PROCEEDINGS OF BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

REGULAR SESSION—June 1, 1881.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, met in the Aldermanic Chamber, on Wednesday evening, June 1st, A. D. 1881, at eight o'clock, in regular session.

PRESENT-His Honor, President Layman, in the Chair, and Aldermen DeRuiter, Drew, Hamilton, Mussmann, Rorison, and Seibert-7.

ABSENT-Aldermen Newman, Tucker, and Wood-3.

The Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen for the regular session held on May 25th, 1881, having been printed and placed on the desks of the Aldermen, said Journals were approved as published.

MESSAGES AND PAPERS FROM THE COMMON COUNCIL,

26th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner clean the gutters and fill the chuck-holes on Court street, between Alabama and New Jersey streets.

27th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner build a culvert over the gutter on first alley south of Market street, on east side of Noble street.

29th. Is a motion that the Street Commissioner clean the gutters on Seventh street, between Bellefountaine street and Columbia avenue.

30th. Is a petition of D. Ricketts, asking that the Street Commissioner be directed to raise the flag stone and deepen the gutter on the southeast corner of Pennsylvania and North streets; also, to enlarge the wooden chute under Pennsylvania street, along the south line of North street, so the water can get through it.

To the Honorable Mayor, Common Council and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—In view of the long continued and severe cold of the past winter, and the sudden advent of high temperature—conditions that are certain to produce much sickness and a high mortality, we are making every effort to place the city in as good sanitary condition as possible. Our force is insufficient for the emergency which now exists. We respectfully ask that special orders may be given to the regular Police force to give particular attention to the cleaning of yards and alleys in their several districts.

Gentlemen: -- 1 our Committee on Water, to whom sundry papers were referred, would report;

1st. Is relative to the Water Works Company, having notified the Fire Department that their works were out of fix, and that they could not furnish fire pressure until further notice, and for your committee to confer with the said company, and ascertain how long this state of affairs will continue, and whether such condition is liable to occur often;

The Water Works Company notified the Fire Department the morning after the fire at Hill's Planing Mill, that they could not furnish fire pressure until further notice. Said notice was not given until the following Tuesday—four days afterwards. The Water Works Company state that the accident is not likely to occur again.

2d. Is that the Water Works Company be directed to lay water mains on the following routes: From the corner of Nebraska street and Madison avenue, east to East street; thence north on East street to Coburn street, and on Illinois street from Seventh street to Twelfth street; thence east to Meridian street; thence south to Second street.

We are of the opinion that for the present the last named line should not be extended further north than Tenth street. We recommend the accompanying resolutions be adopted.

Resolved by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen of the City of Indianapolis, That it is necessary for the further and better protection from fire, that water mains be laid and extended in and along Illinois street, from Seventh street to Tenth street; thence in and along Tenth street, from Illinois street to Meridian street; thence in and along Meridian street, from Tenth street to Second street, connecting with the water mains now located at or near the intersection of Second and Meridian streets; that the Water Works Company be notified by the City Clerk to proceed to lay such mains and establish fire hydrants under the direction of the Chief Fire Engineer: such hydrants to be established not less than one thousand feet apart, under the provisions of the charter of the Water Works Company.

And it was concurrently adopted by the following vote:

Ares, 7-viz. Aldermen DeRuiter, Drew, Hamilton, Mussmann, Rorison, Seibert, and President Layman.

On motion by Alderman Drew, the Committee on Water was instructed to confer with the Water Works Company as to the laying of water mains ordered by the Common Council and Board of Aldermen.

The following report from the Committee on Water was read; and the favorable action of the Common Council thereon (see page 116, ante) was concurred in:

To the Common Council and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen: -On the motion of Councilman Pritchard, requiring your committee to inquire into and report the cost of erecting two bathing kouses in the river, at some point above the pork houses, one for gentlemen and the other for ladies, the committee reports:

A partial plan, with estimates, has been kindly furnished by Rev. O. McCulloch. The plan contemplates a plain, rough board structure, with a roof 16 by 60 feet in length; containing 40 rooms, 3 by 6 feet; with a tight board fence, 75 feet in length, extending into the river from either end of the building.

The estimated cost, as given by Peter Routier, Esq., is \$500, for building fences

and anchors complete.

It is suggested that one building would be sufficient, and could be used on alternate days by gentlemen and ladies.

We would recommend that the City Civil Engineer select the best locality for

its erection.

Wells to put in a water plug, for street sprinkling purposes, on the west side of said Virginia avenue, between the points named.

The following motions (adopted by the Common Council—see pages 121, 122, 124, 125 and 126, ante) were read and concurrently adopted:

That Marian Rogers be allowed a bowldered driveway across the sidewalk between Washington street and Market street, on West street.

That the Street Commissioner be directed to re-plank the railway crossing on Virginia avenue, and collect the same from the railway company.

That the City Marshal be directed to order the J., M. & I. Railroad to plank the sidewalks at their railroad crossing on Madison avenue.

That the City Marshal be instructed to notify the owner of the first block east of Hammond's block, northeast corner of New York and Delaware street, to repair the pavement in front of their property.

