PROCEEDINGS OF COMMON COUNCIL.

REGULAR SESSION—JANUARY 19, 1880.

The Common Council of the City of Indianapolis met in the Council Chamber, on Monday evening, January 19th, A. D. 1880, at seven o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. John Caven, Mayor, and, ex officio, President of the Common Council, in the chair, and 22 members, viz.: Councilmen Bermann, Bryce, Carey, Dowling, Downey, Hamilton, Harmening, Kahn, Lamb, Morrison, Mc-Ginty, McKay, O'Connor, Pearson, Prier, Rooker, Sheppard, Shilling, Tucker, VanVorhis, and Wiese.

ABSENT, 3-viz. Councilmen Bieler, King, and Wood.

The Proceedings of the Common Council, for the regular session, held on January 5th, 1880, having been printed, and placed on the desks of the Councilmen, said Journals were approved as published.

REPORT FROM THE COMMITTEE ON CONTRACTS.

The Committee on Contracts, through Councilman Brown, submitted the following report; which was concurred in, and the several contracts awarded, as recommended:

To the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen :--Your Committee on Contracts, to whom was referred certain proposals presented to Council, January 5th, 1880, have examined the same, and find them to be as follows, viz:

First. For grading and graveling the second alley west of Noble street, from Lockerbie street to New York street—

Henry Clay, 20 cents per lineal foot front on each side.

H. C. Roney, 15 cents per lineal foot front on each side.

Wm. Morrison, 13 cents per lineal foot front on each side.

Jas. Mahoney, 13 cents per lineal foot front on each side.

We recommend that the contract be awarded to Wm. Morrison.

Second. For grading and graveling (where not already improved), the sidewalks of Shelby street, from the southern terminus of Virginia avenue to Raymond street—

James Mahoney, 25 cents per lineal foot front on each side.

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There being no competitive bids on this contract, your committee recommend there be no contract awarded.

Third. For curbing with stone the sidewalks, and bowldering the gutters, (except where already curbed and bowldered), of Alabama street, from Washington street to Wabash street—

James Mahoney, 95 cents per lineal foot front on each side.

Henry Clay, 92 cents per lineal foot front on each side.

Dunning & Hudson, 82 cents per lineal foot front on each side.

Fred. Gansberg, 77 cents per lineal foot front on each side.

Henry C. Roney, 40 cents per lineal foot front on each side for bowldering, and 34 cents per lineal foot front on each side for curbing with stone.

Henry C. Roney being the lowest and best bidder, we recommend he be awarded the contract.

The City Attorney submitted the following report; which was received:

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 19, 1880.

To the Mayor, Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen : — The following cases have been tried in the Superior Court since your last meeting:

The case of Amelda K. Mortland, administratrix, vs. The City, was tried by a jury, and resulted in a verdict in favor of The City.

This was an action for damages by the administratrix of Alex. M. Mortland, deceased, growing out of an accident to the deceased, on the west Michigan street fill, which resulted in his death. The action was based upon the alleged negligence of the city in not providing suitable barriers along the edge of the road to prevent horses and vehicles from running off at the sides of the fill in case of accident. The road in question is not, probably, as secure as it should be, and it might be well enough to take some action that would give greater security to travelers, in order that accidents might be avoided in the future.

The case of James Muse vs. The City, was tried by a jury and resulted in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$501.38.

This was an action to recover a balance alleged to be due the plaintiff upon a contract with The City for the deepening and widening the State ditch. The finding of the jury is the amount due, as appears by the contract, with 6 per cent. interest since the work was completed; and if the contract was right, the verdict is not unreasonable. It was claimed on behalf of the city—the issue having been made up by my predecessor—that there was a mistake in drawing the contract; all the evidence that could be had was offered on the trial, but without effect. This is the second trial of the cause. On the first trial there was a finding and judgment for the amount due on the contract, without interest; and on the last trial the jury allowed interest.

I do not think it necessary to apply for a new trial, but I have filed a motion in arrest of judgment, and if the motion should be overruled, I would recommend that the cause be appealed. Respectfully,

Said Ohio street is not opened west of Arsenal avenue, and is not directly connected with the centre of the city by a continuous street; is not a thoroughtare, and very little, if any, traveled, and no utility or necessity exist for said improvement. We therefore protest against its improvement as unnecessary.

G. O. 3, 1880—An Ordinance regulating the obstruction of sidewalks with signs, goods, etc., across any sidewalk in the City of Indianapolis.

Was read the second time.

Councilman Kahn moved that the ordinance be engrossed.

Councilman VanVorhis moved to refer to the Committee on Judiciary and City Attorney. Which motion was not adopted.

Councilman VanVorhis offered the following amendment:

Sec. 2. That nothing heretofore ordained, shall be construed to forbid any owner or occupant of premises fronting on any sidewalk in the city of Indianapolis from placing, piling, displaying and exposing for sale, any goods, wares or merchandize on or along the inner line of said sidewalk; provided, no more of such sidewalk shall be occupied than is allowed by Section 28 of an ordinance concerning streets and alleys, ordained September 2, 1878.

