Indianapolis, Nov. 29, 1869.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN. - The Committee on Contracts respectfully report, that they

have examined the proposals for improving Louisiana street, from East to Noble street, and find the following persons to be the lowest bidders:

For grading and graveling—Samuel Lefever, at 50 cents per front foot on the south side, and 60 cents per front foot on the north side. For building the stone protection wall——— Burke & Richter, at \$5 50 per cubic yard.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The Committee on Streets and Alleys, to whom was referred sundry papers, would respectfully report:

- 1. A petition was referred to your Committee, signed by J. W. Brown, W. C. Ewing and others, asking the Council to reconsider a resolution passed by the Council, compelling J. W. Brown and others to remove their fences in front of their residences on New Jersey street. We herewith return the petition, and recommend that the same be laid on the table.
- 2. A petition was also referred to your Committee, signed by Charles Neighbors, C. Simon and others, asking the Council to pass an ordinance to grade and gravel Willard street, from Garden street to Pogues run, which we think should be done, and herewith report an ordinance to improve the same.
- 3. A remonstrance was also referred to your Csmmittee, signed by John F. Ramsey, in regard to the improvement of Illinois street, from Ohio to North street. As the street has not been completed, we respectfully report that the remonstrance signed by Mr. Ramsey be referred to the Civil Engineer, who is superingending the work, as we believe that he will not accept any material placed on the street by the contractors, that does not come up to their contract.
- 4. A petition was also presented to the Council, and referred to your Committee, signed by Henry Behrent. H. Koritzer and others, in regard to the opening of Dillon street, from Harrison to Bates streets. Part of the damages have been collected by the Treasurer from the persons' benefitted, and spart he has not been able to collect, and in consultation with said officer in regard to the case he informs us that he some time ago directed a communication to the Council in regard to said damages not collected, which, he says, was referred to the City Attorney, we would recommend that the City Clerk notify the City Attorney to report to the Council on next Monday evening, when we can act understandingly in the matter.
- 5. We would also report, that the first and final estimate allowed Samuel Manway, for grading and graveling Virginia avenue, from the south side of

South street to Louisiana street, be approved by the Council, as we believe he has complied with his contract.

Mr. Newman offered the following resolution:

Resolved. That no contract for city improvements shall be let without a provision in the same, that unless the work to be done or materials furnished shall be actually done or the materials furnished within the time named in such contract or contracts, such contract or contracts shall be void and of no effect in law; and it is made the duty of the Committee on Contracts to see that such provision shall be inserted in all contracts hereafter let by the city.

The question being on the passage of the resolution.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Gimber, Harrison, Heckman, Kahn, Kennington, Marsee, Newman, Pyle, Shepherd, Thalman, Thoms, Weaver, Wiles and Woodburn—16.

No Councilman voting in the negative

So the resolution passed.

Mr. Brown offered the following motion:

That the Street Commissioner be ordered to change the culverts running north and south on West street, at the crossing of Maryland street, changing them to east and West on Maryland street; the same to be done immediately.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Brown introduced general ordinance No. 57, 1869-entitled:

An Ordinance repealing so much of an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance authorizing the Junction Railroad Company to cross certain streets and alleys, and to lay a single track on Louisiana street, on the north side of the Union Depot," passed May 11, 1868, as grants a right of way for laying a track of the Junction Railroad in or across any street west of the east side of Virginia avenue.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Cottrell offered the following motion:

That the Civil Engineer report an estimate in favor of Sam. Lefever, for grading and bouldering Virginia avenue, from Pogues run to Louisiana street, on the portion now done.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Gimber offered the following motions:

That the City Civil Engineer be instructed to require the contractor for constructing the Ray street sewer, to put in the catch basins in said sewer, on Meridian street, at once.

That the City Marshal be and he is hereby instructed, to designate to the residents on South Meridian street, between McCarty street and the Corporation Line, the number of their respective residences.

Which were adopted.

Mr. Heckman offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS, It appears from the report of the Civil Engineer, made October 22, 1866, and set out on page 430 of the Proceedings of the Council for that year, that part of the lot of Mary Gilmore was, by mistake, thrown into Stevens street, and that the city has received the same and used it, by improving it as part of said street, and the said Gilmore has also been assessed in the sum of \$--, for improving said street.

Resilved, That the matter be referred to a special committee, for the purpose of ascertaining whether an allowance should not be made said Mary Gilmore, for her property so taken as aforesaid, and that said committee be

instructed to report to this Council the facts of the case, and their conclusions thereon.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys, and Civil Enginder.

Mr. Heckman offered the following motion:

That it be the duty of the Civil Engineer, in every case where work is to be let, to state in the specifications what length of time will be allowed to complete the contract, and in no case shall the time be changed, except by the consent of this Council.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Marsee offered the following motion:

That the Street Commissioner be directed to notify the C. C. and I. C. R. R. Co., to plank their tracks where they cross Delaware street; and should they fail to do the same within ten days from notice, that the Street Commissioner shall do the same, at the expense of the Company.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Newman offered the following motion:

That the Street Commissioner be ordered to clean out the gutter on North Pennsylvania street, at the crossing of Ohio street and Massachusetts avenue, under the Street Railway, so as to permit the water to flow freely from above, and also to clean out the gutter north to Michigan street.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Weaver presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, Nov. 29, 1869.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:—I ask your honorable body to grant me the privilege of removing the old stuff and rubbish of said premises, which was promised to me by your Committee.—I am of opinion that I have four or five hundred dollars missing around the old building.
