said house 151 Elizabeth street, where this petitioner also owns a lot, and where the lot next to it also fills with water after a rain. These two vacant lots are, in consequence of the absence of gutters, regular nuisances, which hinder this petitioner in the full enjoyment of his property. Your petitioner therefore respectfully requests that proper steps be taken to vacate said nuisances, and that the proper officers be clothed with sufficient authority to act in the matter as it is proper.

His Honor, Mayor Caven, presented the following communication; which, on motion by Councilman McKay, was referred to His Honor, Mayor Caven, the Council and Aldermanic Committee on Public Charities and the City Attorney:

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 20th, 1879.

Hon. John Caven:

Dear Sir: — As you are doubtless aware, we are about building and operating a Friendly Inn and Work Yard. As it is a matter in which the city is directly in-

terested, permit us to explain its idea and plan of action.

The Friendly Inn is for the use of the transient and tramps who are willing to work as payment for food and lodging. It will be located on the line of the Bee Line road, on ground which is leased to us for five years, on payment of taxes, only. Our idea is expressed in the words: "Work for all. Food and Lodging for all who will work." On entering, the transient is compelled to take a bath, is furnished a clean night shirt, and is given a comfortable bed. This is in the interest of cleanliness as well as humanity. In the morning he is required to work for about three hours in payment of lodging and food. This Inn makes provision also for transient women, who will pay for what they receive by washing and cleaning.

This Inn will be located inside an enclosure which is the wood-yard. The space thus enclosed is about 14,000 square feet. In this yard there is room for several

hundred cords of wood.

This is designed to furnish work for any residents of the city who are out of work. We will pay fifty cents a day to all such, in money, food, or fuel, enough

to support them during the exigency. No one need be out of work, or suffer from hunger, or ask for charity, who is willing to work.

This Friendly Inn is no new and untried experiment. It has been tried in Boston, and in Providence, R. I., with success. In Providence the mayor reports that it saved the city \$6000. In Boston it has nearly paid expenses.

One feature of the plan which merits attention is the help it has been to these cities in diminishing the tramp element. In each city the lodgers at the station-houses are informed that they will be taken by the police to the wood-yard, will be fed, and then required to work until eleven o'clock. In Providence the falling off in station-house lodgers was 4,300 in a single year. The Overseers of the Poor in Boston report to the same effect.

The records of the city courts will show that a large number of the offenders are from this class The cost of prosecution and of maintenance in the city prison is a large item. It would certainly be a saving to the city if these men could either be forced to work, or could be kept away from the city by the knowledge that they would be required to work.

There are others, also, who, from having no proper place to go, "fall among thieves." Our Inn and yard will—1st. Thus put the work-test to each applicant for relief, to every tramp and beggar. 2d. It will furnish good baths, good beds, and good food to all who will work. 3d. It will relieve the station-houses of a crowd of disorderly or unpleasant lodgers. 4th. It will warn away from the city the tramps. 5th, It will give shelter to the stranded and forlorn. Such an enterprise in other cities is operated by the city authoritites. Here it is undertaken by private benevolence. But to ensure its success, it should have the co-operation of the city.

We respectfully ask such co-operation in money and by ordinance. We ask that a grant of one thousand dollars be made toward building and equipping the Inn. We ask that there be passed an ordinance requiring all station-house lodgers to work in the Work-Yard three hours each morning for lodging and food. We would be willing that a representative of the Council should be put on the committee of management to ensure the wise expenditure of money, and the faithful carrying out of the idea.

The estimated cost of the Inn and its full equipment is about \$2,000. When in operation, it is believed that it will be self-supporting.

Indianapolis, January 5, 1880.

To the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—In answer to your resolution requesting an opinion from the Board of Health, as to whether the Surgical Institute is a hospital or not, we reply that it is the unanimous opinion of the Board that the Surgical Institute is a hospital in the common definition of the term.

Prof. Heeban Noys, of Bloomington University, in correspondence with Dr. Parvin of this city, offers to examine the water of all the principal wells of this

city; the only expense to the city will be cost of vessels and transportation, amounting to probably ten or fifteen dollars. We recommend that that amount

be appropriated for that purpose.

