OPENING AND REFERRING SEALED PROPOSALS FOR PUBLIC IMPROVE-MENTS.

Sealed proposals for the removal of Garbage, Slops, and Waste matter from within the limits of the city of Indianapolis, were opened, read, and referred to the Committee on Contracts.

REPORT FROM COMMITTEE ON CONTRACTS.

The Committee on Contracts, through Councilman Thalman, submitted the following report; which was concurred in:

"To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, and City Council of the City of Indianapolis:

"WHEREAS, There has been some opposition to your action in reference to the proposed new City Buildings, the early erection of which we deem essential to keep pace with the r pid growth of our city; threfore,

"Resolved, That we, as the representatives of the working masses and laboring element of the city of Indianapolis and vicinity, hereby fully enjoyse the city government in the course they have taken for the erection of municipal offices, City Hall and Market House; that we have the utmost confidence in their ability, and would urge upon them to make no undue delay, but to convert the Tomlinson estate into money, adding to it the five cent levy, which will enable them to replace the dilapidated and ill shapen sheds that at present disgrace the East Market Place, with a building that will add prestige and dignity to our growing city."

Gentlemen:—Since the last meeting of the Council, the case of Hannah J. Eaglan vs. The City—being an action for damages for personal injuries received in a fall on w st Washington street, on account of the alleged negligence of the city in allowing a large accumulation of ice to remain on the sidewalk—has been tried by a jury, resulting in a verdict for the city No motion for a new trial was filed during the term, so that the case is now finally disposed of.

The case of James M. Ball vs. The City, for persona injuries alleged to have been received by falling on west Market street near the Circle, has been dismissed by the court, for failure of plaintiff to discharge a rule entered against him in the cause, and judgment has been entered against him for costs.

The motion for a new trial in the case of Pamelia Tercy vs. The City—being the test case made on the Indianola wash-out matter—has been overruled, and judgmain trendered against the plaintiff for costs. I do not believe an appeal will be taken.

I have the honor to report that the compromise which I was directed to make with the P., C. & St L. R'y. Co., in reference to the cost of repairing the Virginia avenue crossing has been consummated, the company having paid the \$215.96agreed on, and the money has been paid to the treasurer, and his receipt therefor deposited with the City Clerk.

I have likewise the honor to report that the P., C. & St. L. R'y. Co. has delivered to me a deed properly executed to the city, for a strip of ground abutting upon Cruse street, on its east side, extending from Michigan avenue south to the right of way of the C., C & I C. AYES, 16-viz. Councilmen Bryce, Caylor, Cowie, Dean, Dowling, Egger, Harrold, Knodel, Koller, Mauer, Pearson, Pritchard, Stout, Thalman, Ward, and Yoke.

NAYS, 4-viz. Councilmen Bedford, Hartmann, Reichwein, and Weaver.

Councilman Dowling then moved an amendment, that the pay of the teams be increased to \$3.00 per day.

Which amendment was accepted.

The motion, with the amendment, was then adopted.

Councilman Pearson presented the following petition; which was referred to the Judiciary Committee:

To the Mayor, the Board of Aldermen, and the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—Your petitioner shows: That on the 19th of July, 1880, your honorable bodies ordered a refunding to your petitioner of the amount paid by him at tax sale therein referred to. See Proceedings of July 19, 1880, page 278, at bottom of page. The petition upon which that refunding was ordered, will be seen at Proceedings of June 21, 1880, at page 161.

Your petitioner shows that he was not consulted in the matter, nor had he voice or "day in court," whatever, in the premises. But he does not desire to complain of or contest the action taken by your honorable b dies, if he is simply accorded the treatment always and uniformly awarded to all others in these cases; for he need hardly remind your honorable bodies that the law, together with the custom and practice in these matters, without exception, since the organization of the city,

have required and sanctioned the allowance of six per cent. interest on all such refundings. Your honorable bodies, without notice to the undersign d, considered this matter, and ordained that the city had wrongfully taxed the property in question, it being used for school purposes; so that even if law and unexceptioned practice did not require the allowance of interest, it would still be simply monstrous for the city to a tempt to do what no honorable business man would do, or be suffered by the courts to do, *i. e.*, withhold money wrong ully had in violation of its Charter, and not refund it, with interest.

Evidently the omission of interest was a mistake—a mere mistake. Your p titioner has not yet drawn anything under said order. Wherefore your petitioner asks that interest be allowed, etc. And he will ever pray, etc.

That the Street Commissioner be, and is hereby, directed to double his street force for a period of two weeks, in order that our streets and gutters may be cleaned before warm weather.

Councilman Pritchard offered the following motion; which was referred to the Committee on Public Light:

That the first gas rost north of Seventh street, on east side of Mississippi street, be moved on south side of Seventh street, on alley between Mississippi and Tennessee streets.

Councilman Pritchard presented the following petition; which was referred to the Committee on Judiciary;

City of Indianapolis, March 23d, 1882.

