## ADJOURNED SESSION-APRIL 25, 1881.

#### REPORTS, ETC., FROM OFFICIAL BOARDS.

The Board of Public Improvements, through Councilman Morrison, submitted the following report; which was received, and the recommendations severally concurred in, except the 12th, 17th, 34th, 44th, 52d, 62d and 65th clauses, which were referred back to the Board:

To the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—The Board of Public Improvements, to whom sundry papers were referred, would report:

1st. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to clean and grade the gutters on First street, from St Clair street to Cherry street, to carry the water that stands therein away.

Recommend the work be done.

2d. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to flag and bowlder the crossing of McCarty street on the west side of West street.

Recommend the work be not done.

3d. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to lay a double stone crossing on Kentucky avenue across South and West streets.

Recommend the work be done.

4th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to open the gutters, and put a thick coat of gravel on Maryland street, between Helenstreet and the paper mill.

Recommend the work be not done.

5th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to fill the chuck-holes with gravel in Spring street, from New York street to North street. Recommend the work be not done.

6th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to raise (to a proper grade) that portion of the sidewalk on the west side of Union street immediately north of McCarty street.

Recommend the gutters be opened.

7th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to erect stone protection, for the protection of life and property, on West Michigan street, between the mill race and White River.

The Council have ordered a fence built for said protection. Recommend the

stone work be not done.

8th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to repair the street crossing at the intersection of Massachusetts avenue and Alvordstreet.

Recommend the work he done.

9th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to open the guttersunder the bridges and repair crossings at intersection of Woodlawn avenue and. Olive street.

Recommend the work be done.

10th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to clean the gutters on Broadway street, from St. Clair street to Christian avenue.

Recommend the work be not done.

11th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to clean the gutters of Oak street, from Massachusetts avenue to the first alley north of Cherrystreet.

Recommend the work be not done.

12th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to clean the gutters on Arch street, from Park avenue to Plum street, and place culverts on the south side, at the crosing of Broadway street.

Recommend the culvert be built.

13th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to scrape and cleam. East street, from South street to Morris street.

Recommend the work be done.

14th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to lay single stones crossings across East street, at or near the south side of Buchanan and Coburnstreets.

Recommend the work be done.

15th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to at once put in better condition the street crossings, at the intersection of Ohio and Delaware streets.

Recommend the work be not done.

16th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to clean the gutters of Ohio street, from Alabama street to East street.

Recommend the work be done.

17th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to lay double stone crossings across Merrill street, on the west side of West street. Recommend the work be not done.

18th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to repair West Washington street, from White River bridge to corporation limits, by filling holes and bad places with gravel.

Recommend the chuck-holes be filled near the railroad.

19th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to fill the chuck-holes with gravel in Michigan street, from Noble to first alley east of Pine street.

Recommenn the work be done

20th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to fill the chuck-holes with gravel, in Market street, from Noble street to Arsenal avenue.

Recommend the work be not done.

21st. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to lay a double stone crossing (of the usual width), over Madison avenue, on a line with the north sidewalk of McCarty street. Also across Illinois street, on a line with the north and south sides of McCarty street.

Recommend the work be done.

22d. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to place the street and alley crossings on the west side of the street in a like condition to those on the east.

Recommend the work be not done.

23d. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to clean the gutters on Smith street, from Indiana avenue, one square south.

Recommend the work be done.

24th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to clean the gutters and fill the chuck-holes with gravel, on Blake street, from Washington street to Indiana avenue.

Recommend the chuck-holes be filled.

25th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to place a culvert over the gutter on Elizabeth street, at the intersection of Agnes street.

Recommend the work be done.

26th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to clean the gutters on Locke street, from Elizabeth street to Indiana avenue.

Recommend the work be done.

27th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to repair West street, from Washington street to North street.

Recommend the work be not done.

28th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to put down a stone crossing on Massachusetts avenue at the south side of New York street, at the intersection of Delaware street.

The work has been done by order of Common Council and Board of Aldermen,

March 9, 1881.

29th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to put flag stone crossings across Circle street (north side), at the intersection of Meridian street.

Recommend that the work be not done.

30th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to lay a double stone crossing across Walnut street, on the west side of Delaware street.

Recommend the work be done.

31st. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to place a bridge-across the gutter on the east side of Shelby street, at its intersection with Beecher street.

Recommend the work be done.

32d. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner open gutters and place footbridges at the intersection of Reed street and Woodlawn avenue.

Recommend the work be done.

33d. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to repair sidewalk and gutter on east side of Shelby street, from Willow street to its southern terminus, it being dangerous to travel this road after dark.

Recommend the work be not done.

34th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to repair the sidewalks on Stevens street, with gravel, where necessary.

