The City Attorney submitted the following report; which was read and received:

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen: - You ask for an opinion as to whether or not the city can extinguish and dis mantle gas lamps in the city and re mantle other lamps in lieu thereof in other parts of the city, and erect in place of such dis-mantled lamps electric lights?

I have carefully examined the contract between the city and the Indianapolis Gas Light and Coke Company, dated July 24, 1888, and find the following facts: Said contract expires on the 31st day of December, 1890. By it the city agrees to pay fifteen dollars (\$15 00) per post for all the lamps burning in the city on the date of such contract, except such number of lamps as the Committees on Public Light of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen and the City Civil Engineer should order extinguished in lieu of one hundred electric lights.

It further provides as follows: Said Gas Company "agrees to dis-mantle any gas lamp now erected and re-light in lieu thereof any lamp post now erected or that may be hereafter erected upon the lines of existing mains, when so ordered by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen during the existence of the present contract, and due notice being given by the City Civil Engineer, without any cost to the city.'

Taking these two provisions together, I answer-

First-That the number of gas lamps that shall be extinguished in lieu of one hundred electric lights, is left entirely to the Committees of Public Light of the Common Council and Board of Aldermen, together with the City Civil Engineer, and that such number is not limited by said contract.

Second-The Common Council and Board of Aldermen can cause additional electric lights to be erected any where in the city, and cause the dis mantling of such gas lights as are displaced by such additional electric lights, provided other gas lamps are re-mantled or new ones erected at other places in lieu of such gas lamps so displaced by such additional electric lights.

REPORTS, ETC., FROM CITY OFFICERS.

The City Attorney submitted the following report; which was read and received:

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—At your last meeting a motion was passed instructing me to report, at this meeting, as to whether or not the natural gas companies, under the ordinance, can collect from consumers, three months pay in advance.

I answer, that the natural gas ordinance provides for monthly rates and annual rates; but the only clause respecting the time of payment, reads as follows:

"Any corporation, company, firm or individual, furnishing gas under the provisions of this ordinance, shall have the right to discontinue further supply of gas to any consumer in case of ten days default, after the first day of each succeeding month, in the payment of charges for said gas."

This language is not at all clear or specific, but taking it in connection with the rest of the ordinance, I am of the opinion that the proper legal construction thereof

is that consumers can pay natural gas bills monthly.

While this, in my judgment, is the law, it is claimed that the natural gas rates in Indianapolis are exceedingly low; lower, in fact, than the rates of any city of any considerable size in the United States, ranging but from thirty (30) to fifty (50) per cent. of the cost of coal. Large additional outlays are being made by the natural gas companies to supply consumers. I am informed that in the neighborhood of sixteen thousand natural gas connections will have been made in this city before cold weather; that to meet the enormously increased demand for gas, it will be necessary to make large additional outlays in order to insure sufficient gas for the winter.

I am further informed that to meet and insure this greatly increased demand for gas, the Consumers' Gas Trust Company will be obliged to expend about \$150,000 additional money; and that to meet this necessary and additional expense, said company issued the order to collect gas birls three months in advance.