All the force in the office have been busily engaged for the past six weeks in tabulating the records of this office from its commencement (a work that has never been done), for the Census Bureau and for our own use; consequently only such out-door work has been attended to as was absolutely necessary. The city has been so flooded with water that the vault-cleaning is interfered with very materially; as soon as practicable it will be pushed with vigor.

REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS.

To the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned respectfully show to your honorable body:

- 1st. That they were duly appointed by the Civil Circuit Court, Marion county, Indiana, in accordance with the provisions of an act of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, entitled "An Act in relation to the laying out, opening, widening, altering and vacation of streets, alleys, and highways, and for straightening or altering of water courses by the cities of this state, and providing for the appointment of Commissioners to assess benefits and damages, prescribing their duties and the method of procedure, and providing for the collection of benefits and payment of damages, prescribing the duties of city officers in relation thereto, and providing remedies in such matters," approved March 17th, 1875, to act as City Commissioners, to hear and determine all matters appertaining to the acquisition, laying out, altering and straightening of streets, alleys, and highways within said city, and also to hear and determine all matters appertaining to the altering or straightening of streams within said city, and the taking of lands for sewerage purposes.
 - 2d. That they did take and subscribe the oath and affirmation by law required.

II.

We do further report:

- 1st. That on the 26th day of December, 1879, we met at the office of the City Clerk, room No. 4, City Hall, at 10 o'clock A. M., pursuant to the notice hereto annexed, marked Exhibit "A."
- 2d. That we did at the time and place aforesaid enter upon the consideration of the vacation of Bobbs street, from Bates street to Meek street, more fully described in the petition to us referred, and hereto annexed and marked Exhibit "B."
- 3rd. That we did inquire into the matter of the service of notices upon the persons interested in such vacation and do herewith report said notices with the returns of service endorsed thereon.
 - 4th. That the following named persons appeared in answer to said notices, viz:

Catherine C. Bobbs, by her Attorney, James Sweetser, Mrs. W. Hall, Geo. W. Jenks.

III.

We do further report,

That we did at the time aforesaid examine witnesses and hear evidence in the matter of said vacation, that we did view the said Bobbs street, proposed to be vacated, and did ascertain that Catherine C. Bobbs is the owner of all the property upon the line of said vacation on either side thereof.

We do further report:

- 1st. That the length of said Bobbs street to be vacated is six hundred and twelve feet and eight inches, and that the width is sixty feet, and that the location of the same is between Dillon street and Grant street, and from Bates street to Meek street.
- 2d. We further report that in consideration of the vacation of said Bobbs street, Catherine C. Bobbs agrees to donate a strip of ground 33 feet wide, abutting on the east side of 1 illon street, from Bates street to Meek street, more fully described in her written agreement herewith annexed, and marked Exhibit "C." for the purpose of widening Dillon street.
- 3rd. We do assess benefits to Catherine C. Bobbs an amount equal to the expenses incurred in said vacation.

We do also report that the time of the City Commissioners in said case, is thirteen days.

Your Commissioners do therefore recommend that the said Bobbs street be vacated as prayed, and that the benefits be collected according to law.

To the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen: -The Special Committee to whom was referred the communication of the Mayor, on the subject of resolutions of respect to the memory of Gen. Jeff. C.

Davis, would report:

That in compliance with your instructions the committee presented a communication to Mrs. Davis requesting that the remains of the General be permitted to lie in state in the corridor of the Court House at such time as might be acceptable to her feelings, which request was complied with, and the body lay in state at such place a large portion of the afternoon of Dec. 2d, 1879, and although no public notice had been given, the distinguished dead was looked upon by many thousands, and a marked peculiarity was the great number of children among the visitors.

Gen. Davis was a native of Indiana, born in Clark county, March 2d, 1827, and died in Chicago, November 30th, 1879, in the 52d year of his age.

