REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS, MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 13TH, 1869, 71 O'CLOCK, P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present-Austin H. Brown in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Cottrell, Gimber, Harrison, Heckman, Kennington, Locke, Marsee, Pyle, Shepherd, Thalman, Weaver, Whitsit and Wiles -14.

Absent-Councilmen Kahn, Newman, Thoms and Woodburn-4.

The proceedings of the regular session held Sept. 6, 1869, and of the adjourned session held Sept. 9, 1869, were read and approved.

Mr. Brown presented the following :

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 13, 1869

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:-Having a necessary occasion to go to New York, I ask leave of absence for a week or ten days.

Which was granted.

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Mr. Wiles moved that the special order for the meeting, viz., the Sewerage question, be postponed, and the Council proceed in regular order.

The question being on the suspension of the rules,

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Harrison, Locke, Pyle, Thalman, Wiles and Weaver-6.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Gimber, Heckman, Kennington, Shepherd and Whitsit-7.

So the motion to suspend was lost.

By consent, Mr. Cottrell presented the following petition:

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 13, 1869

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned, your petitioners, believing as we do that only a very small minority of the tax payers of this city desire Water Works and Sewerage, we therefore pray that you will submit both questions to the people separately. Signed by

The report of the Committee on Sewerage, made to Council Aug. 23, 1869, was called up and read.

Mr. Wiles moved to defer action on the report for one week.

Mr. Whitsit moved to lay Mr. Wiles' motion on the table.

The question being on laying the motion on the table.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Cottrell, Gimber, Heckman, Kennington, Locke, Marsee, Shepherd, Pyle and Whitsit-9.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Brown, Harrison, Thalman, Wiles and Weaver-5.

So the motion to lay on the table was adopted.

Mr. Marsee offered the following resolution :

Resolved, First, That the plan for the South street Sewer, recommended by the Committee, be, and is hereby, adopted.

Second. That the City Civil Engineer is hereby directed to make the necessary survey and profile for the South street Sewers.

Third. That the City Clerk is hereby directed to advertise in the Daily Journal and Sentinel, for twenty days, for proposals for builing a Sewer com-

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mencing at Pogue Run, on South street, running thence on South street to Fletcher Avenue, thence on Fletcher Avenue to Cedar street. So much of said sewer as runs from Pogue Run to East street to be completed this fall, and the remainder to be completed as early next season as possible.

Mr. Wiles moved to lay the resolution on the table.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Harrison, Locke, Pyle, Weaver and Wiles-5.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Gimber, Heckman, Kennington, Marsee, Shepherd, Thalman and Whitsit-9.

So the motion to lay the resolution on the table was lost.

The question being on the adoption of the resolution,

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Gimber, Heckman, Kennington, Marsee, Pyle, Shepherd, Thalman, Weaver, Whitsit and Wiles -12.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Harrison and Locke-2.

So the resolution was adopted.

On motion, the remainder of the Sewerage report was laid over for one week.

By consent, sealed proposals for public work were opened and read, and referred to the Committee on Contracts.

On motion, business was resumed in regular order, commencing with the

CALL OF THE ROLL.

Mr. Brown presented the following petition :

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 13, 1869.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Mr. Harrison offered the following motion:

That the Chief Fire Engineer be instructed to designate on each Alarm Box, by attaching a written card thereto, or otherwise, as he may deem best, where, and in whose hands, the key may be found.

Which was adopted.

Also, the following motion :

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to bowlder the curve in the track of the Citizens' Street Railway Company, at the corner of North New Jersey street and Fost Wayne Avenue.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys.

Mr. Harrisor presented the following petition:

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 13, 1869.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

The undersigned, owners of property situate on Railroad street, in the City of Indianapolis, between Massachusetts Avenue and St. Clair street, respectfully represent that said street was opened and laid out for the use of the Bellefontaine Railway Company—that said Railway Company has abandoned said street and relinquished all the interest of said Company therein to the city; that so much of said street as lies between Massachusetts Avenue and St. Clair street is of no public utility, the same being very low and usually a pond of stagnant water; that the undersigned are the owners of the property between said streets, and in view of the facts, respectfully ask that the City Council will vacate so much of said Railroad street as lies between said designated points.

The deed contains the following provision: "The same to be held in trust for use and erection of a House of Refuge and Reform for Abandoned Females, both prostitutes and those given to intoxication, and the premises to revert to the donor or his heirs, should the same be dedicated to a use inconsistent herewith." If Mr. Fletcher will consent to a sale of the building material, I suppose there would be no difficulty in carrying out the effect of the resolution referred to me; but if the materials are attached to the real estate, and the city has abandoned the purpose of erecting the House of Refuge for Abandoned Females, they are the property of Mr. Fletcher.
