PROCEEDINGS OF BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

REGULAR SESSION-MAY 11, 1881.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis convened in first regular session, in the Aldermanic Chamber, on Wednesday evening, May 11th, A. D. 1881, at eight o'clock.

For the current year the Board of Aldermen will consist of the following members:

Members holding over.

First District—Francis W. Hamilton. Second District—George P. Wood. Fourth District—William H. Tucker. Fifth District—Diedrich Mussmann.

New members.

First District—James T. Layman. Second District—Derk DeRuiter. Third District—Brainard Rorison. Third District—Harry E. Drew. [To fill vacancy.] Fourth District—Hiram Seibert. Fitth District—John Newman.

George T. Breunig, Clerk, called the Board to order, and stated that all the members elect had duly qualified as Aldermen.

The roll then being called, showed all the members of the new Board present.

On motion by Alderman Tucker, Alderman Mussmann was called to the Chair, to preside as temporary Chairman.

Chairman Mussmann stated that the first business in order would be the election of President and President pro tempore, and that nominations would now be in order.

For President—Alderman Wood placed in nomination Alderman James T. Layman.

No other nomination being made, on motion by Alderman Tucker, the Clerk was instructed to cast the unanimous vote of the Board for said nominee.

Alderman James T. Layman having thus received ten votes, Chairman Mussmann declared Alderman Layman as duly elected President of the Board of Aldermen for the ensuing term.

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For President pro tempore—Adlerman Tucker placed in nomination Alderman Francis W. Hamilton.

No other nomination being made, on motion by Alderman Drew, the Clerk was instructed to cast the unanimous vote of the Board for said nominee.

Alderman Francis W. Hamilton having thus received ten votes, His Honor, President Layman, having taken the chair, declared Alderman Hamilton duly elected President pro tempore of the Board of Aldermen for the ensuing term.

His Honor, the President, read the following message:

Gentlemen of the Board of Aldermen: -I desire to thank my brother members of this body for the mark of honor you have this evening conferred upon me, by your selection as the presiding officer of this Board, and, in accepting this trust, I hope I may be able to meet your expectations, by faithfully and impartially discharging the duties of the office I have assumed so as to merit your esteem and hearty co-operation—that it may be said of us by our fellow citizens, when our official terms have expired, that the Board of Aldermen have done their part in giving us a pure, economical and good city government. I also hope the same may be said of the Council.

There will be before us this term many very important questions to decide, which will require your close and careful consideration, and it is my earnest appeal to each and every member of this body to consider well and not be hasty in hurrying matters through with a rush, but on the contrary, be on the conservative order; and as we are looked upon as a check to unwise legislation, I repeat, see to it that if such legislation comes before you, see that it is positively checked; and what we do, have the satisfaction of knowing that it is well done.

Gentlemen, I again thank you.

The Board of Aldermen having thus been duly organized, His Honor, the President declared said body prepared for the transaction of the regular order of business.

The Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen for the regular session held on May 4th, 1881, having been printed and placed on the desks of the Aldermen, said Journal was approved as published.

The following report from the City Attorney was read and received:

Indianapolis, May 9th, 1881.

To the Mayor, Common Council, and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—I beg leave to report that in the case of John S. Kennedy et al. vs. The City of Indianapolis et al., the Supreme Court of the United States has affirmed the judgment of the Circuit Court for the District of Indiana. This was an action involving the title to a portion of the old Central Canal, or what is now Missouri street. The judgment below was in favor of the city, and this judgment has been affirmed by the Supreme Court.

The case of Mary Tracy vs. The City et al. has been tried in the Superior Court by a jury, and resulted in a verdict in favor of the city. This was an action for personal injuries alleged to have been sustained by falling into an excavation on

South Pennsylvania street.

In the case of Malinda L. Murphy vs. The City, pending in the Circuit Court, the court has returned judgment in favor of the city on demurrer to the complaint. This was an action for personal injuries claimed to have been sustained by reason of a defect in an alley running between Noble street and Massachusetts avenue. Respectfully submitted,