While but a boy he served with great credit as a private soldier in the war with Mexico, and was under Gen. Taylor, at the battle of Buena Vista and during the

campaign.

On the 17th day of June 1848, he was commissioned as Second Lieutenant in the 1st artillery, regular army of U.S., and was promoted to First Lieutenant on the 29th day of February 1852, and to Captain, May 14th, 1861. Of date Dec. 1st, 1879, General Sherman in General Order No. 104 writes of him: "When the great civil war of 1861 burst on this country, he knew the little regular army was entirely inadequate to the occasion, and he turned at once to his friends in Indiana, and was elected Colonel of the 22d Indiana Infantry, Aug. 15, 1861. His was no incertain action but with all the ardor of his nature he threw his whole soul into the contest and wherever the fighting was hardest, for four years we find him at the very front."

He afterwards rose to the rank of Corps Commander in which capacity he served with great galantry and distinction ranking among the great Captains of the war,

but to recount his achievements would be a history.

He was not a mere soldier pursuing the profession of arms or actuated by mere ambition, but was a patriot, and it was this intense love of country and determina-tion the Union should be saved, that nerved his arm and fired his heart, and that which went peculiarly to made him the great soldier he was. That he was Indiana's greatest soldier is of course undisputed, and Indiana may well be proud of him and do him honor; therefore, Resolved, That in Gen. Jefferson C. Davis, we recognize Indiana's foremost soldier in the war for the preservation of the Union, and we honor him for hisgreat soldierly qualaties and grand patriotism, and when he died a good man and great soldier fell, and the army and nation has suffered a great and irreparable loss. We had hoped he would live long to enjoy the honors he had won, and lament his death, and tender our deepest sympathy to his widow, relatives and friends.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be transmitted to the widow of the

deceased.

- S. O. 7, 1880—An Ordinance to provide for paving with brick, (where not already paved,) the north-west sidewalk of Massachusetts avenue, from St. Clair street to Cherry street.
- S. O. 8, 1880—An Ordinance to provide for grading and graveling Railroad street, and paving with brick the sidewalks thereof, from North street to St. Clair street.
- S. O. 9, 1880—An Ordinance to provide for grading, and paving with brick, (where not already paved,) the east sidewalk of Park avenue, from Vine street to St. Clair street.

By Councilman Kahn:

G.O. 3, 1880—An Ordinance regulating the obstruction of sidewalks with signs, goods etc. across any sidewalk in the City of Indianapolis.

The above entitled ordinance was accompanied by the following petition; which was received:

To the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, merchants and business men of the city of Indianapolis, respectfully, but earnestly petition your honorable bedies to declare the following ordinance in full force from the date of its passage, and to continue the same in full force and effect, and to save harmless all who have acted thereunder in good faith believing it in force.

General Ordinance No. 79, 1875. An Ordinance concerning the obstruction of

sidewalks.

SEC. 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, That no person or persons shall be fined for placing or hanging goods or signs on or across any sidewalk in the City of Indianapolis unless twenty-four hours notice shall have been given to such person or persons so obstructing such sidewalk, by some policeman or other officer of the city, to remove such obstruction. Provided, any person or persons once notified and shall repeat the offense by placing the same or similar obstructions, no additional notice shall be necessary.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Ordained and established this 11th day of October, 1879.

Henry Schwinge, Charles Mayer, Albert Gall, Jno. Darby & Co., Jno. Dury, Merrill, Hubbard & Co., Browning & Sloan, Vajen & New, John J. Cooper, Ritzinger & Co. and one hundred and six others. Councilman Kahn moved to suspend the rules for the purpose of placing G. O. 3, 1880, on its second and third reading and final passage.

Which motion failed of adoption by the following vote:

AYES, 9—viz. Councilmen Bermann, Bieler, Brown, Bryce, Hamilton, Kahn, Lamb, Sheppard, and Wiese.

Nays, 10—viz. Councilmen Carey, Dowling, Downey, King, Morrison, McGinty, McKay, Shilling, Tucker, and VanVorhis.