On motion by Councilman Prier, the amendment was laid on the table by the following vote:

Councilman VanVorhis then moved to amend by striking out the words "by some policeman, or other officer of the city."

These runners are working on the 'confidence'' order; in fact, they have the audacity of making themselves a public nuisance by going into business houses and soliciting patrons for others in the same line of business as those with whom said customers may be trading at the time, thereby injuring not alone the legitimate trade, but also bringing it into disrepute, and casting a bad odor on merchants of our city by annoying country customers as well as the trading community at large.

Therefore, we the undersigned merchants and tax payers, pray and petition your honorable body to pass such ordinances whereby said nuisance of runners shall be abated. This petition applies to retail trade only.

Gentlemen: — The undersigned, property owners on Louisiana street, between Tennessee and Mississippi streets, would represent to your honorable body that when the Terre Haute and Richmond, and the Indianapolis, Cincinnati and Lafayette railroads were granted the right of way on the above named street, it was with the right of way on the south side of the centre of the street. This has never been complied with, as we have reason to believe; and that the track of the Indianapolis and Lafayette Company is several feet north of the centre of said street.

The Indianapolis, Decatur and Springfield Railroad Company are seeking entrance to the Union Depot through this street, by a single track, and if these two roads were required to conform to the right of way given them at the time they entered the city, there would be room on said street for the l. In case of failure on the part of the owners of said property to repair the sidewalk within ten days, the Street Commissioner is directed to make the repairs at the expense of the owners.

Councilman Hamilton offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the Street Commissioner clean the gutter on south side of Clifford avenue, in front of Arsenal grounds; also make protection for the roadway of said street.

Councilman Hamilton offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That persons owning corner lots be, and they are requested, to designate the names of streets fronting thereon, by painted signs on said corners, on fence or house.

Councilman Hamilton presented the following petition; which was referred to the Joint Committees on Finance, City Attorney, and City Assessor:

Indianapolis, January 9, 1880.

To the Honorable, the City Council City of Indianapolis, Ind.:

Gentlemen: — We own certificate No. 10,682 sale of 1879, for Lot 22 Block 17, Strong & Co.'s sub. Johnson heirs add., sold in name of E. T. Keightley. The same lot having been sold in 1878, the sale is illegal on the certificate we hold. We therefore ask you to refund the amount we paid, namely \$57.66, and 6 per cent. interest, \$3.46. Total, \$61.12.

Councilman Harmening presented the following petition; which was referred to the Committees on Streets and Alleys and Judiciary, and the City Attorney:

Indianapolis, Ind., January 19th, 1880.

To the Council and Board of Aldermen:

I would like to have permission to build a 26 foot stairway on the sidewalk in front of my carpenter shop, No. 120 Railroad street, between Ohio and New York streets. Chas. Nuerge.

Councilman Kahn offered the following motion; which was referred to the Judiciary Committee:

That the Committee on Judiciary, with the City Attorney, be instructed to prepare an ordinance with a view to the taxing of all foreign Fire Insurance Companies doing business in the city; said tax to be assessed for, and in support of the city Fire Department.

Councilman Lamb offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the City Marshal is hereby instructed to notify the owners of property situated as follows: Nos. 145, 147, 177 and 179, east Washington street, to repair the sidewalk in front of their premises. If the owners of said property fail to repair the sidewalk within ten days, the Street Commissioner is directed to make the repairs at expense of the owners.

Councilman Lamb offered the following resolution :

WHEREAS, The Common Council, on two previous occasions, instructed the Board of Public Improvements to pay one dollar and twenty-five cents per day for street'labor, and now for the third time—

Resolved, That said Board be, and are hereby, directed to pay said laborers one dollar and twenty-five cents per day for each full day they may work for the city.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

AYES, 19—viz. Councilmen Bermann, Brown, Bryce, Dowling, Downey, Hamilton, Harmening, Kahn, Lamb, McGinty, McKay, O'Connor, Pearson, Prier, Rooker, Sheppard, Shilling, Tucker, and Wiese.

NAYS, 1-viz. Councilman VanVorhis.

Councilman Pearson, in behalf of Councilman Morrison, offered the following resolution; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements be, and are hereby, ordered to lay the stone crossings as requested by a petition of the citizens of the 12th Ward on January 5th, 1880.

Councilman Pearson, in behalf of Council Morrison, offered the following resolution; which was referred to the Police Board : WHEREAS, Mr. L. T. Miller, a prominent citizen of this State, did mysteriously disappear in this city, on the morning of January 6th, under circumstances which indicate that he may have been murdered; therefore,

Be it Resolved, That the Mayor and Police Board are hereby authorized and instructed to offer not to exceed the sum of five hundred dollars for the recovery of his body, when positive proofs are shown that he came to his death in the city of Indianapolis.

Councilman McGinty offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the City Civil Engineer be instructed to set the stakes, and give the proper grade, for the improvement on Wilkins street, between Church and West street.

