General Ordinance No. 53-1869, was read the second time and postpond.

The general ordinance authorizing the Water Works Company of Indianapolis to construct, maintain and operate water works, and supply water to the city and citizens of Indianapolis, defining their powers and privileges, and prescribing their duties, was called up and read the second time.

Mr. Thoms offered the following amendment:

That section eight be amended by inserting after the words, "of said company the following, to-wit: "If so instructed by a majority of the voters of said city, at an election to be held for that purpose."

Which amendment was adopted.

Mr. Thalman offered the following amendment to section 8:

Sec. 8. From and after the expiration of five years from the time of the organization of said company, the city of Indianapolis shall have the right and privilege of purchasing from said company all the buildings, machinery, aqueducts, pipes, water-courses, casements, fixtures, apparatus, and other property of such company, with all its corporate rights and privileges, at such price as may be agreed upon by the Common Council and the Board of Directors of said company, and ratified by a majority vote of the voters of said city of Indianapolis, at a special election to be held for that purpose. *Provided*, That said Water Works Company shall not be allowed to sell out to any company whatsoever within five years, without first giving to the citizens the refusal to purchase at the same rates as offered to others.

Which amendment was adopted.

Mr. Brown moved to amend section — of said ordinance by striking out in line 9 the words, "and duly vested."

Which motion was adopted.

Mr. Gimber moved to postpone the further consideration of the ordinar ce until the first Monday in January, 1870.

The question being on the motion to postpone, Mr. Brown called for the ayes and noes.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown and Gimber-2.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Cottrell, Harrison, Heckman, Kahn, Kennington, Locke, Marsee, Newman, Pyle, Thalman, Thoms and Wiles-12.

So the motion to postpone was not adopted.

Mr. Brown moved to amend as follows :

Amend section ten by inserting after the word "provided:" "That the said ordinance shall be first ratified by a majority of the votes of the legal voters of the city of Indianapolis, at a special election to be held on the first Tuesday in February, 1870; and provided further."

Mr. Newman moved to lay the amendment on the table.

Mr. Brown called for the ayes and noes.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Cottrell, Kahn Kennington, Locke, Marsee, Newman, Pyle and Wiles-8. Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Brown, Gimber, Harrison, Heckman, Thalman and Thoms-6.

So the amendment was laid on the table.

Mr. Brown moved to amend as follows :

Strike out section nine and insert in lieu the following: "Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be so construed as to grant any exclusive privilege of constructing or operating water works in the city of Indianapolis."

Mr. Cottrell offered the following amendment to Mr. Brown's amendment:

But the city reserves the right to construct works of any kind at any and all times.

Which was accepted by Mr. Brown.

The motion to amend, as amended, was then adopted.

Mr. Brown moved to amend as follows:

Amend section eight by striking out the words, "water-courses, casements," and the words, "with all its corporate rights and privileges."

The question being on the adoption of the amendment:

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Cottrell, Gimber, Harrison, Heckman, Hahn, Kennington, Locke, Newman, Pyle, Thalman and Wiles-11.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilman Brown, Marsee, and Thoms-3.

So the motion to amend was adopted.

Mr. Brown moved to amend as follows:

Amend section five by inserting after the words, "connected with said water works," wherever the same occurs, the words: "One-half of which shall be laid down north of Washington street, and one-half of which shall be laid down south of Washington street."

Mr. Newman moved to lay the motion to amend on the table.

The question being to lay the motion on the table, those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Harrison, Kahn, Kennington, Locke, Newman, Pyle, Thomas and Wiles-8. Nov. 11, 1869.]

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Gimber, Heckman, Marsee and Thalman-6.

So the motion was laid on the table.

Mr. Brown moved ta amend as follows:

Add to the end of the fifth section the following: "*Provided*, That the Common Council reserves the right at any and all times to fix by ordinance the rates at which water shall be furnished to citizens and the city, and such company shall not charge any greater rates than those so fixed; said rates to be made upon the basis provided in sections 4 and 5 of this ordinance."

Which was adopted.

Mr. Locke moved to amend as follows :

That no water shall be taken from the Central Canal for propelling purposes in the supplying of the necessary amount of Mater as indicated in section —, to the detriment of any lessee of water from said Central Cenal, under penalty of the forfeiture of all the privileges herein granted.

Mr. Kennington moved to lay on the table.

Mr. Locke called for the ayes and noes.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Harrison, Heckman, Kahn, Kennington, Marsee, Newman Pyle, Thomas and Wiles—11.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Gimber, Locke and Thalman-3.

So the motion to lay on the table was adopted.
