The following table shows the results of the regression analysis for the dependent variable "Sales" (in millions of dollars) against the independent variables "Advertising" (in millions of dollars) and "Price" (in dollars). The regression equation is:

$$\text{Sales} = 1.2 \text{ Advertising} - 0.000001 \text{ Price} + 10.5$$

The coefficient for Advertising is 1.2, indicating that for every additional million dollars spent on advertising, sales increase by 1.2 million dollars, holding price constant. The coefficient for Price is -0.000001, indicating that for every additional dollar in price, sales decrease by 0.000001 million dollars, holding advertising constant. The constant term is 10.5, representing the expected sales when both advertising and price are zero.

The R-squared value is 0.85, indicating that 85% of the variation in sales is explained by the independent variables. The F-statistic is 12.34, and the p-value is 0.0001, indicating that the regression model is statistically significant.
