The Police Board, through Councilman Downey, submitted the following report; which was concurred in:

Indianapolis, January 3, 1881.

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen:—At a meeting of the Common Council held December 20, 1880, the following resolution was referred to the Police Board:

"Kesolved, That the Police Board be, and is kereby, directed to pay patrolmen known as 'extras' the sum of one dollar per day, providing that the number of

such extras shall not exceed five at any one time"

We have fully considered the resolution, and report that we are of the opinion that such compensation would be right and proper. Should five extras be constantly employed and none of the regulars be absent from duty, the cost would be \$1,825.00 per year. But at such times as any of the regular force failed to perform duty, the extras would be called on to supply the vacancy, and the pay provided for in this resolution would be saved, as the extra would receive the same pay which otherwise would have been credited to the regular. Judging from past experience we have estimated the additional expense to the city would accrueunder this resolution at about \$1,200.00. For the remainder of the current year the expense would not exceed \$500.00.

It is necessary to have about five extras on the roll to supply the places of such of the regulars as may be sick, or from any cause absent from duty, and also that we may have men in training for regular service when vacancies occur. These extras are required to report at roll call each day, and are thereby, to a great extent, prevented from engaging in any other occupation. We are therefore of the opinion that they should be paid at least one dollar per day for each day they may report for duty. The outlay, as shown, would not be large. Small however as it is, it was not taken into consideration in making up the estimate for the pay of police for the current year, and we do not feel authorized to make the expenditure without the order of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen.

We recommend the passage of the resolution as a matter of justice to the worthy

men who are now doing duty as "extras" without adequate compensation.

The Board of Health submitted the following further report; which was received:

To the Members of the Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, Ind.:

Gentlemen:-In accordance with a resolution of your honorable body, the Board of Health of this city has been making some examination of the quality of water furnished the city by the Indianapolis Water Works Company We have secured the service of Thomas C. Van Noys, M. D., Professor of Chem-

istry in the Indiana State University, in making an exhaustive and critical qualitative and quantitative analysis of various specimens of water from hydrants in the city, from the well at Water Works, from the river in front of the works, and

from the river a few miles north of the city.

These analysises are not quite complete, and we are ignorant of their results. We shall be able, however, to lay them before you soon, probably at your next meeting. While we are unable to present you a complete table of the results of his examination, yet we are fully justified in expressing our opinion that the quality of water furnished our citizens for the past three months is not such as is conducive to good health. An almost universal complaint was made about the quality of water furnished during November and December last, and numerous cases of serious sickness were attributed to its use.

The Board of Health desire to be just, and we should very much hesitate to recommend anything that would embarress or annoy any corporation, yet in justice to our position as the conservators of the health of this city, we can only pronounce the present supply of hydrant water frequently utterly unfit for use, for either domestic, cooking or drinking purposes. This conclusion is founded upon the examination of numerous specimens of the water as furnished us by citizens, by personal observations, and by visiting and examining the river at the Water Works while it has been frozen over. We found the water immediately over the filter literally full of animal matter in the shape of pieces of the intestines and other organs of hogs, and masses of hogs hair and other products that only wanted a higher tem-

perature to become extremely offensive.

The Board of Health have in their possession certificates showing that there was taken from a hydrant in a store on Washington street a mass of hog hair with the epidermes attached, p oving conclusively that it was in the same condition as when taken from the hog. We have another certificate from one of our well-known business men that the water passing through the hydrant in his office was very filthy, offensive, and mixed with blood. On several occasions we have had a sample of water from the hydrant, and a certificate from one of our best-known physicians, which shows that the water furnished by the hydrant in his house was utterly unfit for any domestic or family use. We also have a certificate from the employes of one of the most extensive hotels that from the pipes supplying a part of the hotel with water from the Water Works there was taken a piece of intestine (gut) eight inches long and weighing half a pound. There was no possible means by which this could have reached there only through the pipes from the Water Works.

We might add much more information that we have derived during the past few weeks, but deem it unnecessary.

We can only add that we regard it imperative upon the city authorities to, as speedily as possible, devise some method by which this evil can be corrected.

Report of the Board of City Commissioners in the Matter of Opening Wilson Street. To the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, Ind.:

Gentlemen: - The undersigned respectfully show to your honorable bodies:

1st. That they were duly appointed by the Judge of the Civil Circuit Court of Marion County, Indiana, to act as Commissioners to assess damages and benefits accruing to the owners of lands and lots through which any street is proposed to be constructed or altered, or any building appropriated, or through which any creek or water course is proposed to be straightened, or of which the course is proposed to be altered.

2d. They did, as required by law, take and subscribe the oath and affirmation

by law required.

3d. They were and are duly qualified to act as such Commissioners, and dopossess lawful authority to assess benefits and damages.

Your Commissioners do further report:

Ist. That on the 10th day of November, 1880, they met in the City Clerk's office, pursuant to notice from the City Clerk, which notice is hereunto annexed, and marked Exhibit "A."

2d. That they did, at the time and place aforesaid, enter upon the consideration of the matter of opening Wilson street, the width of — feet, from its present southern terminous to the intersection of Pendleton gravel road, and 46 feet wide from said road to Brookside avenue, more fully described in the petition to us referred, and hereto annexed and marked Exhibit "B."

And they did, on the same date, examine the property proposed to be taken for such street; also the contiguous property, and property in the neighborhood, with a view of ascertaining what property would be benefitted and what property damaged and the owners names of the same, and did then file with the City Clerk their report, giving a description of the property, with the name of the owner of each property; which report instructed the City Clerk to have the Marshal notify each property owner to meet the City Commissioners on Friday, the 31st day of December, 1880, for the further consideration of such proposed opening; which report is hereunto annexed and marked Exhibit "C."

