PROCEEDINGS OF BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

REGULAR SESSION-March 3, 1880.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis met in the Aldermanic Chamber, on Wednesday evening, March 3d, A. D. 1880, at half past seven o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—His Honor, the President, J. M. Ridenour, in the Chair, and Aldermen Coburn, Layman, Mussmann, Newman, Piel, and Seibert—7.

ABSENT-Aldermen Chandler, Drew, and Grubbs-3.

The proceedings of the Board of Aldermen, for the regular session, held on February 18th, 1880, having been printed, and placed on the desks of the Aldermen, said proceedings were approved as published.

MESSAGES AND PAPERS FROM THE COMMON COUNCIL.

The following message was read and received:

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—The Common Council, at a regular session, held on March 1, 1880, appointed a special committee of three from its body, and request your honorable body to appoint a like number, to serve as a Committee of Conference in relation to the vacation of a certain alley prayed for by "The Sewing Machine Cabinet Co.;" the Common Council being in favor of, and your honorable body opposed to, such vacation.

On motion by Alderman Seibert, the request of the Council, for a Conference Committee, was granted, and Alderman Seibert, Piel, and Layman appointed as members of such committee.

Gentlemen:—Your Board of Public Improvements, to whom was referred sundry papers, make thereon the following report:

1st. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner make crossings, of broken stone, on McCarty street, at Delaware street.

We recommend one such crossing be made.

2d. Is a motion to fill a hole in the sidewalk on Madison avenue, south of the J., M. & I. Railway track.
We recommend the work be done.

3d. Is a motion to lay a stone crossing across South street, west side of Noble street.

We recommend a single stone crossing.

4th. Is a motion to lay a double stone crossing across Georgia street, on the east side of Illinois street.

This is a much needed improvement. We recommend the work be done.

5th. Is a motion to lay a broken stone crossing across Kentucky avenue, at intersection of Georgia street.

We recommend the work be done.

6th. Is a motion for the Street Commissioner to fill a chuck hole in Georgia street, between Noble and Pine streets.

Recommend the work be done.

7th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner clean the gutters of Peru street, from Seventh to Eighth street, and change the grade of the same so as to carry the water off of Eighth street between Rohampton and Peru streets.

We recommend the work be done.

The following clause in the report from the Committee on Judiciary was read; and the favorable action of the Common Council thereon (see page 930, ante), was concurred in:

3d. Is a petition from Albert Baker and others, property owners on north Alabama street, asking for the removal of telephone posts on said street, between Seventh and Tenth streets.

In view of the fact that said posts are not being used for telephone purposes, we recommend that the Street Commissioner be directed to notify the parties owning them to remove the same.

The following clause in the report from the Committee on Streets and Alleys was read; and the favorable action of the Common Council thereon (see page 932, ante), was concurred in:

1st. Is a petition (and order of vacation) of W. F. Piel and A. Erkenbrecker, asking the Council and Board of Aldermen to vacate the lots, streets and alleys in John Ott's subdivision of the eastern part of lot 37 of the I, P. & C. R. R. Co.'s Addition to the City of Indianapolis.

There being no opposition to such vacation, and believing it to be injurious to no one, we recommend that the prayer of the petitioners be granted, and the order of vacation adopted.