The City Clerk, in behalf of Councilman Rooker, presented the following remonstrance; which was received:

Indianapolis, January 5, 1880.

To the Mayor and Members of the Common Council and the Board of Aldermen, of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen: - The undersigned, owners of real estate along the line of Highland street, between Washington and Ohio streets, desire to remonstrate against the passage of Special Ordinance No. 75, entitled "An ordinance to provide for grading and graveling the sidewalk and roadway, and bowldering and curbing with stone the gutters of Highland street, from Washington street to the north line of Ohio street, and repealing Special Ordinance No. 48, 1879," now pending before your honorable bodies, for the reason that said ordinance provides that the work shall be done according to stakes set by the City Civil Engineer, and does not in any manner establish the grade of the street when improved. As the establishment of a grade is very necessary upon the line of this street, for the reason that it is at present very uneven and without any established grade, we think the ordinance should by its terms fix the grade of the street. We are informed that the Engineer has made a profile under which he expects to have the work done, and we do most earnestly protest against the improvement of this street according to that profile, as it will cut down Market street at the point of intersection about one and a quarter feet, and will leave that street at that point in a very bad condition, unless it is graded east and west of Highland street to make it conform to it, which would have to be paid for by the city; while Highland street, between Washington and Market, the distance of one square, will be left with a very deep depression or valley about half way between the streets, and the grade will be so steep that the gravel placed upon it will in a very short time be entirely washed An examination of the locality will demonstrate to any person that before any lasting improvements are made upon this street, the grades of Market and Highland streets at the point of intersection must be very materially changed, as the intersection is upon the apex of a steep knoll; and when the grades of the two streets are properly established they will have a gradual descent, sufficient to properly drain them and no more. Again, the improvement as now proposed will cause the flooding of a great deal of the surrounding property, by the backing up of surface water that will be drained upon it.

For these reasons we most earnestly protest and remonstrate against the passage of this ordinance, or the making of this improvement, until such time as it can be properly done, and in such a manner as to be an improvement instead of a damage to our property. And we, therefore, ask that said ordinance be not passed.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Councilman Bermann offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the City Civil Engineer be instructed to set line stakes on alley between Sinker and McCarty streets, from alley west of New Jersey street, to first alley east of Alabama street; and that the City Marshal be instructed to notify property owners along said alley to set their fences back to conform with said lines.

Councilman Brown offered the following motions; which were adopted:

That J. L. Spaulding be granted sixty days extension of time to complete his contract for the improvement of Chesapeake street.

WHEREAS, By the terms of a certain lease entered into by and between the City of Indianapolis and Samuel Ogden and Henry C. Adams, assignee, said city agrees to pay, as the same becomes due, any and all taxes and assessments of every kind that may be levied and charged against lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17 and 18, in Metzger & Robinius' subdivision of lots 1, 2 and 3 in square No. 70, (used for market purposes), for the term of five years from August 8th, 1878, including the taxes for 1878.

AND WHEREAS, the taxes for state, county and city purposes have not been paid for 1878 and since; therefore,

Moved, That the City Attorney and City Treasurer be, and are hereby, instructed to interview the Honorable Board of County Commissioners, and endeavor to obtain from said Board an order exempting said lots from taxation during the continuance of such lease.

Moved further, That the City Assessor and Treasurer be, and are hereby, directed to cancel and certify off all taxes and assessments for city purposes against said property, beginning with the year 1878.

That a special Committee of three be appointed by the Mayor to investigate and report to this body, the cheapest and most feasible way of providing a driveway over the Union tracks, at the Virginia avenue crossing.

The Chairman appointed Councilmen Brown, Bieler and O'Conner as the special committee called for by the foregoing motion.

Councilman Bryce offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the crossing of Pearl street, on east side of Illinois street, between Washington and Maryland streets, be improved by putting down a double stone crossing.

