PROCEEDINGS OF COMMON COUNCIL.

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ADJOURNED SESSION-JULY 5, 1889.

The Common Council of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Council Chamber, Friday evening, July 5th, A. D. 1889, at eight o'clock, in adjourned session, pursuant to adjournment.

- PRESENT-Hon. Caleb S. Denny, Mayor, and ex officio President of the Common Council in the Chair, and 17 members, viz: Councilmen Burns, Coy, Cummings, Darnell, Davis, Dunn, Elliott, Finch, Gasper, Gaul, Hicklin, Kelley, Markey, Pearson, Swain, Thalman, and Trusler.
- ABSENT, 8-viz: Councilmen Johnston, Long, McClelland, O'Connor, Parkinson, Smith, Stuckmeyer, and Wilson.

The City Attorney submitted the following report; which was concurred in:

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen:—I have carefully examined the three several resolutions providing for the running of electric cars, first to Brightwood; second to the Julien Electric Traction Company, along Vermont street, and third to the Citizens' Street Railroad Company, on all the streets in the city.

All these resolutions are crudely drawn, and unsafe, and, in my judgment, it would be unwise to pass either of them, as no restr ctions or regulations are thrown around them for the city's protection. In lieu of them I have drafted, first, an ordinance supplemental to the present ordinances of the city, giving the Citizens' Street Railroad Company the right to operate one line of street railway by any electric system said company may select, from the intersection of Peru street and Massachusetts avenue, or Home and College avenues, eastward to Brightwood, and have made a part of such ordinance all of the present conditions, restrictions, requirements and regulations of all other ordinances of the city, referring to said company, and have limited the charter period to the same time as that under which they are now operating.

Second, as to the resolution granting the Julien Electric Company the right to tear up and lay track in Vermont street, I recommend that until said company shall appear and file a bond, conditioned that they will pay all damsges incurred, and will put back such street in good condition, and the property holders therein shall consent thereto, that no privilege of this kind be granted to it.

The use of electro-motive power is no longer an experiment, but is a fixed fact. It certainly is not necessary to tear up the streets of this city for the purpose of experimenting with any electrical device to test its power. Its power is already conceded. The only question there is left, is the relative expense of operating an electric plant in comparison with one operated by animal power; and this is a question to be settled by the street car companies, and not by the city, and for this no streets need be torn up. Until some company will agree to do something more than experiment on the streets of this city not already occupied by a street railway track, I advise that the Common Council and Board of Aldermen take no action in the matter. I refer you to the next section of this report, which, in my judgment, will furnish an adequate means for electric systems to test the practicability of any such system where they desire simply to experiment.

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Third. I recommend that the resolution granting the Citizens' Street Railroad Company the authority to propel cars by electric storage batt-ry, on their lines in this city, be not granted, because it is entirely too sweeping in its terms, and would, in my judgment, operate as a perpetual franchise to said company.

Furthermore, the President of the company informs me that as electricity is now developed, they at present, at least, can not afford to operate a storage battery system in this city, because of its great expense, and of its experimental condition; but said company, as an experiment, is willing to operate, or allow any other person or corporation, to operate on any of their lines, any cars propelled by an electric storage battery. Therefore, for an experimental test only, I have prepared a resolution which I submit herewith, and recommend its adoption in lieu of the two last resolutions referred to in this report, heretofore submitted to me.

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianopolis, That consent be, and the same is hereby, given to the Citizens' Street Railroad Company to allow street cars to be propelled by any method of electric storage battery, upon any of said company's lines in this city. upon such terms as may be agreed upon between said company and any person, firm or corporation owning, controlling or operating any storage battery system:

Provided, That this permission is intended to be, and is to be, enjoyed for the purpose only of experimenting with storage battery systems, and to be enjoyed until May 1st, 1890, and for no other purpose and for no longer time whatsoever.

Provided, further, That said company shall save the City of Indianapolis harmless on account of aav injuries that may result therefrom to persons or property.

And it was adopted by the following vote:

O. 32, 1889—An ordinance supplemental to the ordinance of the City of Indianapolis, entitled "An ordinance authorizing the construction, extension and operation of certain passenger railways in and upon the streets of the City of Indianapolis;" ordained and established January 18, 1864, and all other ordinances of the City of Indianapolis amendatory of and supplemental to said entitled ordinance.

Councilman Cummings moved to refer the above entitled ordinance to the Committee on Railroads.

Councilman Hicklin moved as a substitute, to suspend the Rules and place the ordinance on its final passage.

Which motion failed of adoption, by the following vote:

Councilman Thalman presented the following remonstrance; which was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys:

To the Honorable Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen: — We, the undersigned, owners of property along that portion of Michigan street, in the City of Indianapolis, proposed to be improved, do hereby protest and remonstrate against the passage of an ordinance now pending before your honorable bodies, viz: "An ordinance to provide for re-grading and paving with brick the roadway of Michigan street, and curbing with stone and widening the sidewalks thereof to a width of twenty-five feet, from Meridian street to Indi-Lydia B. Harrison, 150 feet; A. M. Fletcher, 203 feet; Jonathan Frankem, 203 feet; Mrs. Leah P. Ramsay, 150 feet; Charles Polster, 127 feet-and 20 others. ana avenue."

Councilman Gasper offered the following motion; which was referred to the Rental Committee, with power to act:

That the Rental Committee be authorized to receive \$125.00 per month from Jesse L. McDaniel for the daily use of Tomlinson Hall for the purpose of photo-graphing the games of base ball played by the Indianapolis Club. Said McDaniel to vacate the Hall any day the city wishes to rent the same, and McDaniel to re-ceive credit for any day or days the Hall is rented to other parties: *Provided*, that if any extra expense be incurred in cleaning or putting in order said Hall, on account of his so using it, said McDaniel shall pay all such expenses.

Councilman Dunn offered the following motion; which was referred to the Committee on Public Property:

That the Street Commissioner be ordered to cause the west side of West street, from the Canal to New York street, to be sprinkled at the city's expense.
