REGULAR SESSION.

CHAMBER OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF INDIANAPOLIS,

SATURDAY, APRIL 30, 1870, 7½ OCLOCK P. M.

The Common Council met in regular session.

Present—His Honor, the Mayor, Daniel Macauley, in the chair, and the following members:

Councilmen Brown, Cottrell, Gimber, Harrison, Heckman, Kennington, Locke, Marsee, Newman, Pyle, Shepherd, Thalman, Thoms, Weaver, Whitsit, Wiles and Woodburn—17.

Absent-Councilmen Kahn.

The proceedings of the regular session held April 23, 1870, were read and approved.

Sealed proposals for building bridges on First street over the Canal and Tennessee street over Pogue's Run, were opened and read and referred to the Committee on Bridges.

Sealed proposals for the improvement of various streets, were opened and read, and referred to the Committee on Contracts.

Mr. Wiles from the Committee on Contracts, made the following report:

Indianapolis, April 30, 1870.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The Committee on Contracts to whom was referred sundry proposals for grading and bouldering New Jersey street from Massachusetts avenue to St. Clair street, find that Patterson and Dunning are the lowest bidders, their bid being \$2.70 cents per lineal foot front on each side of the line improved.

And for grading and bouldering same street from St. Clair street to Fort Wayne avenue, we find that the same parties were the lowest bidders, their bid being \$2 40 per lineal foot front, on each side of the line improved.

The parties named above, being the lowest and best bidders, we recommend that they be awarded the contracts.

On motion, General ordinances Nos. 17 and 10, 1870, providing for the trimming of shade trees, and providing for the inspection of steam boilers, were stricken from the files.

General ordinance No. 10, 1869, providing for the execution of bonds to the Indianapolis and St. Louis Railroad Company, was referred to the Committee on Railroads.

By consent, His Honor, the Mayor, presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the resolution of censure passed by this Council, July 19, 1869, on Thomas Cottrell, Member of Council from the Seventh ward, be and the same is, hereby rescinded, and the City Clerk is hereby directed to expunge the same from the minutes.

Mr. Cottrell introduced General ordinance No. 21, 1870, entitled:

An Ordinance authorizing the Cleveland, Columbus, Cincinnati and Indianapolis Railway Company, to construct a railroad switch across New Jersey street.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Heckman presented the following petition:

Indianapolis, April 30, 1870.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Indianapolis:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, owners of real estate fronting on Pratt street, between Pennsylvania and Delaware streets, respectfully petition your honorable body to pass an ordinance providing for the erection of lump posts lamps and fixtures complete to burn gas, except the service pipe, on said street between the limits named.

That the Street Commissioner be instructed to put a protection post on the gas post on the corner of Washington and Noble streets.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Kennington offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS, A clerical error in the lease executed to the City by Cottrell & Knight, leases all the upper part of their building,

AND WHEREAS, It was not intended to lease the room into which the stairway from the store of said Cottrell leads, therefore, to correct said mistake,

Be it resolved. That the said room situated in the southwest corner of said building, and into which the stairway from the store-room of said Thomas Cottrell leads, be declared to be no part or parcel of the premises leased to the city.

Gentlemen:—The undersigned, citizens living in the southwestern part of the city, respectfully petition your honorable body to order the property holders owning the property south of Maryland, between Helen and California streets, on which is located a terrible nuisance, in the shape of a deep hole filled with a putrid mass of mud, filth and water, to immediately fill up the same. If allowed to remain as it is, during the warm weather, it will be a breeder of pestilence.

We pray your honorable body to take immediate steps to have the nuisance abated.