Councilman Carey offered the following resolution:

Whereas, West street or Michigan Road, from the intersection of First street, running thence north, as it is now maintained and operated by its owners as a gravel road, is a nuisance and ought to be abated by the proper grading of said street, so as to run off the surface water and stop at First street. From First street north there are various pools where the water stands, breeding malaria almost perpetually, and in many places making the street almost impassable for the children

attending Public School No. 17. The condition of said street must greatly endanger the health of the children attendant at said school, as well as that of the sur-

rounding neighborhood; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Board of School Commissioners, That the present condition of said West street or Michigan Road, as it is now maintained, is a nuisance, greatly endangering the health of the pupils attending School No. 17, and that of the community; and that the Mayor and Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis be respectfully requested to take such action as shall be necessary to abate such nuisance; and that a copy of this resolution shall be presented to the Honorable Mayor and Common Council and Board of Aldermen.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

AYES, 19-viz. Councilmen Bermann, Bieler, Brown, Bryce, Carey, Dowling, Downey Hamilton, Kahn, King, Lamb, Morrison, McGinty, McKay, Sheppard, Shilling, Tucker, VanVorhis, and Wiese.

NAYS-None.

Councilman McKay moved to reconsider the vote by which the motion failed of adoption, providing for the suspension of the rules on G. O. 3, 188o.

Which motion to reconsider, was adopted by the following vote:

The question then being on the motion to suspend the rules, the same failed of adoption by the following vote:

NAYS, 6-viz. Councilmen Carey, Dowling, Downey, King, McGinty, and Van-Vorhis.

Councilman Carey offered the following resolution; which was referred to the Joint Committees on Finance and City Attorney:

That the City Treasurer be directed to invest all the monies now in his possession and belonging to the Tomlinson Estate in four per cent Government Bonds, Registered, and hereafter, as soon as the revenues of the estate from all sources, including the interest on the four per cent bonds, shall amount to five hundred dollars, shall be invested in like manner.

Councilman Dowling offered the following motion; which was referred to the Fire Board.

That the Fire Board be directed to enquire into the expediency of constructing two (2) cisterns of the capacity of at least 2000 barrels each, to be located on Illinois street immediately north of Pogue's Run, the other at the corner of Tennessee street and Garden street, and report at the next meeting of this Council.

Councilman Downey offered the following resolution:

Resolved, By the Common Council and Board of Aldermen, that Charles Feller & Co. be and are hereby allowed to place an electric clock in front of No. 222 East Washington street, at their own expense.

Resolved, By the Common Council and Board of Aldermen, that the City Civil Engineer be directed to erect a lamp post, lamp and fixtures complete to burn gas, on Court street midway between East street and Liberty street.

Councilman Hamilton presented the following petition and resolution; which petition was received;

Resolved, That the name of "Chatham street" be changed to that of "Park Avenue." A petition representing the ownerships of nearly all of the ground on the first named street is presented herewith.

We, the undersigned property holders on Chatham street, in this city, request your honorable body, the City Council to change the name of that street to Park avenue.

The reasons which make this change desirable are the following, viz:

1st. Chatham street is a very short street situated between Walnut and St. Clair streets, and is therefore little known.

2d. It is the connection of Massachusetts avenue with Park avenue and should be known by that name.

Hoping that our request will be granted we sign our name this 3rd day of January, 1880.

That as soon as any horses shall become incapacitated for service in the Fire-Department that the Chief Fire Engineer be and he is hereby authorized to turn over one horse each, to the Street Commissioner and Chief of Police, for use in their departments.

Councilman Tucker moved to refer the Judiciary Committee.

Councilman Lamb moved as a substitute to refer to the Committee on Public Property; which substitute was adopted.

Councilman Hamilton offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The old trees in Military Park are fast dying out, and it will not be many years until the place will be destitute of shade, it is expedient that young trees should be set out to supply the places of the old ones; therefore,

Resolved, That the Committee on Parks be and is hereby authorized to procure and set out in said Military Park one hundred hardy young trees, provided it be done without expense to the City.

Which was laid on the table by the following vote:

AYES, 11—viz. Councilmen Bermann, Bieler, Brown, Bryce, Dowling, Downey, Kahn, King, Morrison, VanVorhis, and Wiese.