Councilman McKay offered the following resolution :

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, That the said Council and Board of Aldermen deem it expedient that the Massachusetts and College avenue line of Street Railway be extended along College avenue, from its present terminus at Seventh street, to Ninth street; and that the Citizens' Street Railway Company be, and are hereby, directed to construct the said extension at once.

The City Clerk is hereby directed to serve a copy of this resolution upon the proper officers of said Company, in accordance with the provisions of section 15 of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance authorizing the construction, extension and operation of certain passenger railways in and upon the streets of the city of Indianapolis," ordained January 18th, 1864.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Ayes, 14—viz. Councilmen Bermann, Brown, Bryce, Hamilton, Harmening, Kahn, Lamb, McKay, Pearson, Prier, Rooker, Tucker, VanVorhis, and Wiese.

NAYS, 6-viz. Councilmen Dowling, Downey, McGinty, O'Connor, Sheppard, and Shilling.

Councilman O'Connor offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the City Civil Engineer be instructed to set line stakes on the first alley north of Maryland street running from Benton street to first alley east; and that the City Marshall be instructed to notify the property holders along said alley to set their fences back to conform with said lines.

Councilman Pearson offered the following motion; which was referred to the Conference Committee :

That citizens in the neighborhood of Military Park be authorized to plant in such park sun-flower seed without limit, for shade and sanitary purposes.

Councilman Prier offered the following motions; which were adopted :

That D. A. Haywood be granted sixty days further time to complete contract on Newman street, from Hill avenue to Seventh street.

That E. B. Elliott be granted sixty days further time to complete contract on Harrison street, from Noble to Dillon streets.

Councilman Rooker offered the following motions; which were adopted:

Moved, That a Special Committee, consisting of His Honor, the Mayor, City Attorney, and Councilmen McKay and Tucker, and Aldermen Layman, Seibert and Piel, be, and are hereby, appointed, whose duty it shall be to consider the propriety of providing for the consumption of gas by the city, by making a special levy for the payment of the same; and if they deem it expedient to do so, to report to this Council an ordinance upon the subject.

Moved, That the City Marshal be, and he is hereby, directed to notify the Citizens' Street Railway Company to at once repair and put in good condition the rails, switches, curves and inside track of their roadway on north Illinois street.

Councilman Rooker offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Police Board be, and they are hereby, authorized to purchase at a cost not to exceed \$200, a good horse, harness, and light spring wagon, the same to be owned and held by the city of Indianapolis, for the use of the Chief of Police in the discharge of his official duties.

We, the Police Board, recommend the passage and adoption of the above resolution, believing it fair and just.

Councilman Prier moved to amend by providing that the Chief of Police be required to pay for the keeping of the horse. Which amendment was accepted by Councilman Rooker. The amendment then failed of adoption.

There being a tie vote, His Honor, the Mayor, voted in the affirmative. So the resolution was adopted.

Councilman Shilling offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

SIG. 75.

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to lay a stone crossing on the south side of Indiana avenue, at the intersection of Michigan street.

Councilmen Lamb and Rooker were granted leave of absence for remainder of this session.

Councilman Tucker offered the following motions; which were adopted:

That the Police Board be, and are hereby, directed to confer police powers upon the flagmen at the several railroad crossings in the city; said police powers to be restricted to the crossings where such flagmen receiving police powers may be stationed; and that such police powers be only in force during the hours when on duty; that the several railroad companies be required to provide suitable badges, at their expense, for such flagmen to wear while on duty, and not to be worn only at such time; said badge or design to be selected by the Police Board, the police powers so granted and conferred to be restricted to their line of duty only.

That T. V. Cook be, and is hereby, authorized to letter, at his own expense, the gas posts or lanterns on the same, at the corner of Washington and Meridian streets, the names of those respective streets.

That no further ordinances for the erecting of new gas posts and lighting the same, be received until the expiration of the present contract with the Gas Company.

Councilman Tucker offered the following resolution :

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, That the said Council and Board deem it expedient that a line of street railway be constructed along and upon South street, from the intersection of West street and Kentucy avenue, east along said South street to Noble street, connecting with the English avenue line of street railway; and that the Citizens' Street Railway Company be, and is hereby, directed to construct the said line at once. The City Clerk is hereby directed to serve a copy of this resolution upon the proper officer of said company, in accordance with the provisions of section 15 of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance authorizing the construction, extension, and operation of certain passenger railways in and upon the streets of the city of Indianapolis," ordained January 18th, 1864.

Councilman Prier moved to lay the resolution on the table; which motion failed of adoption by the following vote :

Ayes, 5-viz, Councilmen Brown, Downey, Harmening, Prier, and Shilling.

NAYS, 13—viz. · Councilmen Bermann, Bryce, Dowling, Hamilton, Kahn, Mc-Ginty, McKay, O'Connor, Pearson, Sheppard, Tucker, VanVorhis, and Wiese.

Councilman Brown moved to indefinitely postpone the resolution.

It now being nearly eleven o'clock, Councilman Hamilton moved the suspension of the following section of the rules, viz :

SEC. 5. This Council shall not, without a suspension of the rules by a two-thirds vote, sit later on any evening than eleven o'clock.
