REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, Monday, May 4TH, 1868, 7½ O'CLOCK, P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present—His Honor, the Mayor, Daniel Macauley, in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—16.

Absent-Councilmen Burgess and Colley-2.

The proceedings of the regular session held April 27th, 1868, were read and approved.

Business was resumed in the order in which it was left off at last meeting, viz:

ORDINANCES ON SECOND READING.

On motion by Mr. Stanton, special appropriation ordinance No. 22 —1868, was taken up, read the second time and ordered to be engrossed. On motion by Mr. Geisel, special ordinance No. 23-1868, was taken up, read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Geisel, special ordinance No. 20-1868, was taken up, read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Brown, special ordinance No. 17-1868, was taken up, read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Brown, special ordinance No. 16-1868, was taken up, read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Foster, special ordinance No. 18-1868, was taken up, read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

On motion by Dr. Jameson, special ordinance No. 21-1868, was taken up, read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Seidensticker, general ordinance No. 134, authorizing the Junction Railroad Company to lay a track across certain streets, &c., was taken up and read through section by section.

Mr. Brown moved that a further consideration of the ordinance be postponed one week, and called for the ayes and noes.

The question being on postponement, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Henschen, Loomis, MacArthur and Schmidt—9.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Coburn, Goddard, Jameson, Kappes, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn-7.

So the motion to postpone was adopted.

On motion by Mr. Brown, special appropriation ordinance No. 20 -1868, was taken up, read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Brown, special appropriation ordinance No. 23 was taken up, read the second time and ordered to be engrossed.

ORDINANCES ON THIRD READING.

Mr. Davis called up general ordinance No. 132, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE to prohibit the running at large, in the City of Indianapolis, of any swine, boar, sow or barrow, and to regulate the erection and keeping of pig styes and stables.

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Mr. Seidensticker moved to strike out the proviso at the latter part of section one, which provides that hogs shall be penned up from the 1st day of March till the 1st day of June in each year.

Mr. Geisel moved to lay Mr. Seidensticker's motion on the table, and called for the ayes and noes.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Cottrell, Geisel, Henschen and Stanton-4.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Brown, Davis, Foster, Goddard, Jameson, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt, Seidensticker and Woodburn-10.

So the motion to lay on the table was lost.

The question then being on the motion of Mr. Seidensticker to strike out the latter clause of the first section, the ayes and noes were called.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Davis, Goddard, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt and Seidensticker-7.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Cottrell, Foster, Geisel, Henschen, Jameson, Stanton and Woodburn-7.

There being a tie vote, His Honor, the Mayor, voted in the affirmative.

So the motion was adopted.

The question then being on the passage of the ordinance, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Davis, Goddard, Kappes, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt and Seidensticker -9.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Cottrell, Foster, Geisel, Henschen, Jameson, Stanton and Woodburn-7.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Brown called up special ordinance No. 17-1868, entitled :

AN ORDINANCE to grade and pave with bowlders Meridian street, between Pogue's Run and the south side of South street.

Which was read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis,

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Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Kappes, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn-15.

Councilman Jameson voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Brown called up special ordinance No. 16-1868, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE to provide for paving with brick the east sidewalk of Meridian street between Maryland and Louisiana streets, except such portions as may be paved with flag stones.

Which was read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson. Kappes, Loomis, Mac-Arthur, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn-16.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Stanton called up special appropriation ordinance No. 22-1868, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE appropriating the sum of one thousand dollars to be expended on what is known as the old Military Ground in the City of Indianapolis.

Which was read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being on the passage of the ordinance, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, Loomis, MacArthur, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn—16.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Brown called up special appropriation ordinance No. 23-1868, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE appropriating money for the payment of sundry claims against the City of Indianapolis.

Which was read the third time and placed upon its passage.

The question being, shall the ordinance pass? those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Fos-

REGULAR ORDER OF BUSINESS.

The question being on a suspension of the rules, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, Loomis, Mac-Arthur, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn-16.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the rules were suspended, and the ordinance was read the second time and considered engrossed.

Mr. Brown moved a further suspension of the rules for the purpose of passing the ordinance.

The question being on a suspension of the rules, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, Loomis, Mac-Arthur, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn-16.

No Councilman voting in the negative.

So the rules were suspended, and the ordinance was read the third time and placed upon its passage.

So the ordinance passed.