To the Hon., the Mayor, Members of the City Council, and Board of Aldermen of said City:

Gentlemen:—Your petitioner, Ann Allen, respectfully represents unto your honors, that she is the owner in file-simple of $67\frac{1}{2}$ leet front by 100 feet de p off the nor h end of Lot No. 9, in Square 65, in said city, and that the city of Indianapolis is the owner in fee-simple of 33 feet 9 inches by 80 feet deep off the south end of said lot; that your petitioner's frontage is on Pearl street, and the city's frontage is on Maryland street; that between these two properities is an alley 15 by 33 feet; that the city has owned and held her 33 feet 9 inches by 80 feet, ever since the 25th of September, 1866, and that ever since that date your petitioner has been assessed with, and paid to the city, taxes on her $67\frac{1}{2}$ by 100 feet, as well as on said alley 15 by 33 feet, and that she never knew until about one year ago, that she had been paying taxes on the Assessor's valuation of $67\frac{1}{2}$ feet by 115 feet, and that she thereupon prot-sted against it, and Mr. William Hadley promised her to bring the matter before your honors, but which has not been done until now; that the property owned by the city is covered with an Engine H use, and said alley is used almost e tirely by the city; that a sewer has been built along the alley-way, or parallel with the west line of her lot and the said ground owned by the city, and that she has been charg d with a "sewer assessment" on 115 feet of aid sewer, when in tr th and n fact, your petitioner should only have been charged on 100 feet. And under the above statement of fact-, your petitioner submits unto your bonors, the following prayer: That the taxes paid since the year 1867, to the year 1881, inclusive, on said 15 feet by 33 feet alley, shall be refunded to her; and that the City Clerk be directed hereafter to compute the taxes upon the Assessor's valuation of 674 by 100, in-tead of 115 feet, and that inasmuch as she has not yet paid the full amount of her "sewer assessment," that she b relieved from the payment on 15 feet of the same.

And your petitioner herew th submits unto your honors, a stat ment showing the amount of taxes which have been paid on said 15 feet. from 1867 to 1881, inclusive, and which she thinks ough to be refunded to her, and also showing the amount of "sewer assessment" she ought to be relieved from pay ng.

Councilman Stout offered the following motion; which was referred to the Fire Board:

That a fire cistern be established at the corner of Park and Linden avenues.

Councilman Thalman offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

That the S reet Commissioner be directed to put down stone crossings across Circle street, at the intersecti n of Meridian and Market streets.

Councilman Thalman offered the following motions; which were adopted:

That the Chief of Police be instructed to file complaints before the Mayor, against all parties who leave the streets in bad condition after laying sewers, pipe, or making sewer connections.

That the City Civil Engineer be, and is hereby, authorized to straighten the walks in University Square so they will run diagonally from corner to corner, according to his plans *nd specifications; the cost of such improvement not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00.)

That the Street Commissioner replace the wooden bridge across the State Ditch on Columbia avenue, which was washed away by the late floods, and that the work be done as soon as possible.

Councilman Weaver offered the following motion; which was referred to the Board of Public Improvements:

To have a culvert placed at the intersection of Darwin street and Hillside avenu; also, to move and enlarge some of the culv rts already in; also, to build culverts or make passable crossings with all the streets crossing Seventh street, between the Peru Railroad and Hillside avenue.

Councilman Weaver offered the following resolution:

PENDING ORDINANCES.

The following entitled ordinances were read the second time, and stricken from the files:

- G. O. 40, 1880—An Ordinance to provide for the construction of a brick sewer in, and along, Massachusetts avenue, from Alabama street to Alvord street; north on Alvord street to Malott avenue; thence along Malott avenue to Columbia avenue; thence north to Seventh street.
- G. O. 43, 1881—An Ordinance providing for the licensing of Public Inns, Taverns, Hotels, and other places kept for public entertainment; also, all shops or other places kept for the sale of articles to be us d in and upon the premises, and prescribing penalties for the violation thereof.
- G. O. 60, 1881—An Ordinance creating Police Commissioners, prescribing their powers and dutics, and regulating the organization of the Police Force of the city of Indianapolis.
- G. O. 61, 1881—An Ordinance providing for the management of the City Hospital, and providing for the selection of Supervisors of said Hospital.
- G. O. 62, 1881—An Ordinance to establish a Dispensary in the city of Indianapolis to be known as the City Dispensary, and to provide for the government and management thereof.
- G. O. 63, 1881—An Ordinance creating Commissioners of Public Works and Improvements, and prescribing their powers and duties, and the manner of their election and appointment.
- G. O. 64, 1881—An Ordinance creating Fire Commissioners, and providing for the organization of the Fire Department of the city of Indianapolis, and prescribing rules and regulations governing the same.
- G. O. 68, 1881-An Ordinance to prevent injury by fire.
- G. O 69, 1881—An Ordinance making a special tax levy for the year 1882 of cents on each one hundred dollars, upon all property within the city of Indianapolis returned for taxation for general city purposes for the year 1882, for the purpose of erecting, constructing, maintaining and repairing sewers in said city.
- G. O. 71, 1881—An Ordinance to provide for the reorganization of the Police Board, Fire Board, Hospital Board, Dispensary Board, and Board of Public Improvements of the city of Indianapolis.
- G. O. 1, 1882—An Ordinance to restrain cows, heifers, bulls and steers, from run ning at large from seven o'clock, P. M., to six o'clock, A. M., and preventing such animals, when breachy, from running at large at any time; providing penalties, establishing pounds and rules for the government thereof; appropriating money in aid thereof, and repealing conflicting ordinances.
- G. O 2, 1882—An Ordinance repealing an ordinance entitled "An ordinance preventing frauds in the sale of wood, and providing for wood measurers," ordained November 23, 1863; and all ordinances amendatory thereof, and supplementary thereto.
- G. O. 3. 1882—An Ordinance regulating the issuing of builing permits, and repealing all ordinances in conflict therewith.

Councilman Dowling moved that G. O. 19, 1882, be taken up for consideration.

Councilman Yoke moved to lay Councilman Dowling's motion on the table.