That as the improvements of West street necessitates the widening of the sidewalks and changing of the gutters, and that as the Vandalia Railroad Company has failed to open sewers across under their tracks to take away the water after being properly notified; therefore

Moved that they receive notice from the proper authority to open sewers on each side of West street, across under their tracks, according to directions of City Civil Engineer, within thirty days; and if not, that the Street Commissioner be instructed to do the work at the railroad company's expense

That A. Donges have permission to lay a brick sidewalk, and curb the gutter with stone, in front of his place, Nos. 436 & 440, south Meridian street, according to stakes to be set by the City Civil Engineer; work to be done at his own expense,

That the City Marshal be, and is hereby, directed to notify the Citizens' Street Railway Co. to take out the two bridges over the gutters on Tennessee street at the erossing of Indiana avenue, and to fill said gutters with gravel. Work to be done to the satisfaction of the City Civil Engineer.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to repave in front of Engine House No 3.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, instructed to take up the blocks and repave with blocks in front of Engine House No. 3.

That the City Marshal notify the property owners to remove the bridge over the gutters on Massachusetts avenue, across the street from the No. 2 Engine House, as it obstructs the flow of water, and is a nuisance; and, if not done in ten days, the Street Commissioner remove the same and collect off of the property owner.

The following motions (adopted by the Common Council—see pages 123, 125 and 126, ante) were read, and referred to the Committee on Streets & Alleys and Sewers & Drainage:

That in view of the fact that the Union Depot Company has failed to put upgates across Illinois street, that they be again notified to attend to it by the City Marshal, and, if not attended to within five days, that the Street Commissioner be instructed to do it at the depot company's expense.

Inasmuch as the President of the Union Railway Company did not favor this-Council with a report stating the intention of said company to erect or not erect the safety-gates at the Virginia avenue crossing of Union Railway tracks, as directed by this Common Council; therefore

Resolved, That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to erect safety-gates at the above crossing, under the direction of the Board of Public Improvements; and that the expense of erecting said gates be charged and collected from said Union Railway Company, unless said gates be erected within thirty daysfrom June 1st, 1881, by the above Union Railway Co.

That the City Marshal be directed to notify the Union Railway Company to erect safety gates across Tennessee, Pennsylvania, Delaware and New Jersey streets within thirty days; and, if not done in said time, said gates be erected by the Street Commissioner, at the expense of said Union Railway Company.

The following motion (adopted by the Common Council—see page 126, ante) was read, and referred to the Committees on Railroads and Public Charities, and Streets & Alleys, and Sewers & Drainage;

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to lay a plank crossing on the east side of Tennessee street crossing Louisiana street, across the Union Railway Company's track, and crossing also the track of the Indianapolis Rolling Mill Company; and charge, and collect, the cost of said work to each of said corporations in proportion to the amount of labor and cost of material done and placed over their respective tracks.

The following entitled ordinances (passed by the Common Council) were severally read the first time:

- S. O. 43, 1881—An Ordinance to provide for re-grading and re-bowldering Meridian street, from Washington street to Louisiana street.
- S. O. 64, 1881—An Ordinance to provide for grading and graveling the first alley east of the intersection of South street and Virginia avenue, from South street to Virginia avenue.
- S. O. 66, 1881—An Ordinance to provide for improving New York street, from Delaware street to New Jersey street, by widening the sidewalks, curbing with stone the outer edges thereof, and bowldering the gutters.
- G. O. 17, 1881—An Ordinance to prohibit geese from running at large within the city of Indianapolis, and prescribing penalties for the violation thereof.

On motion, S. O. 43, 1881, was referred to the Committee on Streets & Alleys and Sewers & Drainage.

REPORTS, ETC., FROM STANDING COMMITTEES.

The Judiciary Committee, through Alderman Rorison, submitted the following report; which was concurred in:

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Judiciary, Ordinances and Rules, to whom was referred the report from the Council Judiciary Committee, submitted to the Board May 25th, 1881, have examined same and report as follows:

1st. Relative to the motion requiring A. Naltner, Garbage contractor, to file a new bond, on account of the decease of John Kistner.

We recommend that action be postponed until the Special Committee appointed to investigate the said contractor, shall have reported; the release of the Kistner estate would also release the other bondsmen, and the new bond, unless expressly stated therein, would not be retroactive, and would cover only future transactions.

2d. Is petition of F. McWhinney, asking for the allowance of interest on a void tax sale.

Recommend the Council action, in granting request, be concurred in.

3d. Is a petition of Home for Friendless Women, asking the payment by city, of the street improvement assessment on Tennessee street.

The Committee on Streets & Alleys and Sewers & Drainage, through Alderman Seibert, submitted the following report; which was concurred in:

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—Your Committee on Streets & Alleys and Sewers & Drainage, to whom S. O. 57 and 58, 1881 providing for the improvement of north Meridian street, between New York and Seventh streets, by graveling the roadway, and paving with stone the gutters, and to report an estimate cost of the city's portion. The following is an estimate cost made by the City Civil Engineer:

\$2.85 per lineal foot front on each side, between New York and St. Clair streets. \$2.05 per lineal foot front on each side, between St. Clair and Seventh streets. The total cost of city's portion between New York and Seventh street, \$5,499.90.

The matter of improving Meridian street, between New York and Seventh streets, certainly has had thorough investigation. Ordinances have been introduced for several kinds of improvements, with petitions for, and remonstrances against, the kind of material to be used; and said matters have been referred and re-referred to committees for investigation, and reported on. January 17th, S. O. 2 and 3, 1881, were introduced as a compromise measure, to re-pave with wooden

blocks the roadway, and bowlder the gutters.

We recommend that the action of the Common

We recommend that the action of the Common Council, in the passage of said S. O. 57 and 58, 1881, be not concurred in, and that said improvement, when made, be according to said ordinances 2 and 3, 1881, except that pine blocks be used instead of cedar.