Mr. Coburn presented the following communication :

INDIANAPOLIS, April 25, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:—I regret very much that such is the case, that I am compelled from necessity to appeal to your honorable body for relief. I have been afflicted for the last fifteen months with the disease of erysipelas in my leg and ankle, which has left me a cripple, and in consequence of my long protracted disease it has left me without the means for a subsistence for myself and family. I am not able to perform hard labor at present, but hope to be able to do so in a few months; therefore, in my present extremities, I thought I would venture upon your benevolence to grant me a permit to peddle in the city of Indionapolis for the space of six months or a year, until I recover from my lameness. I am not able to procure license is the cause of my application. It is not necessary for me to explain to your honors any further my condition, for there are some of you Councilmen that are well acquainted with my condition and character. I have been a citizen of Indianapolis for fourteen years. Should you require any reference from me as a civil citizen I will give it to your satisfaction.

Hoping, gentlemen, that you will favor my petition, I leave my case in your hands.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for grading and graveling Lockerbie street and sidewalks, between Liberty and Noble streets.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Goddard presented the following remonstrance:

INDIANAPOLIS, May 4, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned, resident property holders along the line of Maryland street, between West and Helen streets, understanding that as a petition and ordinance for the grading and graveling of said street is about to be pre-sented, respectfully remonstrate against said work at this time,

 Because said work is not very urgently needed.
 Because the expense will be heavy, and we are hardly able to bear the same now.

3. Because the present city grade of said street would bring the same at some points six feet and ten inches under the general grade of the lots, which would force us to grade the lots as well as the street.

That the Mayor, Treasurer and Clerk be directed to cancel all the 7 per cent. War Bonds not used as collateral security in bank loan.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for grading and graveling Wabash street and sidewalks, between Mississippi and Missouri streets.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Seidensticker offered the following motion:

That Frederick Kissel be permitted to boulder the gutter and put down oak curbing in front of his premises on McCarty street and Russell street, provided the same be done to the satisfaction of the Civil Engineer, and that the Engineer be directed to set the proper grade stakes.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Stanton offered the following motion :

That a partial estimate be allowed Mr. Navin on his contract to fence the Military Park; the estimate to be fixed by the City Civil Engineer, and that the City Clerk be directed to include the same in his next appropriation ordinance.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Stanton presented the following petition:

INDIANAPOLIS, May 4, 1868

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:—Your petitioner respectfully represents to your honorable body that there is a ditch about two and a half or three feet deep and about eight feet wide excavated by the city, running immediately along by the side of the sidewalk east of his residence property, on the southwest corner of Bright and New York streets; that said ditch is a nuisance and dangerous; that he has formerly petitioned this Council about the same matter, and is informed that your Board of Public Improvements reported that the city should cover the same; that the same has rever been done; and he now asks that your honorable body will take such action in the matter as will secure the doing of what is right and necessary in the premises.

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Sealed proposals for public improvements were opened and read by the City Clerk, and referred to the Board of Public Improvements.

REPORTS FROM BOARDS.

Mr. Loomis, from the Board of Police, made the following report :

OFFICE BOARD OF POLICE,

Indianapolis, April 4, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:-Your Board of Police herewith present the Annual Report of Thomas S. Wilson, Chief of Police, for the year ending April 30th, 1868, which will, by a careful perusal, show your police force to be in a healthy, efficient condition, having made during the year one thousand five hundred and fifty-five arrests for violations of national, State and municipal laws, besides two hundred and sixty arrests for minor offences.

One hundred and seventy arrests were made for grand larceny, sixty-five of whom were convicted and sent to the Penitentiary. Twenty-seven arrests made for robbery, and seventeen sent to the Penitentiary. Eight were arrested for highway robbery, and all convicted and sentenced to serve in the State Prison from three to eight years.

Your Board only refer to these matters to show the efficiency of your Police Force. Their efforts, however, are no doubt directed to the prevention of crime rather than punishment. We are of the opinion that a thorough system of uniforming the force will add materially to its efficiency. This we have endeavored to inaugurate, and with the assistance of your honorable body shall be enabled to carry out, as we trust, to the entire satisfaction of all parties interested.

Your Board propose at present to make but few, if any, changes in the force as now organized, and then only where we may consider the same unavoidable, looking always to the efficiency of the force.

Your Board feel called upon in this report to refer to the decease of Frederick Sponsel, a Night Policeman of the 7th Ward, who died in Aug-ust last, leaving a large family in destitute circumstances. The afflictions of his estimable family we are glad to say were most liberally assuaged by his surviving comrades on the force, who at once contributed a sum of money exceeding one hundred dollars for the relief of his family,

Mr. Sponsel had been a soldier in blue over two years, and as such gained the respect of all who knew him.

Your Board have, from a thorough examination of witnesses and facts as presented to them, found it necessary to make a few removals and changes in the Police Force of the City, and what we regarded as our duty in the premises, we have done "without fear or favor."

We have removed two policemen for disobedience to rules and inefficiency. Two for conduct unbecoming a policeman and an officer of the police.

