

PROCEEDINGS OF BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

REGULAR SESSION—SEPTEMBER 9, 1889.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis met in the Aldermanic Chamber, Monday evening, September 9th, A. D. 1889, at eight o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT—Hon. Granville S. Wright, President of the Board of Aldermen, in the Chair, and Aldermen Clark, Laut, Rail, Reinecke, Reynolds, Smith, Taylor, and Tousey—9.

ABSENT, 1—viz: Alderman Connett.

MESSAGES AND PAPERS FROM THE COMMON COUNCIL.

The report of the City Civil Engineer, accompanied with estimates, (see pages 640 and 641, *ante*), was read, and the favorable action of the Common Council thereon, concurred in.

The following estimate resolution (see page 641, *ante*), was read :

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, That the accompanying first and final estimate in behalf of James W. Hudson, for grading, bowldering and curbing the west gutter of Blake street, from the first alley south of New York street to Indiana avenue, be, and the same is hereby, adopted as the estimate of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of said city; and that the property owners are hereby required to pay the sums set opposite their respective names.

The report from the Committee on Public Property, allowing bills for the improvement of Garfield Park, (see page 644, *ante*), (was read and concurrently adopted.

The following motions (see pages 660, 661, 662, 663 and 665, *ante*), were read and concurrently adopted :

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, ordered to clean the gutters on Hall Place street. The same has never been cleaned since it was a street.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, ordered to notify the property holders on the east side of Tennessee street, north of Fourteenth street to Fall Creek, to set back their fences to the proper line of said property, so the people can have a sidewalk to use instead of street, and to do the same within thirty days.

That the City Civil Engineer be, and is hereby, instructed to re-locate the lamp-post now situated twenty feet east of Budd street, on Vermont street, to the corner of Budd and Vermont streets, as its present location is not as desirable as the above removal will make it.

That the property owners on the east side of Mulberry street, from Poplar street to Ray street, be permitted to grade and pave with brick, to a width of four (4) feet, the east sidewalk of such street, at their own expense, and according to stakes set by the City Civil Engineer.

That N. E. Dynes be allowed to curb the gutter in front of his premises on Laurel street, at his own expense, under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

That Anton Mauer be allowed to re lay with brick the sidewalk in front of his premises, at his own expense, under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

That the City Civil Engineer be ordered to re-advertise the dyke along Fall Creek, and receive new bids for the same, as the parties receiving this contract have failed to file bond for the construction of the same.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to clean the drain-pipes across Cedar street, on Huron street.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to fix the gutters at the corners of Fletcher avenue and Cedar street.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, ordered to cut the weeds in and around the City Park on Brookside avenue.

The following resolution (see page 660, *ante*), was read :

Resolved, That the name of "Lambeth Street," through its entire length from Clifford avenue to Brookside avenue, be changed to "Woodruff Avenue," and that hereafter said street be known as "Woodruff Avenue."

And it was concurrently adopted by the following vote :

To the Mayor, Common Council and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned represents that he is the owner of the west half of the east half of Lot two (2,) in Out-lot "H," in the City of Indianapolis, situated on Court street, between East and Liberty streets. That on May 26, 1876, in the matter of the opening of Court street, from East to Noble street, the City Commissioners assessed against the said property of the undersigned, as benefits on account of said opening, the sum of \$117.00; the records in the City Clerk's office show that \$75.00 of said sum was paid. The undersigned states, upon oath, that all of said \$117.00 was paid by him to the city. Wherefore he asks your honorable bodies to direct the City Clerk to certify off of the books in his office, and wherever else they have been transcribed, all of said balance so assessed and charged against said property.

The following entitled ordinance was read the second time, and then read the third time:

S. O. 129, 1889—An ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick the north sidewalk of Clifford avenue, from Jefferson avenue to a point 135 feet west of Tecumseh street, and the costs thereof.

And it was passed by the following vote:

AYES, 8—viz: Aldermen Clark, Laut, Rail, Reynolds, Smith, Taylor, Tousey, and President Wright.

NAYS—None.


The following entitled ordinances were read the second time and referred to the Committee on Public Light:

S. O. 149, 1889—An ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp posts, lamps between Highland avenue and Archer street.

S. O. 150, 1889—An ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp-posts, lamps and fixtures, (complete to burn gas, except the service pipes,) on Highland avenue, between Ohio and Miami streets.

S. O. 151, 1889—An ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp posts, lamps and fixtures, (complete to burn gas, except the service pipes,) on Archer street, between Miami and Michigan streets.