Recommend the work be not done.

35th. Is a motion to have a stone crossing placed on the south side of Merrill street, at the crossing of Delaware. This is a very necessary improvement, as there is no crossing at all there, and is much needed, especially on account of the children going to and from school.

Recommend the work be done.

36th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to clean the gutters and fill the chuck-holes on West street, from Merrill to Morris streets.

Recommend the chuck-holes be filled.

37th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, ir structed to clean the gutters and fill the chuck-holes on Ray street, from Illinois street to. Pogue's Run.

Recommend the work be not done.

38th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to lay a double stone crossing on Washington street, at the crossings of State avenue, Arsenal avenue, Oriental street, Highland street, Cruse street, Pine street, and Davidson street.

Recommend the work be not done.

39th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to clean the gutters and fill the chuck-holes in Davidson street, between Ohio street and North street.

Recommend the work be not done.

40th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to clean the gutters and fill the chuck-holes in New York street, from Noble street to Pine street.

Recommend the work be not done.

41st. That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to clean the gutters and fill the chuck-holes in North street, from Noble street to Pine street.

Recommend the work be not done.

42d. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to repair California street, between North and New York streets.

Recommend the work be done.

43d. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to repair Michigan street, between the canal and Douglass street.

Recommend the work be done.

44th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to put down stone-crossings at the crossing of Ohio and Delaware streets.

Recommend the work be not done.

45th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner rapair the first alley north of Washington street, between Illinois and Meridian streets, and raise the bowlders at the mouth of the alley on Illinois street to a level with the sidewalk, sloping to the center.

Recommend the work be done.

46th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner is directed to repair crossing on south side of Woodlawn avenue, at its intersection with Linden street.

Recommend the work be not done.

47th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to lay double stone crossing across the southern terminus of Dillon street; also across the western terminus of Prospect street.

Recommend the work be done.

48th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to place a stone crossing across Virginia avenue, opposite the first alley north of Mc-Carty street.

Recommend the work be done.

49th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to lay double stone crossings from Massachusetts to Christian avenue, on Plum street.

Recammend the work be not done.

50th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to place a double stone crossing on the east side of Madison avenue, at the intersection of Yeiser street.

Recommend the work be done.

51st. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to repair the mouth of the first alley south of Louisiana street, on the east side of Tennessee street, and to fill the chuck-holes and repair Tennessee street, between Louisiana and South streets; also, South street, between Tennessee and Illinois streets.

Recommend the work be done.

52d. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner is hereby directed to at once lay four double stone crossings at the intersection of Delaware and Ohio streets. Said crossings are centrally located, in constant use, and in very bad condition.

Recommend the work be not done.

53d. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner is hereby directed to clean Liberty street, from Washington street to New York street.

Recommend the work be not done.

54th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to clean and put in passable condition Court street, from Alabama street to Noble street.

Recommend the work be not done.

55th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner is hereby directed to clean New Jersey street, from Washington street to New York street.

Recommend the work be not done.

56th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to lay a double stone crossing on north side of Maryland, across Missouri street.

Recommend the work be not done.

57th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to fill chuck-holes on Morris street, between Meridian street and J. M. & I. railroad.

Recommend the work be done.

58th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to clean the west gutters of Bellefontaine avenue, from Seventh street to the State ditch; also, the gutters on Broadway, College avenue and Ash streets, from Seventh street to Christian avenue.

Recommend the work be done.

59th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to clean the gutters on First and Second streets, from Meridian street to the canal.

Recommend the work be done.

60th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to fill holes with gravel on Seventh street and Mill street, and clean the gutters on Seventh street. from railroad west to canal

Recommend the work be done.

61st. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to clean gutters on Second street, from railroad west to canal.

Recommend the work be done.

62d. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to fill the chuck-holes and clean gutters on Ohio street, between Pennslyvania and Delaware streets.

Recommend the work be not done.

63d. Is a motion that D. Rickets have permission to put down a brick pavement in front of his property, on North Pennsylvania street, corner of North street. Said work to be done at his own expense, and under the direction of the City Civil Engineer.

Recommend the work be done.

64th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner notify the property owners, southeast corner of Circle and Meridian streets, to raise the brick on the sidewalk, so that the water will run off, the same having sunk several inches below the curb. If the same be not done in ten days, that the Street Commissioner do the work and collect the cost from the property owner.

Recommend the work be done.

65th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to raise the stone crossing across Delaware, on north side of Walnut street; the same being so low as to be of no use.

Recommend the dirt be cleaned off of the crossing.

66th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be instructed to repair the gutters of Fort Wayne avenue, between Pennsylvania and Delaware streets.