Four have been suspended for neglect of duty from 10 to 30 days and reinstated

Two have been suspended for insubordination.

Three have resigned.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 4, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:—The Special Committee on Gas beg leave to report a contract in accordance with the proposals of the Gas Light and Coke Company, and recommend that the same be filed and approved, and a copy thereof be spread on the minutes, and that the Gas Inspector be directed to prepare a time table of 2,000 hours per annum inclusive of at least 100 hours to be expended on dark nights, at his discretion, and that said Inspector be directed to designate immediately such posts as shall not longer be lighted, in accordance with the minimum per square, as per terms of contract.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Coburn, Cottrell, Davis, Foster, Geisel, Goddard, Henschen, Jameson, Kappes, Schmidt, Seidensticker, Stanton and Woodburn-13.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Brown and Loomis-2.

So that part of the report was concurred in.

The report, as a whole, was then concurred in.

The following is the agreement:

This agreement made and entered into this first day of May, A. D., 1868, by and between the City of Indianapolis of the State of Indiana, of the first. part, and the Indianapolis Gas Light and Coke Company of the second part, witnesseth: That the said party of the second part hereby contracts and agrees to and with the said party of the first part, to furnish good, pure gas of the quality provided for in the contract between the parties of March 19, 1866, for all the public lamps of said city, at a rate of consumption which shall average four cubic feet per hour per lamp, for the price and sum of twenty-four dollars per annum for each lamp; and to light and extinguish said lamps, and keep the came in good order and repair, and pay the Government tax on said gas, for the price and sum of six dollars per annum for each lamp, for and during the term of three (3) years from and after the firstday of May, A. D., 1868. Said lamps shall not be burned more than an average time of two thousand (2,000) hours for each lamp in each year, and the number of such lamps so to be supplied with gas on the streets where the gas mains are now laid shall not be less than four (4) to each space equal in length to one original square, including the avenue squares. Said city shall not be bound to increase the present number of lamps, but the number shall not be diminished below four (4) to a square as aforesaid, and if so diminished the compensation of the party of the second part shall not be decreased, but shall be estimated upon the basis of four (4) lamps to each square along which the mains are now laid.

On streets along which gas mains shall hereafter be laid, the number of lamps shall be wholly within the discretion of the Common Council of said city.

The time of lighting and extinguishing said lamps shall be fixed from time to time by the said Common Council, but if said table shall be so fixed as to give more than two thousand hours per annum to each lamp, or if, by direction of the party of the first part said lamps are burned for any additional time, then for such excess of time the party of the second part shall be paid at the same rate as above provided. The party of the second part shall furnish the burners for said lamps, which shall be of an average capacity and consume four cubic feet per hour; and the matches for lighting. The party of the second part shall also purchase the uccessary material for the repair of said lamps, and the necessary ladders and tools for lighting cleaning and repairing the same at the lowest market price, and shall charge the same to said city at the cost price thereof. And the city may elect to store and control said materials and tools at her own expense, otherwise i shall be done by the Gas Company. But if the City shall elect to store saic materials and tools, the place of deposit shall be conveniently located for the party of the second part, and shall be at all reasonable times accessible to the agents and servants of the party of the second part. And the said party o

the first part covenants and agrees to give to the party of the second part the exclusive right to furnish gas to the said public lamps of said city and to light, extinguish and repair the same for and during the term aforesaid, and to pay to the said party of the second part the sum of twenty-four (24) dollars per annum for each of said lamps for the gas, and the further sum of six (0) dollars for each lamp per annum for lighting, extinguishing and repairing the same, and for the Government tax on the gas, (which the party of the second part is to pay.) and such further sums as the party of the second part may expend as aforesaid for materials to be used in repairs, and for the ladders and tools needed for lighting said lamps and keeping the same in repair; said sums to be paid monthly as follows, to-wit: The party of the second part shall render to the Common Council of said City, at the end of each month, an account of the amount due for such month under this contract. The amount due, if anything, for gas consumed beyond the stipulated amount, and for materials and tools purchased, shall be specifically and separately stated therein; such accounts as may be for materials and tools shall be duly verified by the President or Secretary of said Gas Company, and the Common Council of said City shall audit such accounts, and shall, during the succeeding month, issue to the party of the second part the orders or tracenus warrants of said City for such sum or the such due for the gas furor treasury warrants of said City for such sum as may be due for the gas furnished at the rate aforesaid, and shall pay in currency such sum as may be due for lighting, extinguishing and repairing said lamps, and for the Government tax, and for materials and tools purchased by the party of the second part for the uses aforesaid.

