# PROCEEDINGS OF BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

## REGULAR SESSION—JANUARY 5, 1881.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis met in the Aldermanic Chamber, on Wednesday evening, January 5th, A. D. 1881, at seven o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—His Honor, the President, Henry Coburn, in the Chair, and Aldermen Drew, Grubbs, Hamilton, Layman, Mussmann, Newman, Seibert, and Tucker -9

ABSENT-Alderman Wood-1.

The Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen, for the regular session held on December 22d, 1880, having been printed, and placed on the desks of the Aldermen, said Journals were approved as published.

#### MESSAGES AND PAPERS FROM THE COMMON COUNCIL.

The following report from the Police Board was read:

Indianapolis, January 3, 1881.

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen:—At a meeting of the Common Council held December 20, 1880, the following resolution was referred to the Police Board:

"Kesolved, That the Police Board be, and is kereby, directed to pay patrolmen known as 'extras' the sum of one dollar per day, providing that the number of

such extras shall not exceed five at any one time

We have fully considered the resolution, and report that we are of the opinion that such compensation would be right and proper. Should five extras be constantly employed and none of the regulars be absent from duty, the cost would be \$1,825,00 per year. But at such times as any of the regular force failed to perform duty, the extras would be called on to supply the vacancy, and the pay provided for in this resolution would be saved, as the extra would receive the same pay which otherwise would have been credited to the regular. Judging from past experience we have estimated the additional expense to the city would accrue under this resolution at about \$1,200.00. For the remainder of the current year the expense would not exceed \$500,00.

It is necessary to have about five extras on the roll to supply the places of such of the regulars as may be sick, or from any cause absent from duty, and also that we may have men in training for regular service when vacancies occur. These extras are required to report at roll-call each day, and are thereby, to a great extent, prevented from engaging in any other occupation. We are therefore of the opinion that they should be paid at least one dollar per day for each day they may report for duty. The outlay, as shown, would not be large. Small however as it, it was not taken into consideration in making up the estimate for the pay of police for the current year, and we do not feel authorized to make the expenditure

without the order of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen.

We recommend the passage of the resolution as a matter of justice to the worthy

men who are now doing duty as "extras" without adequate compensation.

The following report of the Committee on Accounts and Claims was read, and the favorable action of the Common Council thereon (see page 799, ante) was concurred in:

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Accounts and Claims, to whom was referred the claim of A. A. Zion (ante pages 345 and 346) for \$52.81, for damages sustained to his horse and buggy on the 3d day of May last, at the crossing of Mississippi street and the railroad tracks on Louisiana street, find that said accident occurred at the crossing of the Indianapolis and Vincennes Railroad Company's track and Mississippi street; and believing the city only secondarily, and the said railroad company primarily, liable, recommend that a certified copy of said petition, with the proceedings of the Council thereon, be transmitted by the clerk to said railroad company.

Gentlemen:—Your Joint Committee on Judiciary, together with the City Attorney, to whom was referred a plan proposed by the City Civil Engineer and presented to the Common Council by the Board of Public Improvements, for the improvement of Market, Ohio, Highland streets and vicinity, report back said plans without recommendation on the merits thereof; but say that if the plans proposed be adopted, any changes to be made in said streets where the grade has been already established, should be made on petition of the property owners interested, and that the damages, if any, should be first assessed and tendered to the parties so damaged before the improvement is made.

That J. L. Spaulding be granted ninety days additional time to complete his contract for the improvement of Cypress street, from Linden street to Olive street.

That A. Bruner be granted sixty (60) days further time to complete his contract for constructing the sewer in the first alley east of Meridian street, from Washington street to Maryland street.

The following resolution (favorably passed by the Common Council) was unanimously concurrently adopted by a rising vote.

#### REPORTS, ETC., FROM COMMITTEES.

The Committee on Streets and Alleys, through Alderman Drew, submitted the following report:

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen;

Gentlemen:—Your Joint Committee on Streets and Alleys, to whom was referred S. O. 12 and S. O. 13, 1880, relative to the improvement of Meridian street with cedar blocks, from New York street to Seventh street, with all remonstrances and petitions thereto pertaining, would recommend, after a careful consideration, that the petitions and remonstrances be received and spread on the records, and the action of the Common Council in passing the above entitled ordinances be not concurred in. And do further recommend that some action should be taken, and that at once, so that work can be commenced as soon as the weather will permit; and that the ordinance for the improvement of said street shall provide that the roadway be constructed with good red cedar blocks, from New York street to St. Clair street, with bouldered gutters ten feet in width; and the roadway from St. Clair street to Seventh be constructed of red cedar blocks, with bouldered gutters six feet in width. Your committee believe that a majority of the resident property owners on the street will be satisfied with the above improvement.

#### MISCELLANEOUS.

Alderman Grubbs offered the following remonstrance; which was received:

To His Honor, the Mayor, Board of Aldermen, and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—Understanding that there is a petition before your honorable bodies asking to have the grade of Market street changed, from Arsenal avenue to Pogue's Run, we, the undersigned property owners on Market street, most respectfully remonstrate against any change in the grade, or reimprovement of said street in front of our property.

Alderman Hamilton offered the following motions; which were adopted:

That the Committee on Printing be directed to ascertain the cost of revising and printing two hundred (200) copies of the City Charter, ordinances and resolutions in force, including all acts and amendments of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana for 1881, which may apply to the city, and with index complete.

That, with a view to a reduction of the bonded indebtedness of the City of Indianapolis, by the amount of \$500,000, the Committee on Finance and City Attorney is hereby directed to inquire into the possibility of exchanging the bonds issued by the Union Railroad Transfer and Stock Yards Company, known as the "Belt Railroad," for the city's bonds issued in aid of said corporation. Said committee is ordered to report fully on this matter at the next regular meeting of the Board.

Alderman Hamilton offered the following resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Markets and Public Property:

Resolved, That the Committee on Public Property be directed to take steps for the immediate conversion of the "Tomlinson Estate property," belonging to the city, into cash, with a view to the speedy erection of public buildings for the use of citizens and city authorities, for market purposes, on the south half of square forty-three (43), Indianapolis—such "public buildings" in no event to exceed in cost the amount received from the sale of said property.

Alderman Mussmann offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the Police Board enforce the ordinance which provides for not blockading the streets by moving trains any longer than the ordinance allows them; and all other city ordinances.

Alderman Tucker offered the following motion; which was adopted:

That the President of the Board of Aldermen and his honor, Mayor Caven, call a joint convention of the Republican members of the Council and Board of Aldermen for Saturday evening, January 8th, at the Council Chamber, at 7:30 p. m., to take into consideration the estimates for the several departments for the year.

On motion, the Board of Aldermen then adjourned.