Recommend the work be not done.

67th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to scrape the gutters on Buchanan street.

Recommend the work be not done.

Is a motion that the Street Commissioner fill the chuck-hole at corner of Sullivan and Bismark streets.

Recommend the work be done.

69th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner be directed to make necessary repairs on Coburn street, between East street and Virginia avenue. Recommend the work be done.

#### REPORTS, ETC., FROM STANDING COMMITTEES.

The Finance Committee, through Councilman Kahn, submitted the following report:

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen: -- The following motion was referred to your Finance Committee:

"That the Finance Committee be, and are hereby, instructed to report at the next meeting of Council what amount, if any, the expenses of the city government exceeds the revenue, and to report back if this Council and the Council of 1879 and 1880 were not compelled to encroach upon and anticipate the revenues of the city."

In conformity with above your committee take pleasure in presenting to you the very satisfactory exhibit of the administration of city atlairs, during said period:

There was received for the year 1879–80, from all sources. \$562,929 41

Expenses for said fiscal year. 587,873 30

Expense over revenue on a levy of 75 cents 24,943 89

Receipts for the fiscal year of 1880-1. 477,154 00

Expenses to date, March 31st 408,239 02

Leaving a balance (after having paid the deficit of the last fiscal year of 24,943.89) the sum of . 69,914 98

for the running expenses of the two remaining months of this fiscal year.

These figures are all taken from the records.

This exhibit speaks for itself, and needs no further comment from your committee.

The Judiciary Committee, through Councilman Pritchard, submitted the following report:

Indianapolis, April 25th, 1881.

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Your Judiciary Committee, together with the City Attorney, to whom was referred sundry papers, report thereon as follows:

The first is the petition of Mary Swain McAvoy, Isaac N. Sims, John W. Herren, Eleazar Bales, A. P. Stanton, A. E. Stanton and D. R. Brown, showing that a plat of land known as Stanton & Francis' addition to the city is not now, and never was, contiguous to any territory annexed to the city. That the Common Council, by resolution passed in 1874, annexed this addition as contiguous territory (see Council Proceedings of 1873 and 1874, pages 1678, 1691 and 1834), when, in point of fact, it was not contiguous territory. The petitioners ask to be relieved from payment of all city taxes assessed against the property. The Stanton & Francis' addition, not being contiguous territory, the resolution annexing the same to city was null and void. Your committee, therefore, report in favor of petitioners, that the City Treasurer be directed to certify off the tax duplicate all taxes assessed against the real estate in said addition.

The second is petition of Margaret Barrett, by T. A. Goodwin, showing that she is a widow, and the owner of lot 17, square one (1), out-lot 28, and that it is of the value of \$350. This property has been sold for taxes for years when widows' property was exempted from taxation. Petitioner asks to be released from the payment of said taxes. The Supreme Court has recently decided that the statutes exexping widows' property (where less than \$1,000) from taxation was unconstitutional. The case went up from the Marion Superior Court. The court below held the statute unconstitutional, and the Supreme Court affirmed the decision. We can not, therefore, if we so desired, grant the prayer of the petitioner. We therefore

recommend the prayer of the petitioner be not granted.

The third is the petition of the Sisters of Providence, showing that they are the owners of lot 14 in Wishmeier & P.'s subdivision of out-lot 49, in city; that the same was assessed for taxes for the year 1880, which taxes were paid by petitioners. The property, at the time the assessment was made, was used for educational purposes, and therefore, it is claimed, not liable to assessment for taxes. Under these state of facts, the property by statute is exempt from taxation, but the payment is a voluntary onea nd can not be recovered. Your committee therefore recommend that the prayer of petitioners be not granted.

The fourth is the petition of Maria Ann Stillz, showing that she is the owner of lot No. 132 in that part of Greenlawn Cemetry known as the North Burying Ground, and says that the city has taken possession of said lot by the act of burying paupers therein. She asks that she be paid the full value of said lot. The petitioner attaches a deed to her petition from Edwin J. Peck and wife, conveying said lot to Jacob Birkenmayer, and the lot seems to belong to him and not the pe-Your committee therefore recommend that the prayer of petitioner be not granted.

The fifth is the petition of Thomas P. Miller, showing that he is the owner of lot No. 102 in Noble heirs' subdivision, located on Spring street. That by reason of insufficient gutters at this point on Spring street, his yard was flooded with water in February of this year, resulting in a damage to his cellar of \$5, to his well of \$10, cistern of \$10, and general inconvenience of getting in and out \$20, as petitioner claims. He asks compensation for damages sustained. Your com-

mittee recommend that the prayer of the petitioner be not granted.

