THURSDAY, MARCH 24TH, 1870, 7 O'CLOCK, P. M.

The Common Council met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—His Honor, the Mayor, Daniel Macauley, in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Gimber, Harrison, Heckman, Kennington, Locke, Marsee, Newman, Pyle, Shepherd, Thalman, Thoms, Whitsit, Wiles and Woodburn—16.

CALL OF THE ROLL.

Mr. Brown presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, March 24, 1870.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, owners of lots and residents thereon, on Maryland street, north side, between Tennessee and Mississippi streets, respectfully petition your honorable body to order the laying of a brick pave-

ment on the said square, to wit: on Maryland street, north side, from Mississippi to Tennessee street. The said pavement to be laid with hard brick, nine feet wide from the line of the lots; the said pavement to be laid by contract, to the lowest bidder, and the property to be assessed for the improvement. The undersigned also petition your honorable body to order a crossing of stone flagging across the alley on the said square.

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, gardners visiting and selling their products at the markets and to the citizens of Indianapolis, respectfully petition your honorable body lo repeal that part of the Market ordinance which prevents them from selling their products to citizens outside of the market, or to gro-ceries and provision dealers, during market hours.

Said parts of the ordinance are very frequently extremely disadvantageous to the producers, compelling them to stay for hours, before they can dispose of their products. They are a restriction of the freedom of trade, by which the consumers are in no way benefitted, as our own experience and that of the citizens frequenting markets justifies us in asserting. We therefore ask its repeal.

An Ordinance to provide for grading and graveling Severn alley, from Maryland to Georgia streets.

Which was read the first time,

Mr. Brown offered the following motion:

That the City Clerk furnish the City Attorney any bond or bonds in his possession, given by any officer or individual stockholder of the Junction Railroad, guaranteeing the building of machine shops in this city, and that the City Attorney bring suit on the same, at the earliest possible moment, if he finds any of the conditions of such bond have not been complied with.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Brown offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That a select committee be appointed by the Mayor, with instructions to prepare and have published, at the city's expense, a pamphlet setting forth the advantages of Indianapolis as a manufacturing city, and that such report contain all the available statistics on the subject, and in order to obtain the same, such committee be authorized to employ, at a reasonable expense, one or more persons to assist in preparing the report. That when such report is ready, such number of copies of the same as the Council may order be printed, and furnished our business men and citizens for general circulation.

The question being on the adoption of the resolution.

That the City Attorney be directed to prepare and report an ordinance prohibiting the working on the streets of city prisoners, or so-called chain gangs, by the Street Commissioner or other city officer.

Mr. Cottrell introduced Special ordinanne No. 45, 1870, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick the east sidewalk of Alabama street, from Washington street to the Union Railway Track.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Cottrell introduced Special ordinance No. 46, 1870, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for grading and paving with brick the west sidewalk of New Jersey street; from Washington street to South street.

Mr. Cottrell offerered the following motion:

That the City Marshal be instructed to notify all the Railroad Companies, that they must not permit any railroad car or locomotive to stand on any street or alley crossing.

The sidewalks to be graveled with the same kind of gravel to a depth of eight inches, the same to be done within ninety days, and the Civil Engineer is hereby directed to set the grade stakes.

Dr. Woodburn introduced Special ordinance No. 54, 1870, entitled:

An Ordinance to provide for the erection of lamp posts, lamps and fixtures complete to burn gas, except the service pipe, on Ohio street between Mississippi and Tennessee streets.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Woodburn introduced Special Appropriation ordinance No. 15, 1870, entitled:

An Ordinance appropriating money for the payment of sundry claims against the city of Indianapolis.

Which was read the first time.

Fir. Woodburn offered the following motion:

That the Committee on Gas Light and the City Attorney, and the City Gas Inspector, be instructed to report an ordinance assessing the gas used in street lighting, against the property on the squares fronting the same.

Mr. Thoms moved to refer to Committee on Gas.

Mr. Locke moved to lay the whole matter on the table. .

Dr. Woodburn called for the ayes and noes.

The question being to lay on the table.

Those who voted in the affirmative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Gimber, Harrison, Heckman, Kennington, Locke, Marsee, Shepherd, Thalman, Whitsit and Wiles—12.

Those who voted in the negative were Councilman Newman, Pyle, Thoms and Weaver—4

An Ordinance to provide for grading and graveling West street and sidewalks, from the south line of Root street to the Corporation line south.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Harrison presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, March 24, 1870.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

GENTLEMEN:—The undersigned respectfully petition your honorable body, to rescind the resolution to open Gregg street from the first alley east of East street, to Jackson street, passed November 22, 1869. We ask said resolution rescinded for the following reasons:

Those who voted in the negative were Councilmen Gimber, Kennington and Shepherd—3.

So the rules were suspended.

The ordinance was read the second time.

Mr. Kennington moved to amend by inserting \$932 22 in favor of Michael Maloney, in payment for lot appropriated by the city in the excavation of Pogue's Run.

Which was adopted.

Dr. Woodburn offered the following motion:

The City Clerk shall not issue the warrant to Malony, till the proper deed for the lot shall be submitted to the City Attorney for his approval.

Which was adopted.

The ordinance was then ordered engrossed, and read the third time, and placed upon its passage.

The question being on the passage of the ordinance.

Those who voted in the affimative were Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Gimber, Harrison, Heckman, Kennington, Locke, Marsee, Newman, Pyle, Shepherd, Thalman, Thoms, Whitsit, Wiles and Woodburn—15.
