ADJOURNED SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE  
CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,  
THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 12TH, 1867, 7 O'CLOCK, P. M. }

The Common Council met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—His Honor, the Mayor, Daniel Macauley, in the chair,  
and the following members :

Councilmen Brown, Burgess, Coburn, Colley, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Jameson, Kappes, Loomis, MacArthur, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—16.

Absent—Councilmen Henschen and Schmidt—2.

His Honor, the Mayor, announced that the order of the evening was the further consideration of the ordinance establishing and granting the right of way to the Indianapolis and Vincennes Railroad Company to construct a track within and through the city of Indianapolis, &c.

Mr. Brown, from the special committee appointed by the Council, made the following report :

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 12, 1867.

*To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:*

The select committee, to whom was referred the general ordinance granting permission to the Indianapolis & Vincennes Railroad Company to lay tracks through the city, beg leave to submit the following report:

A free and full conference was had with the representatives of the Vincennes Railroad and the White River Iron Company, and, also, with the

Chief Engineer of the road, and the City Civil Engineer, and we have the pleasure of reporting that if there have existed any doubts as to whether the two interests named would come into conflict, these have all been settled by a mutual adjustment between the parties.

If the amendments proposed to the pending ordinance are herewith submitted by your committee and adopted, there can be no reasonable ground for complaint on the part of property holders.

The committee, in conclusion, would state that no change of grade is made necessary to enable the street contractor to complete his work.
