Proceedings of Board of Aldermen.

REGULAR SESSION—March 11, 1889.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis met in the Aldermanic Chamber, Monday evening, March 11th, A. D. 1889, at 7:30 o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. Granville S. Wright, President of the Board of Aldermen, in the Chair, and Aldermen Connett, Laut, Rail, Reinecke, Reynolds, Smith, Taylor, and Tousey—9.

ABSENT, 1-viz: Alderman Clark.

The Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen for the regular session held February 25th, 1889, having been printed and placed on the desks of the Aldermen, said Journals were approved as published.

MESSAGES AND PAPERS FROM THE COMMON COUNCIL.

The following message was read:

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen.—I submit herewith the following papers for your consideration, favorably passed upon by the Common Council, at an adjourned session, held February 25th, 1889.

The following motion (see page 118, ante), was read, and concurrently adopted:

That the City Civil Engineer be, and is hereby, directed to designate the number of the houses on College avenue, between Seventh and Eighth streets.

The following resolution (see page 120, ante), was read:

Resolved, That the name of Railroad street be changed to Fulton street.

And it was concurrently adopted by the following vote:

AYES, 7—viz: Aldermen Laut, Reinecke, Reynolds, Smith, Taylor, Tousey, and President Wright.

NAYS, 1-viz: Alderman Connett.

The following motions (see pages 121 and 122, ante), were read, and concurrently adopted:

That the property holders on Blackford street repair their sidewalk, east side, from Washington street to Market street. If not done in sixty days, that the Street Commissioner be instructed to do the work and charge the property holders.

That Jno. S. Spann be permitted to curb the sidewalk in front of his premises, known as Lot number 374, on Hoyt avenue, at his own expense, and under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

The following entitled ordinance was read the first and second times, and then read the third time:

Ap. 0.13, 1889—An ordinance appropriating money for the payment of the salaries and compensation of the members of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen; of the County Auditor and the Treasurer for the City; of the City Officers and officers and members of the Fire and Police Departments; the Committee Clerk, City Janitor, Assistant City Janitor, Tomlinson Hall Janitor, Tomlinson Hall Assistant Janitor, and Market Masters of the East and West markets. [Amount appropriated, \$16,719.08.]

- S. O. 131, 1888—An ordinance to provide for grading and graveling the roadway of Bloyd street, from Line street to Rural street.
- S. O. 134, 1888—An ordinance to provide for grading and bowldering the first alley west of Mississippi street, from New York street to Vermont street.
- S. O. 135, 1888.—An Ordinance to provide for grading, bowldering and curbing the gutters, and widening the sidewalks to a width of 20 feet, of Ohio street, from Mississippi street to the canal.
- S. O. 136, 1888.—An ordinance to provide for grading, bowldering and curbing the north gutter of Vermont street, from Indiana ave. to the canal.
- S. O. 137, 1888—An ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick the south sidewalk of North street, from Blackford, street to Douglass street.
- S. O. 138, 1888—An ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick the east sidewalk of Douglass street, from Michigan street to North street.
- S. O. 139, 1888—An ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick the west sidewalk of Blackford street, from Michigan street to North street.
- S. O. 141, 1888—An ordinance to provide for re-grading and graveling the roadway of Michigan street, grading and bowldering the gutters and placing a gutter stone therein, and widening the sidewalks thereof to a width of twenty-five (25) feet, from Meridian street to Pennsylvania street, and repealing Special Ordinance No. 109, 1888.
- S. O 142, 1888—An ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick, the southwest sidewalk of Virginia avenue, from Washington street to South street, where not already properly paved.
- S. O. 144, 1888—An ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp-posts, lamps and fixtures (complete to burn gas, except the service pipes,) on Home avenue, between Delaware street and Alabama street.
- S. O. 1, 1889—An ordinance to provide for the erection of one lamp-post, lamp and fixtures (complete to burn gas, except the service pipes,) on Ellsworth street, between New York and Vermont streets.
- S. O. 2, 1889—An ordinance to provide for grading, bowldering and curbing the east gutter of Blake street, from Warhington street to Indiana avenue.
- S. O. 3, 1889—An ordinance to provide for grading, bowldering and curbing the west gutter of Blake street, from the first alley south of New York street to Indiana avenue.
- S. O. 7, 1889—An ordinance to provide for grading and bowldering the north gutter of Second street, and curbing with stone and paving with brick the sidewalk thereof, from Illinois street to Tennessee street.
- S. O. 9, 1889—An ordinance to provide for the construction of a twelve-inch vitrified stone ware pipe sewer in and along Pratt street, from Delaware street to the east line of Alabama street.
- S. O. 10, 1889—An ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick, the east sidewalk of Central avenue, from the State Ditch to Eleventh street.
- S. O. 11, 1889—An ordinance to provide for the construction of a brick sewer two and one-half feet internal diameter, in and along Pennsylvania street, from Home avenue to Seventh street, and providing for the assessment and collection of the cost thereof.

- S. O. 12, 1889-An ordinance to provide for grading and graveling the first alley east of Linden street, from Woodlawn avenue to the first alley north of Woodlawn avenue.
- S. O. 13, 1889-An ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp-posts, lamps and fixtures (complete to burn gas, except the service pipes,) on Hall Place street, between Seventh and Ninth streets.
- S. O. 14, 1889—An ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick, the south sidewalk of Elizabeth street, from Blake street to Patterson street.
- S. O. 15, 1889—An ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick, the north sidewalk of Elizabeth street, from Blake street to Locke street.

On motion, S. O. 131, 1888, was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys; S. O. 1, 1889, to the Committee on Public Light, and S. O.'s 9 and 11, of 1889, of the foregoing entitled ordinances, were referred to he Committee on Sewers and Drainage.

Alderman Smith presented the following remonstrance against the passage of S. O. 9, 1889; which was read:

Members of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, Indiana:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, citizens and owners of ground on Pratt street, between Alabama and Delaware streets, of said City of Indianapolis, remonstrate against the passage of Special Ordinance No. 9, 1889, providing for the construction of a one-foot pipe sewer on said street, between the points mentioned. Said proposed sewer will be of no benefit to the public or the majority of property owners; but if made, will likely become a nuisance and a positive damage. And we will ever pray, etc.

Also, extend mains on Union street from present terminus to Phipps street, and locate fire hydrants at the intersection of Phipps and Union street."

"Whereas, Gas lamps to the number of four hundred, were ordered discontinued on account of one hundred electric lights having been placed on the several streets and avenues of the city, and the stated number of gas lamps not having been discontinued; therefore, be it

"Moved, That the City Civil Engineer be directed to at once discontinue such lamps as he thinks best, to the number of four hundred or more."

Recommend said motion be adopted.