And it is further agreed, that should the said party of the first part so elect, this contract may be continued in force for the period of two (2) years after the expiration of said term of three (3) years; the said party of the second part to be notified of such election at or before the expiration of said term of three (3) years. And it is further stipulated and agreed that nothing in this contract shall alter, modify, annul or suspend the provisions of the contract at this time existing between the said Gas Company and the said City of Indianapolis, as evidenced by the ordinance of the Common Council of March 19th, 1866, except so far as may be necessary to give effect to the provisions of this contract; and when this contract shall terminate, either by expiration of the time limited or by the failure or refusal of the City to perform its part thereof, then the said contract of March 19th, 1866, shall stand and continue for the unexpired term thereof, to be the contract between the parties hereto, as well touching the gas furnished to the public lamps as that furnished to private consumers, and in all respects as though this contract had not been made.

And it is further agreed, that should the United States tax on gas be, at any during the continuance of this contract, reduced below the present rate, the City shall have the benefit of such reduction by a deduction of a like amount from the price to be paid as aforesaid; and should said tax be increased during the time aforesaid, the City shall pay to the Gas Company the amount of such increase with their monthly bills. In witness whereof, the said parties have subscribed this contract; the said City by P. H. Jameson, J. H. Woodburn and Ad. Seidensticker, a Committee of the Common Council thereof thereunto duly authorized, and by the attestation of the Clerk of said City and the corporate scal thereof, and the said Gas Light and Coke Company by its President and Secretary, attested by the corporate seal thereof.

Mr. Cottrell, from Select Committee, made the following report:

INDIANAPOLIS, May 4, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:—The undersigned, a Special Committee, to whom was referred the question, "what would, in their opinion, be the best mode of drainage for the southern part of the city," respectfully report the following in answer to said question:

The City Engineer kindly furnished us with the distance, fall, and estimated cost of a brick sewer from what is locally known as "Lake McCarty," thence north along Delaware street to McCarty street, thence west along Mc-Carty street to Bluff Road, thence northwestwardly along Russell street to Illinois street thence north along Illinois street to Pogue's Run, distance 3,300 feet, with a fall of 12 feet.

Also, from Lake McCarty west along Ray street to Pogue's Run, distance 2,500 feet, with a fall of 23 feet.

Also, from a point a little south of Lake McCarty, thence west along Wilkins street to Pogue's Run, distance 2,700 feet, with a fall of 24 feet.

Your committee, having carefully examined the several plans (and estimated cost) proposed, whereby to drain the southern part of the city, have come to the conclusion that the best mode to accomplish the purpose will be to build a sewar commencing at Lake McCarty, thence west along Ray street to Pogue's Run, this being the shortest distance, and will best accommodate the drainage of intersecting streets and alleys as are now, or may be hereafter, graded. Your committee therefore recommend the adoption by the Council of the following:

Resolved, That the Civil Engineer be directed to advertise for sealed proposals for the building of a brick sewer of not less than five (5) feet internal diameter, commencing at Delaware street, thence running west along Ray street a distance of 2,500 feet. The city reserving the right to reject any and all such bids.

The City Clerk respectfully reports to the honorable Common Council:

lst. The contract and bond of James Mahoney for grading and graveling Broadway street and sidewalks, between St. Clair street and the Corporation line north, is presented for your approval.

The Chief Fire Engineer made the following report:

OFFICE OF CHIEF FIRE ENGINEER, Indianapolis, May 4, 1868.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:—Complete success and efficiency of the Telegraph Fire Alarm, depending as it does on its being kept in good order and condition, and as none of the present Fire Department is conversant with or accustomed to taking care of or tepairing the batteries, lines or instruments, and as an arrangement can be made with a gentleman now here, who comes highly recommended as fully competent to take charge of and superintend the Lines, Batteries and Instruments, and who will drive and take care of the extra Hose Reel for the sum of eighty-five dollars per month; and as you are now paying two dollars and twenty-five cents per day for the extra Hose Reel driver, I respectfully recommend that the Committee on Fire Department, or Chief Fire Engineer, be directed to employ this gentleman as extra Hose Reel driver and superintendent of Fire Alarm Telegraph, for the reasons and at the price above named, which is only about fifteen dollars more than the city now pays the extra hose reel driver.

I would also recommend that the Committee on Fire Department, or Chief Fire Engineer, be directed to purchase from Messrs. Shawk & Franz some repair materials, they having some left here which they propose to sell at cost. Poles at \$1.50, and wire at \$40 per mile, and other material in proportion. I would also recommend that Mr. J. F. Wallick be permitted to put up an Instrument in his office connecting with the line of city on Glenns' Block roof, at his own cost, he being responsible for false alarms from his office.