The sixth is the petition of Levi Britton, showing that on the 24th day of January, 1881, he slipped and fell on West Washington street, in front of Capital House. There was snow and ice on the pavement, causing the petitioner to slip and fall. Petitioner asks that he be paid a reasonable compensation for the damages he has sustained. Your committee recommend that the prayer of petitioner be not granted.

On motion by Councilman VanVorhis the recommendation in the third clause was not concurred in, and the amount ordered to be placed in the next general appropriation ordinance; the balance of the report was then concurred in.

The Committee on Public Health, through Councilman VanVorhis, submitted the following report; which was concurred in:

> COUNCIL CHAMBER, Indianapolis, April 25th, 1881.

Mr. President: -- Your Committee on Public Health deem it their duty to call attention to some things that, in their judgment, are likely, during the coming summer, to be the cause of great inconvenience and discomfort to our citizens, and which, if immediate steps are not taken to correct, will seriously affect the public health:

The garbage contractor is in no sense complying with the terms of his contract, or with the requirements of the ordinance under and by virtue of which the contract was made. The ordinance deprives citizens of the privilege of employing whom they please to remove "garbage and waste water," making it a fineable offense for any other than the contractor to engage in the business. Thus citizens are wholly dependent upon the contractor, and if he fails to do his duty, there is no possible way by which they can procure the removal of "garbagr, &c.," without procuring some one to violate General Ordinance 33, 1880. Already the inconvenience is being felt and citizens are complaining that accumulations have not been removed, though frequent notices have been given.

Your committee feel warranted in concluding from the information received that not one tenth the "houses inside the corporate limits" have been visited in accordance with the requirements of section 5 of the ordinance, and it is even asserted that there are wards of the city where the wagons of the contractor have not

yet been seen.

Your committee further feel warranted in concluding, and so report, from the information we have, that the contractor has not a sufficient number of wagons to enable him to comply with the terms of his contract, though more than six months

have elapsed since the contract was entered into.

Your committee, therefore, recommend that the Board of Health, the sanitary police, and the regular police of the city be ordered to file against said contractor for every violation within their knowledge of section 3 of the ordinance, and that citzens of the city be requested to do the same; and that no more warrants be drawn on the City Treasurer in favor of the garbage contractor until he fully complies with the terms of his contract, and all damage heretofore caused shall have been made good.

2d. No attention whatever is being paid by persons engaged in removing the contents of privy yaults, &c., either in regard to the manner of removal or place of deposit, to any ordinance relating to that subject, or to the orders of the Board

of Health.

Such materials, under various pretexts, are being dumped at various points within, and places less than two miles without the corporation. This reckless and willful violation of city law will be a very serions detriment to the health and comfort of the citizens of the city. More particularly will the southwestern part of the city suffer, and it is due the citizens of the city, and of that section especially, that the most rigid enforcement of all ordinances of the city, and all orders

of the Board of Health upon this subject, should be exacted.

Your committee, therefore, recommend that the Board of Health, sanitary police, and regular police be ordered to file against all persons engaged in the business of vault-cleaning, who have not taken out license according to law, and to file against and prosecute all violations within their knowledge, of any ordinance of the city, or any order of the Board of Health authorized by ordinances, concerning the removal and disposal of privy vault cleanings, and other deleterious matter of like character; and that citizens be requested to do the same.

By consent, Councilman VanVorhis offered the following motions; which were adopted:

That the Board of Health, the sanitary police and the regular police of the city be ordered to file against "the contractor for the removal of garbage and other waste matter" for every violation within their knowledge of section 3 of the ordinance; and that citizens of the city be requested to do the same, and that no more money be paid said contractor until he fully complies with his contract.

That the Board of Health, sanitary police and regular police be ordered to file against all persons engaged in the business of vault cleaning, who have not taken out license according to law; and to file against and prosecute all violations within their knowledge by vault cleaners of any ordinance of the city, or any order of the Board of Health authorized by ordinance, concerning the removal of the contents of privy vaults and other deleterious substances of like character; and that citizens be requested to do the same.

## REPORTS FROM SELECT COMMITTEES.

The Committee on Conference, through Councilman VanVorhis, submitted the following report; which was concurred in:

To the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—The Conference Committee, appointed by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen, upon the subject of street guides, recommend that both bodies recede from their action heretofore taken in regard to the matter, and that the following be adopted:

That the preposition herewith submitted of the patentee of the Giroux Street Sign be accepted, and, as fast as it is necessary to purchase new lamps for the city, such lamp frames to be of the pattern required for the Giroux Street Sign and placed on the street corners, and the old lamp frames so replaced be used on all posts not on street corners; that for the present, signs made of strips of frosted glass, without frames, with black letters, be used on all lamps of old style on street corners.