3d. That they met on the said 31st day of December and inquired into the service of notice upon the property owners, and do herewith report said notice with the Marshal's endorsement of service thereon; which notice and Marshal's return is hereunto annexed and marked Exhibit "D."

4th. The following named persons appeared in answer to said notice, viz: Louisa Haag, Frank Eberly and John Reardon.

III.

The said Commissioners do further report, they did, at the time and place indicated by said notice, hear evidence touching the questions before them, and they did estimate—

1st. The value of the land and property to be appropriated for said street;

2d. The part thereof that should be born by the city; 3d. The real estate benefitted by said improvement.

Gentlemen:—Your Joint Committee on Judiciary, together with the City Attorney, to whom was referred a plan proposed by the City Civil Engineer and presented to the Common Council by the Board of Public Improvements, for the improvement of Market, Ohio, Highland streets and vicinity, report back said plans without recommendation on the merits thereof; but say that if the plans proposed be adopted, any changes to be made in said streets where the grade has been already established, should be made on petition of the property owners interested, and that the damages if any, should be first assessed and tendered to the parties so damaged before the improvement is made.

To the Mayor, Council, and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—Your Special Joint Committee to whom was referred the motion to report some plan whereby the city could build a market house and hall on the East Market space, have carefully considered the matter and find no possible way by which the building can be erected unless provided for as hereinafter recommended, it requiring all of the present revenue to run the several departments of the City Government; and believing that such a building erected on the East Market space would be a great benefit to the city, and a source of revenue, we therefore submit the following and recommend the adoption of the same:

1st. That a building be erected to cost not to exceed \$225,000, \$75,000 of which can be realized from the sale of the Tomlinson estate, including the amount now on hand; the balance, \$150,000.00, to be raised by the issuing of city bonds, running 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 years, the amount of each bond, \$30,000, to be raised annually by a special tax levy.

ally by a special tax levy.

2d. That the City Attorney be, and, on the adoption of this report, is instructed to draft a bill and have the same presented to the Legislature, authorizing the City of Indianapolis to issue such bonds, upon the approval of the voters of the city at

the election to be held in May for city officers.

3d. That after said bill shall have passed the Legislature, that the city authorities submit the question to the voters at the coming May election for and against the *issuing* of such bonds; and should a majority vote in the affirmative, that the city place upon the market said bonds for sale; and that the work be commenced as soon as plans and specifications for the building can be procured.

4th. That the revenue derived from the building be used in taking up of the

bonds, so far as such revenue will go.

2d. That the City Civil Engineer advertise for proposals for street signs—sam-

ples to be furnished in all cases.

3d. At same session the Board of Alderman, approved the report of the Aldermanic committee recommending that the contract and bond of Aegidius Naltner, for the removal of garbage, etc., be approved; provided that the said contract shall take effect and begin March 1st, 1881.

Councilman Dowling offered the following motion; which was referred to the Committees on Public Light and Streets and Alleys.

That the Joint Committe on Public Light and Committee on Streets and Alleys be authorized to receive further plans and proposals for street signs.

Councilman Fultz offered the following resolution, which was adopted unanimously by a rising vote:

WHEREAS, It has pleased an Allwise Providence to remove from earth a late member of this Council; therefore be it

Resolved, That the sympathy of this Council be and is hereby extended to the family of Mr. McGinty in this the hour of their sad bereavement.

Councilman Kahn presented the following petition; which was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and City Assessor:

To the Honor the Mayor, and members of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen;

Gentlemen:—Your petitioner would respectfully represent that on the 30th day of June, 1879, he paid into the hands of the City Treasurer the sum of eight dollars and sixty-seven cents on lot No. three, (3,) in square No. forty-six, (46), in Frank's subdivision of B. F. Morris' addition, and for the personal and poll of Charles Abel, for the tax of 1878, and also on the 12th day of April, 1880, he paid on the same above described property, and for personal and poll of Charles Abel; being the tax of 1879.

The payment of the above taxes are erroneous from the fact that the property above described was assessed double for those years, and these amounts have been paid by your petitioner.

The property has been paid in the name of other parties, and your petitioner asks your honorable body to refund him the above amounts, and as in duty bound your petitioner will ever pray.

Gentlemen:—The undersigned would respectfully represent and show that she is the owner by lease and purchase of lot 4, square 16, Johnson's heirs' addition to the City of Indianapolis, together with the improvements thereon, and that the improvements upon said lot have been erroneously assessed for taxation; that when the notice of such assessment was made out and mailed to one Charles Haynes, from the fact that the title was still in his name, and that she had no notice or knowledge of such erroneous assessment until long after the Board of Equalization had met and adjourned—such assessment being \$800 in excess of the assessment for state and county purposes.

Wherefore she asks that such matter be referred to the City Assessor, with in-

structions to make such correction as may be just and proper.

Councilman McKay offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That A. Bruner be granted sixty (60) days further time to complete his contract for constructing the sewer in the first alley east of Meridian street, from Washington street to Maryland street.

Councilman VanVorhis moved that the Police Board be instructed to carry the name of Carter Temple on the police pay roll during the month of January, 1881.

Which motion was adopted by the following vote:

AYES, 14-viz. Councilmen Bernhamer, Bryce, Dean, Fultz, Kahn, Koller, Lang, Morrison, McKay, Prier, Pritchard, Shilling, Thalman, and Van Vorhis.
